The New Look 6581 pattern requires you to work with a stretch knit fabric, whether that be double knit, interlock or jersey. When using this material, it's important to choose the right needle for the job; a ball point one is your best bet, as it will ensure that the fibres separate rather than tear when the needle slides through

#### **SUPPLE SEAMS**

Similarly, with the New Look 6581 pattern, the knit fabric you use needs to have some 'give' to ensure that the stitches don't snap. The best way to provide the seams with stretch is by using a narrow zig zag stitch or if you have one, an overlocker.

A loop turner is a handy, inexpensive gadget that is great for twisting narrow tubes, like belt and button loops. In this case, it will come in useful when turning the tie belt right sides out on the tunic

and top patterns. To use it, simply insert the wire with the hook sticking out of the top, then catch the hook on the end of the fabric and close the latch to pull it through.

#### **SETTING SLEEVES**

A well-set sleeve is where it fits smoothly into the armhole and the cap lays correctly over the shoulder point without any unnecessary puckers, tucks or gathers. A top tip to get your sleeve sitting just right is to pin in stages or in between anchor points before stitching, such as the underarm, shoulder, notches and front ease sections.

#### **STRETCH IT OUT**

Design C on this pattern features a simple, stylish pair of straight-leg trousers that have an elasticated waistband. To make sure you secure the elastic so that it won't twist when you're wearing the trousers, you should sew through all the fabric layers of the casing in the groove of each seam.

When sewing with crepe fabric like our dressmaker has with the red version of design B, you'll need to

use a brand-new universal needle. A new needle is best because it will be sharper, meaning that it won't snag the material.

For universal needle size 60/8, visit prym.com for stockists

#### **Choose your** THREAD

Likewise, if you're sewing with crepe you'll need to pick the right sort of thread that is compatible with the fabric. In the case of this project a

case of this project, a lightweight cotton or polycotton is ideal. **We used Seralon** 

Polyester in Candy Apple and Dark Indigo. For stockists, visit amann-mettler.com

#### **On the** BIAS

For the raw edges of the armholes on these dresses, you'll need to add bias binding. If you'd prefer to make your own, simply cut fabric strips on the bias grain to the correct width for a binding maker. Feed the strip into the



gadget and press the creased edges as the strip comes out.

#### **Perfect** PATTERN

When you're sewing with crepe or any other silky fabric, you should always check that the material is cut out accurately, as it can slide about when trimming it down to size. To do this, just unpin the pattern piece from the fabric after cutting and re-lay the pattern on top to see where it may have shifted, then trim accordingly.

#### **Staying IN CHECK**

The designs on this pattern require a lot of stay-stitching; a row of sewing inside the seam allowance which ensures that the fabric keeps its shape. It's vital for curved edges, such as necklines and armholes, as these are the places the garment is most likely to fall out of shape.

TOP TIPS FROM TILLY



If you want to make pattern adjustments to the Indigo smock, then you've come to the right place! First you should make a toile, or as it's otherwise known, a 'muslin'; this is a mock-up of the garment in a fabric you don't mind using for testing purposes. Make sure you use a material that has similar properties and the same weight as your intended fabric for the project. At this point, it's a great opportunity

to try out the fit of the pattern, but you don't necessarily need to make the entire garment, only the pieces that you need to be fitted to your specific measurements, which is the bodice and sleeves in this case.

Once you've made the toile, check the fit by trying it on and raising your arms, sitting down, and perhaps even busting out some dance moves – you get my drift! Once you've checked that it's comfortable to move in and found out whether it's too tight or loose, make a note of any changes you'd like to make. You should also bear in mind that the weight of the gathered skirt on this pattern may pull down the bodice, so you might need to sew the bodice dart slightly higher than the fullest part of your bust.

To ensure an accurate fit, you should use a flexible tape measure to find the circumference of your bust and waist, then circle these figures on the 'Body Measurements' chart on the pattern instructions. You can also make this garment in a variety of different fabric types, from light- to mediumweight wovens such as cotton lawn and chambray, to soft georgette or sustainable Tencel.

#### A WORD FROM OUR DRESSMAKER...

The pattern itself is incredibly simple to use, as it comes on printed paper or in a digital format, each with precise size lines and cutting instructions in a coloured book with photographs and helpful hints. If you're a beginner, then not to worry, the pattern also has jargon-busting explanations to help you.

#### Curves & Stitches

Understitching is an important step when making the Indigo pattern. To do this, you should sew a row of machine stitches along the right side of the facing next to the seam line, pulling the seam apart gently as you do so. Now press the facing inwards for a sharp finish. To ensure that the neckline lays flat

on this pattern, you should turn the facing into the garment and clip the curves along the neck. To do this, you'll need to make small cuts at right angles to the stitches at 2cm intervals without catching the sewing.

#### Gather Round

My final tip is on making the gathered frill. Finish off the top edge of the skirt and bottom of the bodice, then mark the centre front and back on both parts with pins to divide each one into four equal parts. Make the gathers along the top edge of the frill by using contrasting top and bottom threads and a stitch length of 4mm to 5mm; the long ends should finish at each end of the quarters. Join the top and bottom pieces by pinning at the quarter points, then pull up the gathering threads to fit each section.

Next, even out the gathers, then pin at right angles to the fabric edge – there's no need to tack at this point. Machine-stitch with matching thread and a regular stitch length; the gathers can be adjusted as you sew. Pull out the bobbin threads of the gathers and the top ones should be easily released.

**Essentials** Fabric, 1m (160cm) Lining, 1m

#### **Sizes** 8-20

**Cutting guide Front:** cut one pair in fabric and lining **Back:** cut one on the fold in fabric and lining

1.5cm seam allowance used throughout.

Download and cut out the pattern from **sewmag** .co.uk, then follow the cutting guide. Pin and sew the shoulder seams of the jacket and lining, right sides together, matching the notches. Stitch to the dot marked at the back shoulder edge and press the seams open.

Match and pin the neckline lining to the gilet neckline, right sides facing, then pin each centre front edge. Sew from the base of the gilet up around the neck and down the opposite side.

Match the gilet armholes to the lining ones, right sides together. Pin and stitch in place. Clip around the curved seam allowance on the armholes and neckline. Trim the bulk from the curved top corners. Turn the gilet to the right side by threading the front parts through the shoulders.

Match up the side seams, pin and sew from the base of the gilet up to

the underarm, then continue the seam into the lining side seams. Make sure that the armhole seams are open and matching exactly when sewing.

Turn the gilet back to the wrong side, matching the lining base to the gilet. Pin and sew together, leaving a gap of approximately 15cm in the centre of the stitching line. Trim the bulk from the curved corners, then turn the gilet to the right side through the gap. Tease out the seams and corners, then close the gap by hand slip-stitching.

Use plenty of pins while stitching the fur to the lining; you will find that the material will want to push the lining away from the seam edges. After the seams have been stitched and turned to the right side, use a pin to tease the fur out from the seam.

In this project, I used the Aava Blazer sewing pattern by Named Clothing - the Utu Skirt from their book Breaking the Pattern is my current favourite. Added to that, I've also dabbled in a bit of public speaking. Most recently, I spoke at the Sewing Weekender organised by the wonderful ladies at The Fold Line alongside Charlotte Powell. It was an excellent opportunity to meet many Sewing Bee fans in real life! I hope to return to the event for the chance to connect with even more of you. The Simplicity Pattern Hack-Along launched in September and I had the humble pleasure of kick-starting it with a fun hack-along, converting Simplicity 8701 and 8658 into a striped jumpsuit. There is more advice to support anyone venturing into the process of hacking on my website. The challenge, which has three categories (party, vintage and day), will feature many bloggers from around the world. So, I encourage you all to join in the fun!

# Debbie Shore's SHOW & TELL

Knitted fabrics can create the most comfortable clothing in a me-made wardrobe, but can be intimidating for beginners. So I've put together a few pointers to walk you through sewing with this versatile material. You may find that a simple, straight skirt with no zips or darts is a good place to start. While you can adapt your sewing machine to suit this fabric, you may find that as your confidence grows, it would be beneficial to invest in an overlocker too; this helps produces quick stretch stitches and will help trim the seam at the same time.



# SEWING WITH KNITS



Use the right needles – either stretch or ballpoint – as these will part the fabric fibres instead of tearing them, leaving a neat seam without any laddering.



A ballpoint twin needle will give a professional finish to hems and is automatically a stretch stitch; I find that the 4-6mm needles give a neater look.



Use a polyester thread when sewing jersey; these have a little 'give' in them so won't break as easy as cotton would when used on knits.



A walking foot will keep the material from slipping, and lay the seams flat. It is designed to feed the top and bottom layers of fabric through the feed dogs at an even rate.



5 When buying fabric in store, feel it for thickness and stretch because some knitted materials can become quite transparent or be too stretchy for your chosen pattern.



When cutting jersey, lay it flat on the table, either single or double layered depending on the pattern. Make sure the fabric doesn't hang over the table or it will stretch.

# Dress yourself confident in the Sandy Skirt

This one-metre wonder from **Amanda Walker** is a speedy make that's designed for stretch fabrics. To create the four-step skirt, you'll be machine-sewing with a twin needle and a stretch stitch, as well as mastering overlocking. The project can also be mustered up in just a few hours, so you can make it in the morning and pair it with tights and boots to wear out that evening!

#### Get started

Essentials

Jersey, 1m (150cm) Elastic, 3cm wide Fusible hemming web

**Sizes** 8-20

#### Cutting guide Front: cut one

Front lower panel: cut one Back: cut one on the fold

1.5cm seam allowance used throughout, unless otherwise stated.

Download and print the templates at **sewmag** .co.uk, then follow the cutting guide. Overlock the base edge of the front lower panel, then use the fusible hemming web on a 1.5cm hem. Lay the front lower panel onto the front skirt, matching the notches. Stitch and overlock the seam allowance and the remaining base edge of the skirt. Stitch fusible hemming web onto this part of the hem.

Overlock the base of the back skirt. Position it on top of the front piece, right sides facing, with the back skirt hem protruding past the base of the seam. Pin and stitch each side, then overlock the seam allowance. Cut the elastic to your waist measurement and add 2cm. Stitch the two short ends together to make a circle. Position the elastic inside the skirt, 2mm away from the top edge, then pin and overlock. Fold the top of the skirt inside the edge of the elastic, and overstitch the side seams to secure.

Stick fusible hemming web onto the 1.5cm skirt hem. Attach a twin needle to the machine, and sew from the top of the lower front panel to the lefthand side of the V hem, then around the back and up to the centre front point of the V.



Geometric Pick Stretch jersey is notoriously easy to sew, and Art Gallery Fabrics' tan version is no exception! £23.99 per metre, minervacrafts.com



#### DRESSMAKING



Fusible hemming web stabilises stretch fabrics and enables you to complete a machine-stitched hem without distorting the material. To attach it, simply press the required hem length, cut it to the right size, place it in between the fabric, then iron to finish.

# Channel casual style with our **Alexa Blouse**

With its short sleeves and sweet ditsy print from the Liberty collection, this lightweight blouse is bound to become a stylish staple in your wardrobe! Amanda Walker's delightful top is flattering for both tall and petite frames, plus by making it you'll discover how to create a waist belt and use bias binding.

Fold and press along the lines indicated on the front facings. Unfold the facing at the top of each piece onto the right side of the collar, then sew from the fold to the shoulder seams. Clip into the seam allowance, level with the shoulder seam and as far as the stitching. Trim the bulk, turn the facing to the right side and press.

Fold the raw edges of the neck into the collar, then fold in the seam allowance

press the remainder of the 3cm hem. Sew the hem and stitch around the slits in the side seams. Make five buttonholes on the right-hand side down the centre front line of the shirt, as shown on the pattern. Sew five in corresponding places onto the left side.

Cut buckram long enough to fit around your waist, then add 20cm; it should be wide enough to fit through the buckle. Snip fabric to double the width of the buckram and slightly longer. Wrap the

material around the buckram and press.

Cut fabric 2cm wider than the belt, then fold and press 1cm around the edges. Pin the strip to the back of the belt and edgestitch, then thread the buckle onto the blunt end. Make a hole for the prong, then turn the raw end onto the belt. Tuck the raw end under and sew, attaching a buckle. Fix an eyelet to your waist measurement, plus one on each side. Make a belt carrier to finish.

## Get started

#### **Essentials**

Fabric: Liberty print, 3m (137cm) Lightweight fusible iron-on interfacing Bias binding Adhesive buckram Buttons, five Buckle Eyelets

**Sizes** 8-14

#### **Cutting guide**

Front: cut one pair and one pair of facings Back: cut one on the fold Sleeve: cut one pair Collar: cut one pair and one in interfacing

1.5cm seam allowance used throughout.

Download and print the pattern from sewmag. co.uk, then follow the cutting guide. Mark the darts on the front and back of the shirt, then match them up on the centre of the darts. Pin and stitch the dots at each top and base, then press. Make the tucks on the front in the same way.

Match the shoulder seams, pin, then sew. Overlock or zig zag stitch the shoulder seam allowances. Press upwards and top edgestitch on the right side. Iron the interfacing onto the front facings. Neaten the edge with overlocking or zig zag stitch.

# Sewing

#### Tackle slippery fabrics with the help of our three experts

**Q** How can I prevent smooth material from sliding around when I cut it? Allie Brown

## Marie-Emilienne says

It can be frustrating to cut slippery fabric, but my simple steps will help you stabilise the material and snip it with ease! First, spray the fabric with starch; this will stiffen it so it's easier to fold and lay – be sure to try this out on a corner of the material first. Next, trim enough fabric to fit the pattern pieces which need interfacing, then attach it before you cut them out.

To keep the grain line straight, fold the fabric in half lengthways and match the selvedges with a straight line; use either the line of a cutting mat or some sticky tape. Place the pattern pieces on the material and secure with weights rather than pins. Sliding scissors through the fabric is enough to shift it, so use a rotary cutter and cutting mat instead. Finally, rather than snipping out all the pieces at once, cut a few at a time and remember to keep an eye on the selvedges!

#### Which stitch width and length should I use when sewing with smooth materials, such as satin? Sonia Lidington

What a great question! To sew with slick fabrics, I recommend using a short stitch length and narrow width if you're zig zagging. It's

also important to swap to a ballpoint needle and use silk pins or weights to avoid damaging the fabric. One of my favourite tips for working with slippery material is to save up all of the tissue paper you receive – either from Christmas presents or online orders – and use it to stabilise the fabric temporarily when sewing and cutting, then tear it away when you're finished.

Which thread is best to use on silky fabrics? And do I use the same thread in the bobbin as the main spool? **Clair Foskett** 

### Lisa says

as viscose, crepe, chiffons and silk, I use a standard all-purpose Gütermann polyester thread. It's strong and fine, meaning that it won't snap, and it works well for lightweight fabrics. There are only a few cases

in the main spool and the bobbin; for example, to topstitch jeans or sew with shirring elastic. But for stitching silky fabrics, I recommend using the same thread for both. In fact, the most important thing when sewing with this type of material is not needle! To achieve a smooth, unpuckered seam, choose a

There's been a fair few Little Women adaptations over the years – seven to be exact! – but the eighth installment released on 26th December 2019 promises to be a unique take on Louisa May Alcott's classic novel. The trailer suggests ambition is set to be the focus of the film, a theme not only presented through Jo's rousing speech against gender constraints: "Women have minds and souls, as well as just hearts" – but also through the clothes created by Jacqueline and her talented team of sewists. I caught up with Jacqueline to glean a better understanding of how she made garments to reflect the big personalities of the forward-thinking 'little' women.

## "Women have ambition and they've got talent, as well as just beauty"

#### Jo March

Jacqueline is something of an inspiration to me; not only has she worked with one of my all-time favourite actresses Keira Knightley on three different films including *Pride & Prejudice*, (which I unashamedly admit I once watched twice in one day!), but she has also created some truly iconic costumes, most notably that silky emerald dress in *Atonement*. Her latest venture now sees her on the set of *Little Women*, the timeless story which follows the lives of the March sisters, Meg, Jo, Beth and Amy through the trials of love, marriage and in this adaptation, ambition. Jacqueline began by telling me how she interpreted the novel and script to create the costumes for the main characters.

#### Tell me a bit about the costume design process for *Little Women*?

"Regardless of whether it's a period or contemporary film, there's always the same key elements to consider in costume design: the script, and the input of the director, actors and the costume designer. Once this information has been gathered, the designer tends to get a feeling of the world they want to create and can start to marry these ideas with the director's vision.

"The research for *Little Women* started off with Victorian photographs and paintings, and talking to the director Greta Gerwig. After that, I started to pull my costume ideas together for the different characters. Sometimes the book is useful and sometimes it's not depending on what the director wants, but in this case it came in very handy, especially when showcasing the personalities of the March sisters."

#### In the film, the March sisters wear dresses that are different lengths and some are more form-fitting than others why is that?

"In the film there are two time periods: one where the girls are children and another where they're adults. When they are children, they wear shorter clothes as this allows them to be active and free, but Meg usually wears a longer skirt than Jo throughout the film as this shows that she is older and more grown-up, while Jo is a feisty, tomboyish character. Meg also has a kind of fairytale romanticism in her costumes; in fact, one of her dresses is inspired by an American impressionist painting. Beth on the other hand is quite fragile and delicate, but is also an important part of home life, so her look is quite gentle, whereas the youngest sister Amy is all about being as fashionable and fancy as possible."

#### The trailer ends on a scene with Jo wearing a bowler hat and men's jacket - would she have got away with this in the 19th century?

"It's actually a woman's bowler hat as they did wear them in that period, but I chose it because it looks like a male version - out of all of the hats Jo could choose from, she'd always opt for a man's. During the scenes where she's close friends with Laurie as a child (the boy next door played by BAFTA award nominee Timothée Chalamet), I also got the two characters to exchange garments; they both wear the same waistcoat and other items of clothing throughout the film. Jo wears a couple of boy's jackets too, but she doesn't go quite as far as wearing trousers, although she does show her bloomers!" laughs Jacqueline.

"I don't put Laurie into any clothes that are entirely female. but I think that there's a very strong bond between himself and Jo, and that's represented in the fluidity of their costumes."

#### Were the costumes hired for the film or were they all made from scratch?

"Making the costumes for Little Women was a monumental job! Because we needed a specific look for each of the characters, especially for the sisters and Marmee (their mother, played by Twin Peaks TV star Laura Dern), all of the clothes were made from scratch. On average, each girl had

ten costumes, which totals around 40, then Marmee had about another five, and of course there's the other principle characters, too - it was an enormous sewing project!

"On a period film like this, the amount of sewers depends on the budget. There's usually between four to 20 stitchers, but I've been in a workroom before with anything between two to 40 people."

#### The film has a star-studded cast, including Emma Watson, Saoirse Ronan and Meryl Streep - is there anyone you enjoyed working with most?

"I think what I enjoyed was the fact that all of the lead characters were young women - it was a pleasure to work with such huge talents! The whole idea that there's a possibility that you can make a popular film with all female leads, and a historical one at that, is amazing - it's a very fresh version of the novel."

#### Have you got any top tips for our readers on creating their own period style costumes?

"You should start by paying close attention to the details of the original garments from that era and purchasing the best reference books. One read that gives the clearest pattern instructions and descriptions of period costumes is Janet Arnold's Patterns of Fashion.

"On another note, your readers should know that there's always jobs for sewers, cutters and all kinds of inspiring makers in the film industry - there's definitely a space for people who love it!

#### Get started

Fabric (112cm) 
Iron-on interfacing
Buckle fastener, 55mm

1cm seam allowance used throughout, unless otherwise stated.

Work out where you would like the belt to sit, then add 20cm for the length. Measure the inside of your belt buckle to determine the width, double this and add 1cm for the seam allowance. Press the shiny part of the interfacing to the wrong side of the fabric, then mark and cut out the belt using the above measurements.

Pold the belt in half lengthways, right sides facing, and sew it together down the length of the fabric, then repeat. Move the seam to the centre and press. Stitch across one end and round off the edges, then trim the seam allowance.

3 Turn the belt right sides out through the open end, then thread the buckle through it. Fold the raw edge over to conceal the buckle, pin and stitch to secure, then press.

# Go wild with a statement LEOPARD PRINT BELT

Ace the animal print trend with **Chloe Hailwood's** three-step belt! This beginner-friendly project can be completed using straightforward techniques like machine-sewing, and should take you no more than an hour to whip up. To style this bold accessory, pair it with simple garments, like jeans and a plain white tee, to really let the leopard print roar!





#### Get started

Wool tweed, 50cm
Cotton lining, 50cm
Wadding, 50cm 

Leather, upholstery weight, 11cm x
45cm 

Thick cord, 1m

Magnetic bag clasp
Snap fasteners

Download the template from **sewmag.co.uk** and cut two bag outers from tweed. Pin face up on wadding and zig zag stitch around the edges before trimming the wadding to size. Cut two outers from cotton lining, two flap pieces from tweed and one flap from wadding.

Pin the flap pieces right sides together with the wadding at the bottom. Sew the curved section using a 5mm seam allowance. Clip the curve and turn out, so the wadding is sandwiched in between the tweed. Topstitch the curve 5mm from the edge, then mark the flap centre 3cm up from the curve. Fit half of the clasp to the mark, so the back is hidden by a layer of tweed.

Tack the raw flap edge to the top of one outer, right sides together. Place the other outer face down on top, then pin. Sew the sides and bottom edge with an allowance large enough to cover the zig zag stitches, but don't sew the corner notches. Fold the corners so the side and bottom seam lines match, then sew across the notches to create a flat base. Turn the bag out and fold the flap over the top. Mark the position of the clasp and fit the other half to the bag front.

# Replicate a French classic with the OH-SO-EASY KELLY HANDBAG

**Corinne Bradd's** homage to the Parisian handbag has been reinvented in celebration of one of the silver screen's all-time style goddesses, Grace Kelly. Made with its distinctive trapezium shape, this exclusive project is a chance to practise your lining and leather-sewing skills, enabling you to stroll down the boulevards with your very own quintessential creation.

Cut two leather strips, 5cm x 45cm. Round the c ends and fold in half lengthways around the cord, securing with a binder clip. Sew the edges, leaving a 3cm gap at each end. Pierce holes 3mm in from the edge and hand-sew, or use a zipper foot and leather needle in a machine. Trim the cord ends, flatten the unsewn rounded ends and pierce holes 3mm in around the circumference. Hand-stitch the handles to both sides of the bag, either side of the flap position.

Sew the lining in the same way, but leave a 10cm gap along the bottom edge for turning. With right sides together, slip the lining over the bag and line up the top edges, then fold down and encase the handles and flap. Sew the top edge, then turn the bag out through the lining gap. Fold in the raw edges of the gap and topstitch. Slip the lining inside the bag, press and topstitch the top bag edge.

Hand-sew snap fasteners to the top corners of the bag, 1cm down from the edge and 3cm in from the side seam, so the sides can be pinched together and fastened, or opened to allow extra capacity. Decorate the bag by cutting a 7mm wide leather strip and threading it with charms, then looping it around the handle.

Pressing your chosen fabric is key to a professional finish when bag-making, but you'll need to keep a close eye on temperature if you go for tweed or woollens. Before you start, cover the material with a pressing cloth or piece of muslin, then gently iron it in short bursts to prevent any scorching.

# Santa Claus is coming to town with a **Let It Snow Sack**

#### Get started

Red velvet, two, 30cm × 40cm
Plain or printed cotton, two, 30cm × 40cm
Six-stranded embroidery thread, white
Chalk pencil
Roller frame
Cord, 1.5m
Two wood beads

Size 28cm × 38cm

You can't have Christmas without a special bag for all the presents! And with the festive season upon us, **Susie Johns** has created the perfect solution with this embroidered sack. The bag uses a super simple fern stitch that can be used for both straight and curved lines, which makes it ideal for embroidering this festive slogan and the simple snowflakes.

#### Embroider the design

Download and print the motif and template at **sewmag.co.uk**. Trace the design onto one velvet piece. Draw on the design using a light-coloured chalk pencil that will show up against the red. Attach the fabric to the embroidery frame.

Using the six strands of embroidery thread, sew the snowflakes; the design shows the central lines of the fern stitch. Vary the number of stitches and the spacing to make each snowflake different.

Bor the lettering, use three strands of thread and fill in the shapes with satin stitch. When the embroidery is complete, remove the fabric from the frame. If necessary, press the material on the reverse.



A roller frame consists of two roller bars and two side bars; this holds the fabric in place while you sew and helps to maintain an even tension – it's a very handy gadget for this project! Make the sack

Fold the whole piece in half, right sides together, along the bottom seam.

Match the other two seams on either side. Sew the side seams with a 1cm allowance, leaving a 3cm gap on the main fabric, 4cm below the seam line where the lining joins the main fabric.

3 Turn right sides out, fold under 1cm on the raw edge of the lining and slip-stitch the folds together; this forms the bottom seam of the lining. Push the lining inside the bag. Topstitch around the top of the bag, through all layers and in line with the top and bottom of the 3cm gap in the side; this will form the casing for the drawstring.

YOU CAN USE FERN STITCH FOR BOTH

STRAIGHT AND CURVED LINES

Cut the cord in half to produce two equal lengths. Thread these through the casing, then push the two ends of each cord through a bead and knot the ends together.

#### **Fern Stitch**



Bring the needle out at A - on the line and a little way down from the top – then insert it at B, at the top of the line.



Bring the needle out at C, which is a stitch length to the left and in line with the midpoint of the first stitch. Now re-insert it at A.



Bring it out on the opposite side of the line at point D, then re-insert it at A; this completes a single fern stitch. Continue in this way, making a stitch along the central line, then one on either side in a V shape.

# Create a smart and sophisticated **KIDS BOW TIE**

The festive season is in full swing, which means plenty of parties and events are coming up – and there's no reason why your little ones can't look as dressy as you! Introducing **Susie Johns'** sweet bow tie which you can whip up in a plain fabric or striking print to match their outfit. Plus, the strap is adjustable which means that kids will not only look smart, but they'll be ultra comfortable, too.



Download the templates at **sewmag. co.uk**, then measure and mark out the tie pieces. For the bow, you need two rectangles, 13cm x 26cm, and for the strap, two rectangles, 4cm x 67cm.



Carefully cut out the templates, as well as two pieces of fusible interfacing, 6.5cm x 24cm. Place one piece of interfacing directly in the centre of each bow tie.



Place the baking parchment on top of the interfacing, then press the fabric. Fold the two long edges of each piece towards the centre and along the edge of the interfacing on each side, then press.



Take the two ends of each piece and bring them to meet in the centre, then press. On each side, machine-stitch down the centre of each folded piece to hold the ends in place. With right sides together and the neat sides facing out, hand-stitch down the centre with a small running stitch.



Wrap the thread around the centre, pulling it tightly to form a bow shape. To make the bow centre, cut a rectangle, 9cm x 12.5cm. Fold the piece in half, right sides together, and stitch down the long edge with a 1cm seam allowance. Press the seam open.



Turn right side out, then position the seam down the centre of one side and press. Leave this to one side while you make the strap. Join the two pieces along one short edge with a 1cm seam allowance, then press the seam open.



Fold the strip in half lengthways, right sides together, and sew down the length with a 1cm seam allowance. Trim the seam allowance, then turn the strip right side out with a loop turner, and press the strap.



B Insert one end of the strap through the ring on the hook. Double the end back on itself, tucking the raw end under. Pin and oversew the edges together. Thread the other end of the strap through the buckle and the ring, then back through the buckle.



Double the end back on itself, tucking in the raw end. Pin and oversew the edges. Place the bow in the centre of the strap. Wrap the bow centre around the middle of it, with the ends overlapping on the other side of the strap. Fold the ends under and stitch.

Making a narrow fabric tube can be fiddly, but the task is easier if you use a loop turner – a long metal pin with a ring on one end and a clip on the other. Insert the loop turner into the tube and attach the clip to the end of the seam, then pull it back through the tube.

Fabric: red, turquoise, grey print; four fat quarters, coordinating print; backing material

Use a 5mm seam allowance for the pockets and 4mm for the binding, unless otherwise stated.

Download and print the templates from **sewmag. co.uk**. Take a printed fabric and place the pattern horizontally. Measure 50.5cm across the bottom edge and mark, then fold it in half vertically and mark the top centre. Draw two lines from the top to the ends of the straight line to make a triangle, then cut out. Apply interfacing to a piece of the owl print fabric, containing 11 single owls and one pair.

2 Cut four rectangles, 7cm x 10cm; one landscape rectangle, 7.5cm x 9.5cm; one large rectangle, 10cm x 11.5cm, from red fabric. Cut four rectangles, 7cm x 10cm; two landscape rectangles, 7.5cm x 9.5cm, from turquoise fabric. Crease 5mm up both sides and across the bottom, fold the top over twice, then iron and sew across the top seam. Repeat on all the pocket pieces.

3 Cut 12 white circles from a different fabric and apply interfacing. Lay out all of the pocket pieces, pin, then attach 2cm wide strips of the grey fabric using interfacing. Stamp each number in black ink and leave to dry.

Assemble each pocket in turn, stitching the white circles first. Place the number raw ends of the landscape rectangles just underneath the circle. For the portrait and large rectangles, slip the raw end underneath the owl. Sew around the numbers using red thread on the turquoise pockets, and vice versa. Stitch the owls using navy thread.

Machine-sew scallop stitch part way around the owls, and complete a line around the outside of the white circles. Press the wrong side of the pockets, then pin and sew each one onto the main tree triangle. Iron the wrong side.

twice, and navy thread to sew over it once. Iron the wrong side, then pin right sides together at the bottom middle edge of the tree. Stitch a 5mm seam, then press it open on the wrong side.

Cut wadding and backing fabric slightly bigger than the tree. Turn the tree right side up, place the wadding and backing fabric wrong side up underneath. Quilt each pocket and sew a 4mm seam all the way around.

Barrie the excess material, then sew the bias binding all the way around the raw edges. Cut a separate 15cm of binding and fold in half lengthways. Sew across the top of the grey fabric, folding in the raw ends, then embellish with red buttons to cover the joins.

Qut a large snowflake from the white circle fabric and apply interfacing. Use white thread to attach it to a circle of red material, cut slightly larger, and add scallop stitches. Cut red fabric and wadding slightly bigger than the snowflake, then pin together with the wadding in the middle.

Use red thread to sew around the edge of the red fabric, then trim away the excess and sew bias binding all the way around, folding in the edge as you finish. Attach a large red button to the middle of the snowflake. Add a loop of ribbon to the back for hanging.

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# Sleigh-ride into festive crafting with our NORDIC GNOMES

According to Scandinavian folklore, this friendly creature appears on Christmas Eve accompanied by a mythological Yule goat, knocking on people's doors and handing out presents. Although we can't guarantee that **Chloe Hailwood's** Nordic gnome will surprise you with gifts, the project makes great use of fabric scraps, will see you practise whipstitch, and is a wonderful addition to any mantelpiece.

### Fabric: printed cotton, 25cm square; faux sheepskin,

Get started

Schrisquare, laux sileepskin,
Scm x 12cm; felt, 25cm x 30cm
Iron-on interfacing
Toy stuffing Tailor's chalk
Pom-pom Two pipe cleaners
Dry rice
Smm seam allowance used throughout, unless otherwise stated.

.....

Download and print the templates from **sewmag. co.uk**, then snip two body pieces and mark the arms and legs on the right side of one piece. Press interfacing to the reverse of the cotton and sheepskin. Cut out two hats, one beard, one nose, two arms and two legs.

With right sides facing, fold the legs in half lengthways and stitch the long raw edges together. Turn the fabric to the right side. Move each leg seam to the centre and press. Repeat for the arms, leaving the seams as they are, then thread a pipe cleaner and stuffing into each one.

Cut eight rectangles of various fabrics, 4cm x 6cm. With right sides facing, pin together two rectangles and draw a mitten. Repeat with another mitten and two boots, then stitch over the drawn lines, leaving the top of each one open. Trim the pieces and turn through.

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With right sides together, sew the two long edges of the hats. Turn through, and attach a pom-pom to the tip. Cut the nose from felt, and complete running stitch all around it, 5mm from the edge. Gently pull the thread to gather



the felt, fill with stuffing, then tighten the thread and secure.

Take the marked body piece, right side up, then pin and tack the arms and legs in position. Place the second body on top of the first, with right sides down. Sew from the neck to where it turns inwards, leaving the bottom open. Carefully sew over the arms so the needle doesn't hit the pipe cleaner.

#### Dashing Through the Snow

This fat quarter bundle from The Craft Cotton Co. features dreamy winter patterns such as snowflakes, reindeer and pine trees. £9.99, woolwarehouse. co.uk

With right sides inwards, add the base to the bottom of the body. Pin, tack and stitch the perimeter, leaving a 5cm gap at the back. Turn the body through the gap and remove the tacking from the arms and legs. Fill with stuffing and four tablespoons of dry rice to add weight, then whipstitch the gap closed.

Fill the mittens and boots with stuffing, adding rice to the boots. Cut four sheepskin strips, 1cm x 6cm, and sew to the tops of the mittens and boots, trimming any excess. Stitch the mittens and boots to the arms and legs. Place the hat on the top of the body. Secure the beard, then attach the nose so that it's peeking out under the hat.

# Snuggle under the covers with our PATCHWORK QUILT

Invite the festivities into your home with **Corinne Bradd's** cosy mini quilt made in five merry and bright prints. This beginner-friendly make is not only a super speedy project, it's also great for improving your sewing skills when it comes to creating patchwork, perfecting topstitching and attaching bias binding.

#### Get started

● Fabric: assorted fat quarters; white cotton; plain coloured cotton ● Lightweight wadding

Download and print the layout grid from **sewmag. co.uk**. From each of the four darker shades, cut rectangles, 9cm x 17cm. From the lightest print and plain white cotton, cut several 9cm squares. Ensure the fabric designs are the correct portrait orientation when cutting the material.

Arrange the rectangles in the form of our layout grid or create your own design, then add the lighter squares above and below each one so that they alternate. Sew each square to the top or bottom of each rectangle with a 5mm seam allowance.

Pair up the adjacent strips and sew into blocks. Assemble the quilt, matching up the seams where necessary. Press all of the seams to one side before layering the completed quilt top onto wadding and plain white cotton backing fabric.

Topstitch the layers along the vertical seam lines only. Trim the wadding and backing to the edges of the quilt top and zig zag stitch to temporarily bind. Cut several 4cm wide strips of plain coordinating cotton and sew along the edges of the quilt back, matching the raw edges and mitring the corners.

Turn the binding to the front of the quilt and fold under 5mm along the raw edge. Pin and topstitch the folded edge of the bind to the front of the quilt, 2mm from the fold.

Avoid fabric waste when cutting rectangles in the same direction by sewing the leftover pieces together across the middle.

#### t's almost the end of the year and like most people, my thoughts reflect back on the things I hoped and planned for, and what I accomplished and sadly did not.

I launched three new fabric collections this year with The Craft Cotton Company and I'm really starting to feel like a designer. I've certainly spent enough time using other people's material to understand what I want from them, but it's always a totally different experience when you're creating something from scratch. Ideas must be narrowed down and focused, compromises are inevitable and decisions must be made. Working with Hobbycraft, John Lewis and a host of independent retailers along the way has also been a joy and I can't wait for more adventures like these next year. I haven't yet travelled to Korea to see the fabrics in production, so that is definitely something on my wish list for 2020 which I'll be sure to share with you. I'm already exploring Korean food in preparation – you know how much I love to cook!

#### Always Evolving

Seeing my name on the selvedge of a bolt of fabric is every bit as thrilling as seeing it on a book spine, and this year I released my third book, *Simple Shapes, Stunning Quilts*, with Pavilion. I love every kind of sewing task but quilting will always be at the top of my list. It was brilliant fun to design 100 new quilts using shapes that are easy to cut and piece but still produce beautiful results. The greatest satisfaction you can experience as a teacher is to pass on skills that will bring someone else a lifetime of fun and creative expression. Simple, achievable steps are key to feeling

confident and in control, but most of us want our first attempts to look stunning and not like a beginner project. It's definitely possible to achieve seamless results the first time around, but it starts with the right pattern and materials. I wish I could go fabric shopping with every one of you! I certainly had a ball at Festival of Quilts this year helping friends old and new to find the perfect piece. I also experienced the fun challenge of signing 1,500 books in one sitting. I wouldn't have believed I could misspell my own name but I think I managed it once or twice that day! I'm already working hard on my next title.

#### New Beginnings

I'm particularly enjoying exploring new directions, types of fabrics and tools. I've discovered and rediscovered a few crafts, too. After years of writing myself off as a hopeless flower arranger, I've found new hope with artificial flowers and a glue gun! It's realising that skills like colour sense and having an eye for balance can 'cross pollinate' from one craft to another and although I've got a lot to learn, I'm loving the results so far. I've also revisited the slow and steady joy of cross-stitch, and taking a little time out every day for a spot of embroidery has really

helped to create some much-needed relaxation in my life. Also, after months of planning I've finally got the first instalments of my YouTube channel up and running! I might have confessed this before, I'm a total technophobe and although I love the immediacy of social media it's taken me a long time to get to grips with it. Be sure to subscribe and watch my weekly videos on Stuart Hillard Makes. At the moment there's a mixture of big quilts, bags, skill-building quilting techniques and pro tips, but I'm planning to add some knitting and cookery in the new year, too. If there's something you'd like to see, please alert me. Our gloriously diverse and global community is constantly changing and with new crafts, ideas and directions, it's sometimes hard to know whether to stick to our path or venture beyond. We all have UFOs we had planned to finish this year but perhaps didn't. Knowing what to keep and what to park for another day is a constant battle for any creative person but, for me, it's all those things I've yet to do that fuel each new day.

## Ser a STAR CUSHION

Download and print the templates from **sewmag. co.uk**. Cut out the star from two coordinating organic cotton knit pieces, taking care not to stretch them as you do so. Lay each star onto cotton wadding, right sides up. Pin and zig zag stitch to the wadding around the edges, then cut away the excess wadding on both pieces.

Cut 4cm wide coloured cotton and join end to end to make a continuous strip. Pin and stitch the strip around the edges of one of the stars, right sides facing, ensuring the angles are kept sharp.

Pin the remaining star to the other edge of the cotton strip, matching up the points of the two stars first. Sew in place, leaving a 6cm to 7cm wide gap on one straight section for turning.

Turn out the cushion through the gap and use a large knitting needle or similar to push out the points fully. Firmly stuff with fibre filling, then fold in the raw edges of the gap and slip-stitch closed.

## Create a BAUBLE POT HOLDER

Cut several 3.5cm wide strips of different organic cotton knit prints that are at least 26cm long. Join right sides together on the long edges to create a panel that's around 52cm wide. Pin the panel face up onto cotton wadding and topstitch along all the seam lines.

Download and print the templates from **sewmag. co.uk**. Draw around the template on top of the quilted fabric. Zig zag stitch all around the circle to bind the edges to the wadding, then cut away the excess. Place the circles back to back, ensuring the quilt lines run in the same direction.

3 Cut several 3cm wide pieces of coordinating cotton and join end to end to make a continuous strip. Take another strip, 3cm x 20cm, and fold in half lengthways, right sides together. Sew down the long edge and turn out to make piping. Flatten the tube and fold in half. Pin this loop to the top of the pot holder, matching up the raw edges, then tack in place.

Take the remaining 3cm wide strip and sew around the edge of the circle, right sides together, with a 5mm seam allowance. Tuck under the short ends of the binding. Turn the binding to the other side of the pot holder and fold over the raw edges. Fold in 5mm along the edge and slip-stitch down, securing the hanging loop as you do so.



## HOME & GIFTS

## Make a CUP COSY

Download and print the templates from **sewmag. co.uk**. Layer an organic cotton knit rectangle face down onto plain cotton. Place this over a rectangle of wadding and pin the beaker template to the stack. Cut out the slightly curved shape and sew around the edges, leaving a gap in one straight side.

Turn out the cosy and push out the corners with a knitting needle. Flatten the shape, turn in the raw edges of the gap and topstitch all around, 2mm in from the edges. Cut two 3cm felt circles and oversew them to a mask shape that's trimmed from a lighter shade of felt. Add details to the face with embroidery thread. Cut two ears from darker coloured felt. Pin the ears and mask to the centre of the cosy; make sure the tops of the ears extend slightly. Oversew this to the cosy through all the fabric layers for security.

Snip two white elastic pieces, 2.5cm x 5cm, and sew securely to the inside of both ends of the cosy at the top and bottom so the sleeve can be slipped over a beaker.

## Make Lennie THE LLAMA

Download and print the templates from **sewmag**. **co.uk**. Cut two llama shapes from organic cotton knit, reversing one so it can be sewn with the other. Place each piece face up on cotton wadding and zig zag stitch around the edges to secure before cutting away the excess wadding.

Sew the llamas right sides together, leaving a gap along the back of the shape. Clip the curves and corners and turn right sides out using a blunt knitting needle to push the seams out. Flatten the shape and topstitch a 9cm line up from the indent of each leg.

Firmly stuff the llama with fibre filling, using the topstitched divide to give the impression of pairs of legs. Make sure the neck is well padded so the head doesn't flop. Fold in the raw edges of the gap and slip-stitch closed.

Cut four ears from organic cotton knit, pair up right sides together, and pin onto wadding. Sew around the edge leaving the bottom open, then trim away the excess wadding. Turn out and fold in 5mm along the bottom raw edges. Slip-stitch the folded edges to the top of the head.

5 Cut two 3cm felt circles and oversew them to each side of a mask shape, trimmed from a paler shade of felt using embroidery thread. Add the nose, mouth and eye details with thread before oversewing the face to the front of the head. Snip a 13cm felt circle and add a pompom trim. Fold the circle in half and pin over the back of the llama. Oversew the resulting saddle to the toy. Dolly's Haberdashery & Sewing School, Warrington Visit dollyssewingschool.co.uk

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## SEWING **IDE** Get to grips with the dressmaking basics!

THE PERFECT FIT

The key to successful fitting is taking accurate body measurements to ensure you get the right size. Pattern sizes aren't the same as high street clothing sizes, so don't be tempted to skip this stage. Once you've taken your measurements, compare them to those on the pattern envelope or Size It Up panel over the page, then you can make any necessary alterations

Cut out the paper according to the size closest to the measurements you have selected, choosing the best fit (for dresses, blouses and jackets) in the bust and shoulder, as this area is harder to adjust. If your waist or hip measurements are out of proportion according to the standard pattern size, then simply graduate in or out to reach the relevant waist or hip lines to your size.

 Measure yourself in your underwear, preferably in the bra you will be wearing. Use a new tape measure as they can distort out of shape over time. Ask a friend to help

you, especially with tricky measurements such as your back-neck to waist and height. Be honest with

your measurements and remember that pattern sizes are totally different to ready-towear high street sizing. Use your measurements to

help you adjust the pattern to fit your shape, not forgetting to take the required amount of ease into account

## TAKING YOUR **MEASUREMENTS**

HIGH BUST

FULL BUST

WAIST

HIPS

Measure while in the underwear you will be wearing and hold the tape measure comfortably snug, but avoid pulling tight.

HEIGHT Standing against a flat wall without wearing shoes, measure from the floor to the top of your head.

HIGH BUST Measure directly under the arms, straight across the back and above the bust. FULL BUST Take the tape measure around the fullest part of your bust and straight across the back.

**WAIST** Tie a length of narrow elastic around the waist and let it settle naturally at your waistline, then measure over it. Keep the elastic handy for future garments.

**HIPS** Measure around the body at the fullest part. This is usually 18-23cm below the waist. Sew our swishy available for FREE at

## **READING A PATTERN**

The basic markings you will find on commercial dressmaking patterns are important to familiarise yourself with. These marks indicate various techniques or steps and are best transferred onto your fabric pieces once you've cut them.



**MULTIPLE SIZE CUTTING LINES** 

These lines indicate dress sizes. Highlighting yours can help with cutting.

#### GRAINLINE

Align this mark with the grain of the fabric i.e. parallel to the warp (see below).

#### FOLD LINE

This mark indicates that the pattern piece should be positioned along the fold of the fabric, creating a larger 'mirrored' piece.



#### **BUST/HIP INDICATORS**

Located at the bust and hip points on the pattern — make any necessary adjustments if yours don't fall there.

#### LENGTHEN/SHORTEN HERE

This is an opportunity to customise the pattern to your preferences.

#### MISCELLANEOUS MARKINGS

These come in a range of sizes and are used as points of reference on a pattern to indicate where pieces should be placed.

TUCKS AND GATHERS Bring these lines together

before stitching.

#### HIGH BUTTON / BUTTONHOLE PLACEMENTS These indicate where buttonholes

should be made on a garment.



NOTCHES Match two pieces of fabric together at these points.

## **SIZE** IT UP

Once you have your body measurements, choose the closest size from the chart below. Remember, there will be variations depending on which fabric and pattern you choose, so always make a toile first.

"To make double patch pockets, lay the fabric right sides together, then cut two rectangles slightly larger than the finished pocket.

Make a template of the finished pocket. Make a template of the finished pocket and draw around it with a chalk pencil or soluble marker on the wrong side of the double layer. Machine-stitch along the drawn line, leaving a gap in one straight side. Trim the seams before turning out; you will find that the curved edges are more stable and the pocket will not stretch out of shape while attaching it to the garment." MAY MARTIN, SEWING PERSONALITY

#### PLACING YOUR PIECES

With the paper pattern pieces facing up, place them onto the fabric. Some will need to be placed on the fold of the fabric (where it's folded in half, giving you a mirrored piece), which will be indicated on the individual pattern pieces. Most patterns offer a layout guide for the placement, according to the width of your fabric. This helps you get the most from your fabric, and avoids wastage.

Pattern pieces that are not indicated to be placed on the fold need to be put on the material with the grainline arrow running parallel to the selvedge. Measure the distance from one end of the arrow to the selvedge, repeat for the other side of the arrow, and move the pattern piece until both measurements are the same.

#### UNDERSTAND YOUR FABRIC Getting to grips with yo

Getting to grips with your fabric is a fundamental part of sewing. Before you start, familiarise yourself with:

**WARP** These are the yarns that run the length of the fabric. They are stronger than weft yarns and less likely to stretch. **WEFT** These run over and under the warp threads across the fabric from selvedge to selvedge.

**BIAS** The bias grain runs 45° to the warp and weft of the fabric. Cutting garments on the bias creates a finished piece that will follow the contours of the body.

**SELVEDGE** The non-fraying, woven edges that run parallel to the warp grain is the selvedge.

## Style Story THE CAPSULE WARDROBE

Reduce your fashion footprint with a curated closet

According to environmental organisation Greenpeace, worldwide we chuck away 80 billion pieces of clothing each year. With this daunting figure in mind, it's apparent that the term 'less is more' has never rang more true; we need to make sure that the few items hanging in our wardrobes are going to last - enter, the capsule closet! This term was coined in the 1970s by London boutique owner Susie Faux when she noticed that people were spending too much money on clothes which were poorly-made and ill-fitting, and would likely be chucked away before the following year. So Susie invented the capsule wardrobe: a collection of essential, timeless and transitional pieces that would last for decades. Thanks to designer Donna Karan, this idea caught on in America when she showcased a Seven Easy Pieces collection to the public in 1985, which featured versatile skirts, trousers, jackets, jumpers and shirts that transformed into multiple outfits

Although Susie's goal was to streamline closets with high-quality,

perfectly-fitting pieces which could be mixed and matched to your heart's content, today it serves other purposes, too. It reduces the amount of clothing that ends up in landfills and can save a pretty penny, too. Now you know what a capsule wardrobe is, shall we see it in action?

#### Less is More

In 2010, entrepreneur Courtney Carver started Project 333 with the motto: 'Dress with Less'. The scheme asks you to pick 33 items of clothing, accessories, outerwear and shoes to wear for three months, and store any clothes that you don't choose out of sight – and mind! At the end of the three months, you might find that all 33 items transition into the next season or that only a few will – in which case, add pieces to your capsule collection until you reach 33. Eventually, you'll discover which clothes are perfect for you all year round.

Other capsule wardrobe whizzes include Anuschka Rees, the clothes-savvy author of *The Curated Closet*, and That's Not My Age blog founder Alyson Walsh. Anuschka's book helps you polish your personal style and create a refined wardrobe, whereas style icon Alyson champions slow fashion by shopping sensibly and donating pre-loved clothes. #### Waste Not, Want Not

"Well, I stitch so I don't buy any new clothes!" we hear you say, but dressmakers aren't immune to the clutches of waste. First things first, select a pattern that will stand the test of time; Log-on to sewmag.co.uk to pair together an outfit before you sew. As for the material, collections like Dragonfly Fabrics' eco-linen and STOFF & STIL's organic fabric are excellent choices, as they were shortlisted for the 'Best eco-friendly product' in our British Sewing Awards. We're also advised to prewash fabrics to prevent shrinkage, stop colours running and make tough materials like denim softer to stitch, but to be environmentally friendly, use a green detergent like Ecover or pop some marigolds on and wash by hand.
