'You're 32-going-on-12,' I giggled.

It was Christmas morning 2017, and Lisa was just as excited as she'd

been when she was a little girl.

I was only 14 months younger than her. Growing up we'd been as thick as thieves, playing tricks on our big sister Kelly-Ann, 36.

But me and Kelly-Ann were tomboys and Lisa was the girly girl.

HIS REAL NAME *Little Lady Lisa.* Her birthday was 19 December, so Christmas was $\frac{1}{2}$ her favourite time of year. In November, she'd deck her her favourite time of year. TYLER' house in tinsel and lights.

This year, as usual, we

were staying with our mum Agnes, 62, and dad Peter, 64.

There were also Kelly-Ann's two children, Mason, then 8, and Charlie, 4, and Lisa's two, Olivia, 8, and 6-year-old Tyler.

A right squeeze!

But some family traditions never die. Like alcopops at midday and staying in our PJs until mid-afternoon.

Then we'd pile into the living room to watch the kids open their presents. Lisa loved playing with their

toys almost as much as they did! She lived for Olivia and Tyler. Such a fun mummy. Running round the park with

them, crawling down the slides at our local soft-play centre...

She didn't care what other people thought!

Our family has just one wish for next year

pplying my mascara, I glanced at the pregnancy test beside me. Three minutes had passed – and in a few moments, I'd know if I was going to be a mummy again. Taking a deep breath,

I turned it over and saw one distinct line.

And one that was faded. Unsure what that meant, I threw the test in the bin.

Tried to put it out of my mind and enjoy what was left of 2018.

Just to be safe, though, I wouldn't drink tonight. 'But it's New Year's Eve!' my partner Kyle,

22, protested. 'I'll drive instead.' I smiled. Besides, I'd not drunk last New Year, either. See, in December 2017, I'd been seven months pregnant with our son, Lucas-Jay. At first, the pregnancy had been fine.

But at the 19-week scan,

the sonographer noticed something wrong.

'He has hypoplastic left heart syndrome,' she said, explaining that it was a

birth defect preventing the left ventricle from developing properly.

Sadly, that meant his chance of survival was just 50 per cent.

Devastating.

Still, we clung to the hope that he'd make it and we'd be able to bring him home to meet his sister Hallie-Mae, then nearly 2. As soon as he was born at St Mary's Hospital, in Manchester, on 20 February 2018, Lucas-Jay was whisked away and put on 100 per cent oxygen.

But that's when doctors discovered one of his major heart valves was blocked.

It meant that heart surgery was far too risky, there was no way

he'd survive. There was nothing else doctors could do. Heartbroken, Kyle and I agreed to take Lucas-Jay off his machines. But first we

cuddled him, took photos and arranged for Hallie-Mae and our family and friends to say their

hellos and goodbyes. And at 9 hours old, as we cradled him in our arms, Lucas-Jay passed away. My heart shattered.

Even after we buried him, in a

tiny coffin, it wasn't like we could move on.

At home, there were constant reminders. Teddies he'd never play with. Tiny sleepsuits he'd never wear.

We were consumed by grief – and for a few months, we were convinced that we'd never have another baby.

But, deep down, we dearly wanted a sibling for Hallie-Mae.

So, in July 2018, we asked our doctors about the risks.

They assured us that it was unlikely to be a genetic issue, and said that there was only a two per cent chance of our future children developing the same condition.

So, nervously, we decided to try again.

And up until New Year's Eve 2018, we'd had no luck. One negative pregnancy

test after another.

That night, my mind was on what 2019 would bring for our family.

And in the morning, I took another test, waited the eternal three minutes and...

'I'm pregnant!' I told Kyle, jumping into his arms.

Seeing our bundle

on screen at an early

seven-week scan, I smiled for the first

time in months.

'Our rainbow baby,' I beamed.

A miracle.

At 14 weeks, we learnt that we were having a girl.

Two weeks later, at another scan, I asked

family. But we were constantly on edge, expecting her to fade away. Yet, as days went by,

Ivy-Rose grew stronger. She started feeding from a bottle, breathing for herself. Incredible!

And when Ivy-Rose was 3 weeks old, we were able to bring her home.

For a few days, we had some level of normal family life.

'Do you want a cuddle with your baby sister?' I'd ask Hallie-Mae, and she'd eagerly reach out her arms.

But at the start of October, Ivy-Rose's condition deteriorated and she was moved into Brian House Children's Hospice, in Blackpool.

Now she's back on feeding tubes, and oxygen when she needs it.

We see her struggling but we also see her fighting, and that gives me hope.

Kyle and I have had tests which have ruled out a genetic link to the condition.

Still, we're too brokenhearted to contemplate

hearted to contemplate ever trying for another baby. It's all just a terrible twist of fate. The truth is that 2020 might be the year we lose Ivy-Rose. Our precious rainbow baby. But we're not ready to give in yet – and this New Year, we're praying for another miracle. for another miracle.

I want lots more precious cuddles with Ivy-Rose

doctors to check her heart... That's when we found out that her heart was missing

the lower left ventricle. 'This can't be happening

again,' I sobbed.

Doctors explained that, this time, there was a 75 per cent chance of survival.

But then, at 20 weeks, another scan revealed that our baby's pulmonary vein was obstructed.

Like history repeating itself. So, at 28 weeks, we were referred to Evelina London Children's Hospital, to see if anything could

be done. And an MRI revealed our baby girl had a problem with her lungs called lymphangiectasia.

It meant that, again, surgery was out

TRUE-LIFE TRAGIC SHOOT-OUT

Who fired the bullets that killed Officer Hawkins?

police officer had just finished Christmas Eve dinner with his family when he got the call. Aubrey Hawkins, 29, received a report of a suspected robbery at a nearby sports shop on

24 December 2000. He'd been with Irving Police Department, Dallas, for just over a year. Was a devoted family man and a dedicated police officer.

'I'll see you in the morning, honey, I love you,' he told his wife Lori and 9-year-old son as he raced away from the restaurant where they'd been eating with relatives.

But as he reached Oshman's Super Sport USA minutes later, he came under a barrage of gunfire in his police car.

He was shot 11 times.

The gang robbing the shop were prisoners who'd broken out of a Texas prison two weeks earlier, after storming remote woodland caravan

a guard tower and driving off in a prison truck with stolen weapons.

Now they'd turned those weapons on Officer Hawkins.

As he lay wounded in his police car, they pulled him out. Ran over his body, dragging it at least 10 feet, before they sped off in a getaway vehicle.

Manhunt launched

When Officer Hawkins' wife Lori heard a knock on her front door later, she thought it was carol singers.

Instead, the authorities had come to tell her that her husband had been killed, that Christmas Eve.

The gang had escaped with over \$70,000 (around $\pounds 55,000$) and 44 more guns they'd seized from the shop.

A manhunt was launched. But it was a month before the gang was apprehended – more than 1,500 miles away in Colorado Springs.

They'd been holed up in a

park since New Year's Day. **Disguising themselves** with hair dye and by growing facial hair, they'd posed as a group of devout Christians.

But one of their neighbours tipped off the authorities after seeing their mug shots on TV show America's Most Wanted.

Police caught three gang members as they ventured out to a convenience store.

George Rivas, 30, had been serving 17 life sentences for armed robbery and kidnapping offences before he'd masterminded the gang's escape from Connally Unit, near Kenedy, South Texas. Officials dubbed him 'the most dangerous man in Texas'.

Captured with him were two convicted murderers, Michael Rodriguez, 38, and

Joseph Garcia, 29. Within hours, cops caught a fourth man, Randy Halprin, 23,

who'd originally been jailed for injuring his girlfriend's child. A fifth gang member, convicted rapist Larry Harper 37, shot himself to death in the gang's motor home as police surrounded it. The two remaining gang members, Donald Newbury, 38, and

Facing trial

After his capture, ringleader George Rivas reportedly expressed remorse for having shot Officer Hawkins.

Patrick Murphy, 39, were

later cornered at a motel.

Months later, in August 2001, Rivas was the first of the gang to face trial.

The court heard he'd been dressed as a security officer when he led the robbery, which was planned like a 'military operation'.

The escaped convicts were each armed with two pistols.

After raiding the shop, they tied up the employees and were leaving when



Hawkins showed up.

The officer was shot 11 times, with six bullets hitting him in the head.

'He drove right into an ambush,'

prosecution lawyer Toby Shook told the court.

In a 21-page confession made after his capture, which the judge ruled the jury could hear in court, Rivas admitted firing at least five shots. He took responsibility for the robbery.

But his defence team told the jury he wasn't guilty of

murder, as they said he never intended to kill Officer Hawkins. Defence lawyer Wayne Huff said Rivas took care with the robbery plan because he didn't want to cause injuries

that would attract more press attention. 'The last thing they wanted was more heat,' he

told the court. 'They could have shot

and killed those employees if they had wanted to.'

Huff said Rivas had simply been attempting to disarm Hawkins when the other convicts had suddenly started firing at the police officer. **Rivas** himself

Officer Aubrey Hawkins

claimed that, as he neared Hawkins' vehicle, he thought he saw the officer reaching for his gun.

Bulletproof vest

'Please forgive me but I shot through the windshield and hit his right shoulder,' Rivas said in his confession.

He claimed he opened fire on the officer again in response to what he thought were shots fired by the policeman – and that he'd directed at his upper body because he knew he'd be wearing a bulletproof vest.

He also said he hadn't realised Officer Hawkins had been run over until he heard the evidence in court.

WHAT'S THE VERDICT?

GUILTY

n 21 August 2001, George Rivas was convicted of murdering Officer Aubrey Hawkins.

During his sentencing hearing the following week, Rivas blamed his life of crime on a childhood blighted by abuse.

But forensic psychiatrist Dr Richard E Coons testified that Rivas was a career criminal who continued 'business as usual' after killing Officer Hawkins, and said that he could not be rehabilitated.

After being sentenced to death and put on death row, Rivas was executed by lethal injection in Huntsville, Texas, on 29 February 2012. Looking at his wife through a glass screen, he mouthed 'I love you' as the lethal drugs began working through his system just after 6pm. Rivas was the

second gang member to be executed for his part in the murder.

The other gang members were all convicted in separate trials, with Michael **Anthony Rodriguez** executed in August 2008. Donald **Newbury was** executed in February 2015 and Joseph Garcia in December 2018. **Randy Halprin**, now 42, and Patrick Murphy, now 57, remain on death row.

There'd been tears as we held them tight.

'But I'll be OK,' I'd smiled. 'I'll have the op in the new year.' So, I'd tried to carry on as normal.

Still wrapped presents, put them under the tree. And now, here

we were, in the

midst of the festive joy. But I was struggling to feel excited or merry. *Will I be here next year?*

Cancer was an unwanted guest but I desperately tried to put it to the back of my mind.

I did my best to enjoy the dinner, the gifts and the games.

And as others counted down to New Year, I counted down to surgery. On 2 January 2019, I

finally had a lumpectomy. Surgeons removed the tumour and some tissue surrounding it.

In March, I started chemo, then radiotherapy. Sick and exhausted, I hated my kids seeing me so weak. Thankfully, all the gruelling treatment ended in August. I was relieved.

Yet, as we moved into the autumn, I just couldn't relax. I feared the treatment hadn't worked, that I might still have cancer. But as we approach

Women's confidence peaks during their 50s

study has shown that women are most confident during their 50s** – so much so that they feel more self-assured than men during this time.

esearch has found that pet owners who smoke are harming their pets' health, as they are passively exposed to nine cigarettes per day, or more than 3,000 a year, on average.***

'Cats that live with smokers are about twice as likely to develop a malignant lymphoma, and dogs that live with smokers are 60% more likely to develop lung cancer,' says vet surgeon Dr Robert J White-Adams.

How can we prevent his bed-wetting?

My little boy is 7 and still wets the bed. We're staying with friends at Christmas – is there a way to guarantee a dry night? Giselle, Derby

It's possible that 🚮 sleeping in a strange bed might actually keep him dry, as he'll sleep more lightly and is more likely to wake for a wee. And you can reassure him that around one in 10 children still wet the bed at this age.

But your best bet is to ask your GP for desmopressin. This drug mimics the action of a natural hormone, ADH, which cuts the amount of urine that your kidneys produce, and a tablet at bedtime will usually ensure a dry night.

He should stop drinking at least an hour and a half before bed, and avoid fizzy drinks or caffeine. You can also try waking him for a wee when you're on your way to bed. Have a happy – and

dry – Christmas!

Mixing meds with booze

I've started antibiotics for a chest infection and I'll be taking them over Christmas. How dangerous would it be to have just a sip of alcohol? Vanessa, Falkirk

The idea that alcohol is dangerous with antibiotics is almost entirely a myth. It may comes from the earliest days of penicillin, when the drug was so precious that doctors collected the urine of patients who'd been

given it, in order to recover the penicillin to use for someone else. Alcohol interfered with this recovery process, so patients taking it were asked not to drink.

However, there are a few antibiotics, such as metronidazole, which do react with alcohol, so check the information leaflet, or ask your GP or chemist.

Of course, overdoing booze isn't a good idea, anyway, especially if you're ill. But you should be able to enjoy a drink with your turkey!

MULTI-MILLION BANK HEIST

n 20 December 2004, a gang stole the equivalent of £26.5m from the headquarters of Northern Bank in Belfast.

The night before, armedgang members had taken the families of two senior bank officials hostage, ordering them to go into work as usual the next day, and to let them into the offices that evening.

Despite various arrests, the case remains unsolved, with just one man convicted of money-laundering charges in relation to the stolen cash. The

Police Service of Northern Ireland has claimed the paramilitary organisation the IRA were responsible, but it has denied any involvement.

fter chatting on a dating site, teacher Katie Locke, 23, met Carl Langdell (right) on Christmas Eve 2015. He'd told her he was a lawyer with his own firm.

The pair went to Theobalds Park Hotel in Hertfordshire, where Langdell strangled Katie to death and sexually assaulted her. Katie's body was dumped in a bush near a skip, in the grounds of the hotel.

Katie had been unaware that Langdell had spent the previous two years suffering from worsening mental illness.

In 2016, Langdell, then 26, pleaded guilty to murder and was jailed for 26 years.

- 1kg diced stewing steak or brisket
- 3 onions, roughly chopped
- 2 carrots, peeled and roughly chopped
- 2tsp ground cumin
- 2tsp sweet smoked paprika
- 1-11/2tsp chilli powder, to taste
- 3 sprigs of thyme

- 2 x 400g cans chopped tomatoes
 - 1¹/₂tbsp Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 large green pepper, deseeded and chopped
 - Lime wedges, large handful of coriander leaves and chopped jalapeño chilli peppers, to serve (optional)

For the dumplings:

- 200g self-raising flour
- 90g polenta or cornmeal
- ¹/₂tsp caster sugar
- 90g cold butter, grated

Preheat the oven to 160C/Gas 3. Heat 1tbsp oil in a casserole over a medium heat and brown the beef in 3 batches; set aside. Heat the rest of the oil in the casserole and cook the onions for 5 mins. Add the carrots and cook for 4 mins more. Add the cumin, paprika and chilli, and mix well. Add the thyme, tomatoes and 2 cans of water. Return the beef to the pan with the Worcestershire sauce. Bring to the boil, then cook in the oven, covered, for 3½ hours, or until tender. Add the green pepper for the last 4 mins of cooking.

2To make the dumplings, mix the flour, polenta, sugar, butter, ¹/₄tsp salt and 8tbsp water to make a thick, sticky dough. Roll it into 24 balls.

3Set the dumplings on top of the casserole, cover with a tight-fitting lid and cook on a fast simmer for 15 mins. Serve with lime wedges, coriander leaves and chopped jalapeños.

WHAT IS AVAXHOME?

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Tangerine-glazed gammon The boozy marinade will get everyone in the festive mood.

SERVES 12 PREP 10 MINS COOK 2 HOURS

- 2.5kg smoked gammon joint
- 1 onion, quartered
- 1 carrot, halved
- 2 bay leaves
- Few sprigs of thyme
- Few black peppercorns
- 500ml cider
- For the glaze:
- Grated zest and juice of 1 tangerine
- 4tbsp redcurrant jelly
- 1tbsp runny honey
- Itbsp Dijon mustard
- 1 tangerine, sliced
- Bay leaf, to garnish

Put the gammon in a very large pan. Add the onion, carrot, bay leaves, thyme and peppercorns. Pour over the cider and add enough cold water to cover the gammon. Bring to the boil and simmer, covered, for 1 hour 45 mins (allow 30 mins per kg plus 15 mins). Turn off the heat and leave the gammon in the cooking liquid for a few hours (this will make the meat lovely and moist as well as easier to handle).

2Preheat the oven to 200C/Gas 6. Lift the meat into a roasting tin. Peel away the rind and score the fat in a diamond pattern.

3To make the glaze, combine the grated tangerine zest and juice, redcurrant jelly, honey and mustard in a pan. Heat to melt the jelly, then smother over the fat. Roast the joint for 20 mins. Arrange the tangerine slices on top and roast for a further 10 mins, until golden. Garnish with a bay leaf.

Roasted vegetable lasagne Bursting with colours and flavour, this is a veggie dish everyone will love tucking into.

SERVES 6 PREP 10 MINS COOK 1 HOUR 10 MINS

For the roasted veg:

- 3 peppers (1 red, 1 yellow and 1 orange), deseeded and chopped
- 4 courgettes, cubed
- 2 aubergines, cubed
- 2 red onions, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- Few sprigs of oregano, plus extra, to garnish
 2then elive eil
- 2tbsp olive oil
- For the cheese sauce:
- 60g butter
 60g butter
- 60g plain flour
- 600ml full-fat milk
 100g vegetarian Parmesan, grated
- 200g Cheddar, grated

For the other layers:

- 125g fresh lasagne sheets
- 350g jar whole cherry tomato and basil pasta sauce (we used Saclà)

Preheat the oven to 220C/ Gas 7. Put the peppers, courgettes, aubergines, onions and garlic in a roasting tin. Season and sprinkle with some of the oregano leaves. Drizzle with oil and roast for 30 mins, until the vegetables are tender.

2 To make the cheese sauce, put the butter, flour and milk in a non-stick pan and season to taste. Heat and whisk the mixture together until it is thickened and smooth, then stir in half of the Parmesan and Cheddar cheeses.

3Cook the lasagne sheets according to the packet instructions. Reduce the oven temperature to 200C/Gas 6.

4 In a 2.5-litre shallow lasagne dish, layer up the roasted vegetables, tomato and basil sauce, lasagne sheets and the cheese sauce. Sprinkle with the rest of the Parmesan and Cheddar. Cook for 40 mins. Finish with oregano to garnish.

Mushroom, chestnut and greens pie Colourful, comforting Christmas flavours...

SERVES 6 PREP 20 MINS, PLUS CHILLING COOK 1 HOUR 30 MINS

- 500g shortcrust pastry
- 15g dried porcini mushrooms
- Itbsp rapeseed oil
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 sprigs of thyme
- 2 leeks, sliced
- 3 garlic cloves, crushed
- 800g mixed mushrooms (we used chestnut, closed cup and chanterelle), roughly chopped
- 200g bunch of spring greens, trimmed and sliced
- 180g pack cooked and peeled chestnuts, roughly chopped
- 1½tbsp polenta
- 1 small egg, beaten

Grease a 2kg loaf tin. Cut 2 sheets of foil, 1 the length of the tin and the other the width, both with overhang. Fold each over to make thick strips about 5cm wide. Set them into the tin to make a cross, to help lift out the pie. Roll the pastry out to about 1cm thick and line the tin, leaving a little excess pastry over the sides. Cut out extra strips about 2cm to go around the edge. Cut out a rectangle of pastry for the lid, about 4cm wider than the tin. Use any excess pastry for leaves to decorate. Chill for 30 mins. Preheat the oven to 200C/Gas 6. Line the pastry with foil and fill with baking beans; blind-bake for 15 mins. Remove the beans and cook for 15 mins.

3Soak the porcini mushrooms in enough boiling water to just cover them; set aside. Heat the oil in a frying pan and cook the onion for 5 mins. Add the thyme, leeks and garlic. Cook for 5 mins; set aside. In the same pan, cook the mixed mushrooms for 5 mins, or until soft; place in a colander over the sink for 10 mins to drain. In a bowl, cover the greens with boiling water for 4 mins, then drain and rinse. Drain and chop the porcini mushrooms.

In a large bowl, mix the greens, all the mushrooms, the leek mixture and chestnuts. Season well. Sprinkle the polenta in the pastry case and add the filling. Brush the sides with egg and stick the pastry strips round the edges, brush with egg, add the pastry lid and pierce 2 holes in the middle of it. Pinch around the edges to seal. Stick on the pastry leaves and glaze with egg. Chill for 30 mins. Bake for 30 mins.

Top tip For a nonveggie twist, try adding chopped, fried smoky bacon to the filling!

Top tip

Make this a week ahead and freeze. To cook from frozen, just add 15 mins to the cooking time.

Sausage roll wreath A show-stopping centrepiece that's sure to go down a storm!

SERVES 12 PREP 10 MINS, PLUS CHILLING COOK 35 MINS

- 500g all-butter puff pastry
- 3tbsp wholegrain mustard
- 1 egg yolk, beaten, to glaze
- 8 pork sausages, skins removed

- 1tbsp mustard seeds, lightly crushed
- Rocket leaves and cherry tomatoes, to garnish

Roll out the pastry to a rectangle about 90cm x 20cm – save the trimmings to make decorations. Spread the mustard in a strip down the centre. Brush around the edges of the pastry with egg yolk, then put the skinned sausages in a straight line along the mustard. Roll the pastry around the sausage strip, then shape into a circle, using a little egg yolk to secure the ends. Transfer to a baking tray. 2Brush the pastry with egg yolk and decorate with shapes made from any pastry trimmings. Chill in the fridge for 30 mins. **3**Preheat the oven to 200C/ Gas 6. Glaze the pastry again and sprinkle over the mustard seeds. Bake for 35 mins until golden. Serve warm or cold with rocket leaves and cherry tomatoes piled in the middle.

iling woolly hats and gloves into a bag, my son Daniel had never made me prouder. Hand in hand with his little girl Lucy, then 4, they made for the front door. Dusk was setting in, the wind snarling as the temperature dropped. It was a freezing evening in December 2016.

'Keep warm,' I said, waving them off.

But Daniel and Lucy weren't worried about themselves. By handing out thick clothes, they were on a mission to keep the homeless of Manchester warm during Christmas.

I was brimming with admiration. Always had been when it came to Daniel. He'd been my rock, even caring for me when I had uterus cancer in 2011.

Soon after I was given the all-clear, we'd had more good news.

'I'm going to be a dad,' Daniel had beamed. Lucy became Daniel's world from the moment she was born in August 2012.

He had a brilliant job in the Department of Education, was in a band, and loved combat sports. But all that went on the back burner when he became a father.

Though he split from Lucy's mum in spring 2016 and moved back in with me, he still saw his girl every weekend and at least once during the week.

Never let her down. At the beginning of 2017, plans were already forming for that Christmas.

'We need to start collecting hats and scarves again,' Daniel told Lucy.

Seeing him helping her draw pictures or hearing about the newest Disney toy he'd bought her, I could watch them for hours.

'Two peas in a pod,' Lucy my daughter Kimberley, seen 31, laughed. But. though

But, though Daniel was at his happiest when he was with Lucy, he was battling something beneath his smile.

You see, he'd been diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes, aged 8. Since then, he'd needed insulin injections four times a day.

He had Addison's disease, too, a condition affecting the

adrenal glands. He lived off a cocktail of medication and steroids.

But Daniel never complained, at 8 or at 35 – he always saw the positives in his life.

His infectious laughter echoing through the house, no matter what he was going through.

It's why he felt compelled to reach out to those less fortunate than himself, especially at Christmas.

On 4 May 2017, Daniel arrived home from visiting Lucy. As always, when he'd seen his daughter, he was

beaming, telling me about a new pink towel he'd bought her for their swim that weekend.

'I'm off to bed, Mum,' he said a few hours later, kissing my cheek.

The next day, I called up the stairs to wake him for work. Usually, he'd moan it was too early.

Only, this time, my calls

were met with silence. 'Daniel?' I called again, straining my ears for the sound of footsteps or the quilt shuffling.

But there was nothing. Climbing the stairs, I knocked on the door. *Silence*. As I opened the door,

my eyes fell on my darling boy sprawled out on the floor. It was clear Daniel was dead.

Holding him in my arms until paramedics arrived, my mind whirred.

My son had gone to bed his normal self, excited for another weekend with Lucy.

Now he was dead at 35. He'd died from rare complications of diabetes. Lucy's mum broke the news to her, but she was so young.

As she laid an orange

rose – Daniel's favourite colour – on his coffin during the funeral, my heart crumbled into pieces.

But I knew I couldn't lose myself in grief.

I had to keep his bond with Lucy strong, ensure he lives on in our memories.

'Nanny, can we still help the homeless?' Lucy asked a few months after Daniel's death. She was only 4, but her maturity and generosity shone brightly.

We'd found a stash of warm clothes Daniel had started saving specially, in his room.

Holding back tears, I agreed we'd carry on Daniel's mission. So, weeks before Christmas 2017, we visited the many people living on Manchester's

city-centre streets. In doorways, under cold bridges and at bus stops. 'Your daddy would be proud,' one man said when we'd told him about Daniel and handed him a coat. And he really would.

NIGHTMARE BEFORE CHRISTMAS

he house in Covina, Los Angeles, USA, was alive with the buzz of old friends and family, hugging and catching up. It was Christmas Eve 2008. Just like every year before, a celebration was underway at the home of retired couple Joseph and Alicia Ortega.

Their daughter Sylvia was in dire need of some festive cheer. Her two-year marriage to Bruce Pardo, 45, had recently ended in a bitter divorce.

Amid the festivities in Covina, a group of **25** family and friends, including the kids, called a group of 35 relatives in Mexico. The huge group chat was a family tradition.

Moments after the call ended, there was a knock on the front door. Was it someone

else come to join in the celebrations?

With a smile on her face, the Ortegas' granddaughter Katrina Yuzefpolsky, 8, opened the door. It was Santa, his red suit enough to light up any child's face.

But excitement turned to horror.

For Santa had two semi-automatic guns... Shooting the child in the face, he stepped

over her and barged into the party. The monster in the costume

was Bruce Pardo, Sylvia's ex-husband. Intent on 'revenge', he sprayed the room with bullets.

Panic ensued, with people smashing windows to get out and cowering behind furniture.

One girl, 16, was shot in the back, while a woman, 20, broke her ankle when she jumped from a window.

Neighbour Jan Gregory saw a teenage

boy fleeing, shouting, 'They shot my family!'

Moments later, the house was on fire, with flames shooting 50 metres in the air. Pardo had torched the home with a DIY flame-thrower.

Fire crews raced to tackle the inferno, rescuing any

survivors they could. But, tragically, they found nine bodies - Sylvia, Alicia and Joseph were among the dead.

> Hours later, Pardo's body was found at his brother's home, 40 miles away. He'd shot himself after suffering third-degree burns.

Pardo had carefully planned the attack, even rigging his car with ammunition to explode on Christmas Day.

Through his actions, Bruce Pardo had killed nine people, and left 13 young children either orphaned or bereaved that terrible Christmas Eve.

EVIL GROOMING IN THE GROTTO

ith open arms, he'd welcome children into his twinkling grotto at the shopping centre. **Pensioner Ronald C McDonald**

had played Santa for more than 25 years.

Posing for photos and handing out gifts, he was well-known in Lake Forest Park, Washington, USA.

With his white hair and wire-rimmed glasses, children called him Santa all year round.

He'd walk down the street with kids thronging around him. But, as the festive season approached in 1997, the neighbourhood was rocked by the news he'd been arrested. He was accused of twice raping a little girl, 6, in his home.

McDonald immediately confessed - said he'd also abused seven other children

over several years. Claiming remorse, he admitted using his work in Santa's grotto to groom victims.

'Please God, why didn't I see anything?' asked one neighbour.

He'd abused children over several years

who'd trusted him enough to name him as guardian for her children in her will. In court in November 1997. **McDonald**, then 71, and his family

requested the longest sentence possible. He was given **26** years, six months.

Later, he confessed to abusing a total of 45 children since 1937, but he was never convicted of further offences. **McDonald**

died in prison in

n Christmas Day 2011, a young woman tapped out a text message: We just got here and my uncle is here. too. Dressed as Santa. Awesome.

No one expected Fatemah's ex Aziz Yazdanpanah, 56, to appear at the apartment in Grapevine, located between Dallas and Fort Worth, Texas, USA.

two guns Yazdanpanah and Fatemah had separated nine months earlier. Since, she'd found jobs at spas – after years of not working, at her controlling husband's insistence.

Shortly after her first text, Sara typed another about her uncle: Now he wants to be all fatherly and win father of the year. Then,

as the family gathered to exchange gifts, suddenly Yazdanpanah, still dressed as Santa, pulled out two guns.

At 11.34am, the police received an emergency call from inside the apartment. A man's voice told the operator 'I'm shooting

people', while cries of cries of 'Help, help!' could be heard in the background.

Arriving, the police found dead bodies around the Christmas tree. Yazdanpanah had shot his entire family before killing himself.

Family friends suggested he'd been jealous of his wife's success without him.

Just hours before the killings, the Zarei and Yazdanpanah families had hosted a Christmas Eve party. The dozens of loved ones enjoying the party with them couldn't have imagined it would be the last time they'd see them alive.

of meningitis.

In need of intensive care, I'd been taken to Royal Perth Hospital, here in Australia. And now I was just waking up from a coma.

'You've been asleep for 10 days,' Chloe explained. It was 5 January 2018. How can that be true? But looking down at my body,

the truth was undeniable. A purple rash plastered my chest. My arms from the elbow, and legs from the knee, were jet black.

'You were swelling up quite severely, so we had to slice your calves and forearms open to relieve the pressure,' my doctor said.

I felt sick at the thought. Then a gut-wrenching



realisation struck me hard. I'll need my arms and legs amputated, I thought. And I was right. At first, they said it would just be my fingers and toes. But as the weeks passed, the weight of my charcoalcoloured limbs told me everything. I was half-dead. In February 2018, I was

transferred to Fiona **Stanley Hospital** for surgery.

'I'm so sorry, son,' Mum cried. All my family were devastated. But I knew I had no choice, that it

was my limbs or my life. And I had to

be strong for my daughters. 'OK, let's just

get on with it,' I said, sternly. When Willow and

Matilda came in to the ward to see me, I hoped they wouldn't be scared.

Matilda was a bit wary at first, but as Willow looked from my face, down to my black limbs and bandages, she smiled.

And after the surgery, Willow was still an angel.

'Time for dinner,' she'd say cheerily, hopping on to my bed and spoon-feeding me hospital grub. Chattering away about the

tricks she'd taught Freckles as if nothing had changed! She gave me the mental

strength I needed to carry on. After 12 different

operations, I started rehab in March 2018.

I learnt how to use a wheelchair, how to get myself around without my arms and legs.

It was exhausting and very painful.

Mum and Chloe were trained by nurses to change

my bandages. They were given tips on how best to adjust the house for my ease. But I was terrified of becoming a



burden, and I felt like a child again.

'I'll be back to doing things myself as soon as possible,' I vowed.

'We'll help you out, whether you like it or not,' Mum promised.

By April, I was finally back at home.

My life had been so different the last time I was living there.

Now, I needed help with eating and washing myself.

But in October 2018, a prosthetic arm made everything easier.

I didn't need to bother Mum or Chloe to pick up the TV remote or open a door.

When the girls came to stay, I was able to play a bit more with them, too.

I was feeling positive. I hoped that, by Christmas, we could all start making fresh, happy memories.

But, sadly, we lost our Pops, my grandad, on Boxing Day.

Two years of awful, devastating luck.

But just like always, our family rallied around one another.

And somehow we pulled each other through.

Now, I'm getting stronger every day.

Once I get my prosthetic legs fitted, nothing's going to stop me.

I just hope this year will be the best Christmas yet.

But that doesn't mean getting mountains of presents or spending hundreds of pounds. More importantly, we'll be

> as a family. Traipsing through the wrapping paper on the floor or laughing at Willow, now 5, and Matilda, 3, chasing Freckles around the garden.

They're the moments we've been missing.

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From missing to BURNERE BEHIN

The pretty teenager went out to celebrate Christmas and never came home

n Christmas morning 1995, Robert and Gillian Smith should have woken up to a morning of opening gifts with their son Richard, 20, and daughter Louise, 18.

Then they'd planned to head off to celebrate with

relatives nearby. Instead, Robert and Gillian awoke to every parent's worst fear.

The door to Louise's room ajar, her bed still made. She'd not come home.

The night before, Robert had dropped his daughter, an office worker, at a friend's house before she'd gone on to party with pals at

Spirals nightclub in Bristol. She'd been due back home hours ago.

Gillian suggested that Louise may have stayed over at a friend's house – but when this was ruled out, panic set in.

None of her friends had seen her since the early hours.

Louise was a quiet, shy girl who still cuddled up to Gillian during nights in at home. There was no reason why she might have run away – especially at Christmas time. The anxious Smiths called the police.

And, instead of opening presents and sharing Christmas greetings, they watched in horror as officers searched their home. When no clues were



turned up, an urgent investigation was launched. Spirals' security camera

had captured Louise leaving, alone, at 2am. Afterwards, there was an hour-long wait for taxis in the freezing cold.

So, Louise had decided to walk the 10 minutes home.

It was a route she'd taken many times before. Yet, this time, she'd just vanished.

Days later, Louise's father and brother gave a press conference, pleading for witnesses.

As days passed with no word, a volunteer

army of 10,000 people aided the police with the search. *Missing* posters showing Louise with her smiling face and auburn hair covered

the local area. Officers went to Spirals

witnesses. But it seemed that no one had any information.

Then, seven weeks after Christmas, on 17 February 1996, Louise's family got the news they'd dreaded.

Two teenage boys had found a body, hidden on a slope halfway down disused Barnhill Quarry.

It was just half a mile away from the family's home.

Forensic tests confirmed it was Louise. It appeared she'd been raped and strangled. Gillian broke down,

crying, 'No, it's not my Lou!' Louise's funeral was held at the end of March, and St Mary's Church in Yate was packed as hundreds

came to say their goodbyes. Afterwards, she was buried in the churchyard.

When the grieving Smiths visited Louise's grave, they yearned for answers.

Pictures of Louise were still all over town – only now, the posters said *Murdered*.

During the investigation, the police visited 10,500 homes, interviewing more

soon, he changed his plea, sparing Louise's parents from having to sit through a trial.

A charge of rape was allowed to lie on file.

David Frost was jailed for life in 1998.

But Louise's family were disgusted that, due to Frost's age at the time of the killing, and the apparent remorse he expressed in court, his sentence was set at a minimum of 14 years, meaning he might be free by the age of 36.

They were also dismayed after the 4,500 DNA samples collected in Louise's case, at a cost of £250,000, were destroyed, rather than being used in other investigations. Believing that it was a

> waste of police time and resources, the couple lobbied politicians.

In 2001, the Government passed a change in the law, allowing the

police to retain DNA samples collected during investigations, with the person's permission, to create a database.

Louise's parents Robert and Gillian won MBEs for their tireless campaign.

Yet nothing could bring back their daughter – or truly ease their suffering.

For the Smith family, it isn't only Christmas Day that will never be the same again.
