And at the Craftsman-style bungalow of Joanne Duong Bartels and Luke Bartels in San Francisco, an expansion and renovation meant enlisting their crew of friends and creative community to contribute art, objects, and furniture to craft a space with meaning and soul.

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# Nature Works

At Sarah Sherman Samuel's work studio in Grand Rapids, Michigan, an expansive wall of glass sets the mood.

In a wooded ravine, interior designer Sarah Sherman Samuel built a modern office just steps from her home to cultivate productivity and inspire creativity. The crux of the structure: a soaring glass wall that maximizes views, featuring Marvin's Modern Multi-Slide door as the dramatic main entrance. Ahead, Samuel shares the details that made it all come to life.

#### LOOK TO THE ELEMENTS

The color palette for the interior is limited to white, black, and earthy tones to create a calming "blank" canvas. Samuel brought her natural surroundings inside, using her view as inspiration to integrate raw elements, such as wood and concrete, for a zen-like effect.

#### WALLS WITH FUNCTIONS

The entire back of the office features eight feet of cabinets to hold the bulk of storage. An adjacent wall acts as a display for pinup sketches, materials, and finishes from Samuel's ongoing projects—a process the designer prefers to help her see everything together. And the remaining walls will be used as a revolving gallery for her ever-changing personal art.

#### FIND THE RIGHT LIGHT

The designer brought in rust-colored velvet chairs to complement the built-in desk that sits flush with the base of a 12-foot Marvin Modern Direct Glaze window. Positioned northeast, it lets in abundant morning light that's diffused rather than distractingly direct. In the winter, the views go on for miles, while in the summer and fall, it's all leaves and greenery.



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Renovation at its core is about celebrating change: visualizing rooms that don't yet exist, peeling back layer after layer of wallpaper, and even finding inspiration in iconic spaces from the past (hello, Halston's 1970s showroom). Looking to what's new luxe fabrics, cool hardware, and even the latest tech design are more stylish than ever—pushes us to follow that impulse to refresh our surroundings and dream big.

### Here Comes the Sun

It's easy to look on the bright side with a stylish upgrade.

What's a design lover to do when a room has no windows to speak of? That's the predicament decorator and lifestyle blogger Shavonda Gardner faced with the sole bathroom in her 1940s Sacramento, California, home. Unable to open up the walls, she dreamed of installing "the biggest skylight I could possibly fit in there," but almost five years passed before she finally took the plunge, motivated by an online design challenge. Enter Velux Skylights's solarpowered fresh-air design.

Less than a day of installation was all it took before Gardner saw natural light filling the space. An added bonus: The skylight opens via a smartphone app, drawing moist air out (and bringing the breeze in) after a shower, and automatically closes at the first sign of rain. When it's bright out, customizable blinds throw some (welcome) shade—all of which happens via solar energy.

"My bathroom was very boring before," Gardner explains. "It was all white, which is definitely not my style." Bringing in a skylight inspired her to embrace bold colors and patterns. Think: lush monstera-print wallpaper, dramatic black tiles, and a vanity with Lucite hardware. Sometimes, finding a window of opportunity changes everything.

### Find the Common Link

As the number of smart home gadgets grows, keep in mind compatibility between the major tech players—Google Home, Amazon Alexa, and Apple HomeKit—and their respective voice assistants. That original doorknob might have an amazing motif that can be played up and inform how you approach a room, or maybe the floors have a history you want to keep. You can source tile from a space you love that may not be part of the home but still has a story behind it. I look for those details and how to subvert them or bring them back to life. What speaks to you? Follow that instinct

Giancarlo Valle

**New York City** 

Whether he's designing a plush, tapestry-covered chair or an entire home, it's clear that Giancarlo Valle considers each a part of a larger whole. Practicing architecture for 10 years before expanding into furniture and interior design gave him a broad range of influences. "I look at the designers, places, and eras that exist in the fray," he says. "People who are open to chance and not afraid of possible mistakes."

#### FLIP THE SCRIPT

It might seem like reverse logic, but sometimes we design a whole room around an artwork, such as a blue color-blocked painting I had in a recent project that inspired us to paint the rest of the space the same hue. You can source a piece but not necessarily know where it will go right away.

#### **GIVE IT GRAVITAS**

I always like to be reminded of the weight of a building and really accentuate that quality. Renovated historic homes might have lost that feeling, but you can bring it back by emphasizing the thickness of a doorway or the depth of a window, or exposing the beams. I also love interior window shutters to give a sense of scale.

#### BRING IN THE OLD

We don't install vintage hardware everywhere, but if we find two amazing handles, we'll use them under the kitchen or bathroom sink. Or we go on eBay or to estate sales, find a bunch of pieces (say, 200 knobs), and see how they can work together. Mixing and matching vintage looks best; it gives such a unique feel to a space.

## Louisa Pierce & Emily Ward

Despite boasting a roster of celebrity clients, from Leonardo DiCaprio to Dakota Johnson, Louisa Pierce and Emily Ward take a down-to-earth approach to renovating, using their creative skills to make a statement. They've mastered the art of patternmaking on walls, floors, and furniture often in a vibrant palette. "We consider terracotta, rose, and green to be neutrals," says Ward.



#### DO MORE WITH LESS

We love the idea of rethinking smaller areas in a really special way, like a 6-by-6-inch flower pattern on a floor made with wood hexagon tiles in different stains. You might not have the budget to do the whole room, but you could do an entryway. The same goes for a backsplash: If we can't afford marble, we'll use beadboard that can be painted any color.





#### STYLE YOUR TILES

We've been getting adventurous with grout colors and cool combinations, like a tan or golden grout with a black-and-ivory hexagon stripe tile. We also make our own patterns with penny rounds. Even just laying regular subway tiles a different way, such as a graphic stripe, adds visual interest.

### Mason St. Peter

**Los Angeles** 

Architect Mason St. Peter exemplifies this decade's take on effortless California style. He is behind the much-loved General Store (cofounded with his wife, artist Serena Mitnik-Miller, with whom he released the book *Abode* earlier this year) and makes a compelling case for paring back to reveal the soul of a space. "There are often too many choices, too many distractions," says St. Peter. "I do my best to focus on one goal and stay the course."

#### LEVEL UP

If you can't add square footage and space is limited, expose more of the floor, walls, and ceiling to create the perception of having extra room. Lift the furniture off the ground—especially at the perimeter walls—and take away unnecessary shelves, trim, or sconces.





I feel most at home in nature. When I design a space, I try to bring the tactile qualities of that experience and keep the essence of the thing wood, marble, stone. The connection is there.

#### LET CURIOSITY LEAD

The process of removal can be satisfying and rewarding. If you're transforming an older space, you might be surprised at what you find—wallpaper, tile under carpet on concrete, a window within a wall. It all depends on your willingness to take chances. If a room has an attic, remove the ceiling. If it's dark, paint it white.



Jessica Helgerson

Portland, Oregon

Known for her thoughtful renovations of Pacific Northwest homes, Jessica Helgerson layers patinaed accents and custom inlays over a foundation of natural materials. Details, such as intricate millwork, are both earthy and luxe. In her hands, a space's limitations can be something to celebrate. "I've learned to love low ceilings," she says. "Ugly lights are depressing, but dark, pretty beams? Cozy and welcoming!"

#### GO WITH BUILT-INS

Our family lived in a tiny house for a few years, and our sanity saver was deep, comfortable seating built up against the walls. (I even have a dedicated hashtag: #JHidBuiltins.) It maximizes space and lets you fit a lot of friends into a relatively small room. Also, builtin cabinets are more efficient and more beautiful than a closet.





#### LIGHT THE WAY

Though we look to the era of the house for permanent things, like cabinetry and finishes, we're not creating period stage sets. I love to layer on fun, modern lighting. In rooms with plaster ceilings and crown molding, we often add a plaster rose where a central fixture will be to make it "grow" organically out of the ceiling rather than dangle abstractly.

#### SPA-IFY YOUR SPACE

When working out bathroom floor plans, we prefer a square rather than a long, skinny rectangle to avoid the bowling alley effect of having to line everything down one wall. And if there's a beautiful view, we give it to the tub for a nice design moment. People want bathrooms (and kitchens) to be pretty, not just purely utilitarian.







#### STREAMLINE SURFACES

Built-in, floor-to-ceiling bookshelves are great, especially when painted to match the walls. The books recede that way and add so much information and possibility to a space. I use Shaker hooks in almost every project and install them along a wall in the same color. They're so practical for hanging coats but also canvas bags filled with whatever you might need to store.

# Cabin Cozy

When actors Zosia Mamet and Evan Jonigkeit completely refreshed their upstate New York home, the woodsy surroundings inspired almost every corner.

**A FEW YEARS AFTER** buying their Hudson Valley cabin in 2014, actors Zosia Mamet and Evan Jonigkeit knew they wanted to give it a major update. When they're not working—post-*Girls*, Mamet is shooting a musical series for the new video content platform Quibi, while Jonigkeit has a handful of films coming out in 2020—the couple heads to the property as a welcome escape from Manhattan. "It's a big, wonderful house, but it had an L-shape kitchen, so you couldn't have two people in there at once," explains Mamet. "That room was the impetus for our renovation." The building had undergone additions twice previously, and the pair loved the existing footprint, so they decided

to simply streamline the layout and open up the space more. "We wanted to stay true to the rustic feel and original 1920s structure," Mamet adds. When the contractor dropped out a few months into the project, Jonigkeit called on artist friend Sean Roach (the two built theater sets together in college), along with interior designers Brett and Kara Phillips of High Street Homes, to help complete the update—which included "chinking" (sealing the gaps between the logs, a process Jonigkeit mastered by watching YouTube videos); adding an infrared sauna room; and installing a 12-foot sliding glass door that opens out onto the nearby lake for the ultimate immersed-in-nature moment. In the breakfast nook, Jonigkeit built banquettes with storage underneath and had cushions custom-made on Etsy. Pendant lighting keeps things warm and inviting on winter mornings.





Meaningful artwork—like the Sean Roach painting of textbooks from an acting class he and Jonigkeit took together that hangs in the dining room—adds an extra personal touch.

#### DRESS UP YOUR SPACE

On any given night, you might find Fulk sporting a three-piece plaid suit or a floor-length wizard's cape—always worn with unironic fabulosity. That playful sense of style translates to St. Joseph's interiors, where powder pink taper candles perfectly match the velvet club chairs, and oversize paper flowers (by artist Tiffanie Turner) are like the ultimate statement boutonnieres.

On Fulk: Suit *maisonkitsune.com*. **WHEN KEN FULK INVITES YOU** to a Catholic cathedral for a cocktail, he's not being playful. Although the San Francisco designer and entertaining mastermind is known for his twinkly-eyed wit as much as his *more-more-more!* sense of scale, Fulk does, in fact, mean church.

Named for the patron saint of workers, St. Joseph's was built in 1913 and served the gritty South of Market community until 1989, when a 6.9-magnitude earthquake violently shook the structure (and the Bay Area), leaving the Romanesque-revival parish deserted and in disrepair for almost three decades. "When I first walked in three years ago, there were tens of thousands of pigeons. You'd move your foot and...whoosh!" Fulk says with a laugh, making a *flutter-flutter-flutter* sound. "The walls were black and smoosh-y. It had this decrepit grandeur to it, like in Havana or Sicily."

Still, it would take a visionary (and self-avowed OCD-level doer) to lead such a massive renovation project. Fulk worked not only with the National Register of Historic Places (the 22,000-squarefoot building is landmarked) but also state and local agencies. "Everything we did had to be run by all three!" he says. Reopened in late 2018 as St. Joseph's Art Society, the deconsecrated space has been completely reimagined as a members' club-and Fulk's fingerprints are everywhere. California roses grown to his specifications seemingly sprout from every surface, their perfume wafting up to the soaring, 130-foot molded concrete ceiling. Life-size bears (papier-mâché works from famed Belgian taxidermists Jaap Sinke and Ferry van Tongeren) stand watch from the curved balcony. The eight lounge areas are swathed in 600 yards

Opposite: Adding a mezzanine proved to be the biggest renovation challenge. "It was important to have more usable space in the voluminous building," explains Fulk. "But anything new had to be entirely self-supporting and freestanding, without touching the original structure"—the idea being that the integrity of the historic church was left intact.

#### **RETHINK THE SEATING CHART**

"These days we can silo ourselves," says Fulk, commenting as much on guest lists as the state of the world. "We become these monolithic things, only associating with tech people or downtown artists or operagoers." To counter that instinct, he livens up the dinner table by placing, say, a well-known socialite next to a leather daddy. "That's much more interesting to me, and frankly it's more interesting for *them*," he says, laughing.

#### MAKE SPIRITS BRIGHT

To keep the drinks and conversation flowing, Fulk favors serve-yourself-style options, like the festive Paloma Rosa Punch (a house specialty, pictured on page 75, featuring tequila, ruby red grapefruit, rose water, and lime) or his own version of bottle service. Premade cocktail mixers—including his infamous margarita with a spicy salt rim—are iced down in glass bottles, allowing guests to fill (and refill) their glasses.

of Pierre Frey Le Grand Corail pink cotton fabric, while vintage finds from Fulk's career-spanning hauls at the Bloomfield Antique Show and the Paris Clignancourt flea market have been covered in tasseled velvets and silk shantung.

And that cocktail you were offered? It can be mixed at the main bar on the ground floor (built with gothic wood panels reclaimed from a Midwest church)—or *way* upstairs at the Rose Bar, a softly lit, four-seat mahogany nook off a spiral staircase next to the choir loft.

All this Technicolor splendor serves as a backdrop to an equally ambitious philanthropic mission: to give back to the community via a nonprofit foundation and a packed culture calendar, providing a salon-style environment to members (Fulk calls them subscribers, much like for the theater or symphony) that fizzes with cross-pollination across the arts, tech, food, fashion, and design. "We're continuing the church's vocation of bringing people together," he explains, "by elevating the shared human experience through conversation and creativity." The best way to do so? Throw a party—something he more than excels in, having defined his career by dreaming up unforgettable events.

"I've learned that from the moment the first guest arrives, it's my job to have a good time—and to bring everyone along with me," Fulk says, laying out his party manifesto. "There is nothing worse than a nervous host." Being organized helps, as does lowering the pressure. Fulk regularly hosts dinners for upwards of 50 people on the apse underneath a 50-foot dome inset with gold rosettes. Yet despite the ball gowns and bow ties, these are not pinkiesup affairs. Sometimes the Wedgwood china is used to plate pizza. "You can serve takeout," Fulk affirms, "as long as it's presented beautifully."

#### I decided to write this book partly because no one else had done it yet fit all of this skiable feast under one roof—and partly because I couldn't resist the adventure of what lay ahead.

I wanted a guide to everything Alpine: from the best rifugios (mountain huts), kitsch mountain films (it's a genre!), and folk art to hotels and the families who run them, mountain literature, and ghost stories. And, yes, the recipes. Upon seeing a photograph of my ski-day lunch—say, a Tiroler Gröstl (golden potato hash with local speck, and maybe cabbage and egg) with esoteric Alsatian bottles of wine sprouting out of the hills of snow behind me-my North American friends would comment about the lack of a Chef Boyardee facsimile served on a red plastic tray with a bag of Lay's and a soda. As they recalibrated their idea of what mountain dining could be, I realized how much of a story there is to tell. And so, I started keeping a journal of the people (chefs, hoteliers, helicopter pilots, winemakers, cheesemakers) I met and the best things I ate. In trying to see, but moreover, eat as much of the Alpine range (77,000 square miles) as I could, I came back with approximately 175 recipes stuffed in my mind and proverbial snowsuit. And I've barely scratched the surface. I hope you cook from this book, sure, but the delicious and authentic recipes are just an excuse—a trail of little crumbs, and okay, fine, maybe some Reblochon, too-to lure you into the mountains and to follow my journey, to encourage you to breathe in all that fresh air. - MEREDITH ERICKSON

#### Bread Soup With Chicory & Egg

Serves 4

**2.** Ladle the soup into a food processor or blender and process on high speed until smooth and creamy. Adjust the seasoning with salt and pepper. Return to the Dutch oven and keep warm over very low heat.

**3.** While the soup simmers, bring a large pot of salted water to a boil and fill a bowl with ice water. Add the chicory to the boiling water and blanch until wilted, 1 to 2 minutes.

**4.** Lift chicory out of the boiling water, plunge into the ice water to stop the cooking, and drain.

**5.** Place a wide saucepan filled with water over high heat. While the water is heating, line a plate with a layer of paper towels.

**6.** In a medium frying pan over medium heat, warm the remaining 2 tablespoons olive oil. Add the chicory and sauté until starting to brown, 4 to 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper.

7. When the water has started boiling, turn the heat to a simmer. Crack one egg into a small bowl, then gently pour it into the hot water, swirling the water around it with a spatula or wooden spoon to encourage the egg to take a nice shape. Repeat with the remaining three eggs. When the water returns to a simmer, set a timer and poach the eggs for 2 minutes, until the whites have just set. Carefully transfer to the prepared plate.

**8**. Ladle the soup into bowls. Gently place one egg in the center of each bowl, then lay some wilted chicory next to it, add some croutons, then sprinkle with the minced chives and fennel seeds. Add a splash of olive oil and serve.

ENTERTAINING



One of the most dramatically situated Swiss restaurants I visited is the Berggasthaus Aescher-Wildkirchli, perched on the edge of the Ebenalp, an Appenzeller cliff-no road, no address, no access to public water. How does such a place exist and function as a busy restaurant? Provisions arrive on a pallet via cable car and are lowered into an adjacent cave, where the temperature hovers around 40 degrees Fahrenheit—ideal for potatoes. And so, rösti is the house specialty by necessity (pasta and rice would use too much cooking water). The potatoes are steamed in a gigantic pressure cooker off to the side of the hut, but you can cook them in a regular pot at home. If you don't have a well-seasoned cast-iron pan, using a nonstick pan makes the process much easier. (That said, you would never be allowed to use such a pan in a Swiss kitchen!) 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lbs Yukon Gold potatoes **Kosher salt** <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup unsalted butter, cubed **Freshly ground black** pepper **Grated Appenzeller or** Gruyère cheese for sprinkling (optional) **1.** Place the potatoes in a large pot over medium-high heat and just cover with water. Add 2 tablespoons salt and simmer until the potatoes are tender on the outside but resistant in the middle when poked with a sharp knife, about 30 minutes. You want them slightly undercooked. Drain the potatoes and let them sit

at room temperature overnight. 2. Using the dull side of a paring knife, peel the potatoes. Do not be tempted to use a peeler; the potatoes are too fragile. Using a box grater, grate the potatoes into a large bowl, keeping the strands as long as possible.

#### Rösti

#### Serves 4 to 6

**3.** In a large cast-iron or nonstick frying pan over medium heat, melt  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup of the butter; do not let it brown. Transfer the potatoes to the pan and stir to coat with butter. Stir gently and occasionally for 3 to 4 minutes, seasoning with about 1 teaspoon salt and 1 to 2 teaspoons pepper.

**4.** Melt the remaining <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup butter in the microwave.

**5.** Still working over medium heat, press the potatoes into a round shape with a wooden spoon. Press the edge of the rösti together so that it forms a small wall, away from the edge of the pan (as if it just came out of a ring mold). Gather all of the rösti from the sides of the pan, returning the errant potatoes to the middle, like you're gathering sand into a pile for a sand castle. Pour half of the melted butter around the outside edge of the potatoes, lifting the edge gently with a spatula so that the butter can run underneath the rösti. Let the rösti turn golden brown on the first side, 7 to 10 minutes.

**6.** Lay a plate facedown over the pan and flip out the rösti, then add the remaining melted butter to the pan and slip the rösti into the pan to fry the second side, another 7 to 10 minutes. Reshape the rösti so it's packed tight into a cake. If you're going to serve with grated cheese, sprinkle it on the rösti 5 minutes before you finish cooking. Serve immediately.

#### MOUNTAIN HIGHS

Hotel Bellevue des Alpes, a splendidly preserved 19th-century Swiss property, is glamorous, difficult to reach, and authentically rooted in the era of the great mountaineers. You can have fondue on the terrace while appreciating the north face of the Eiger, then walk the hotel's toile-lined halls and soak up all the history.

#### Hot Chocolate With Alpine Herbs Serves 2

This no-fail hot chocolate has an Alpine twist: The addition of easy-to-find herbs elevates the classic drink to adult-level enjoyment, though that shouldn't stop children from also having a cup on a snowy winter's day. Now's the time to pull out your best serving set: a copper pot with a side spout is nice for pouring the infused chocolate milk. And for a festive garnish, spear marshmallows on pine branches.

1<sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> cups milk

- 1/3 cup heavy cream, plus 1/2 cup (optional)
- 1/3 cup grated or chopped dark chocolate (70% cocoa)
- 1 tsp dried lemon verbena
- 1 tsp dried chamomile flower
- 1 tsp chopped fresh mint
- 1 tbsp sugar (optional)

**1.** In a small heavy saucepan over medium heat, warm the milk and  $\frac{1}{3}$  cup cream until steaming, then stir in the chocolate. Stir constantly while simmering until the chocolate has fully melted, 2 to 3 minutes. Do not let the milk boil.

**2.** Fill a sachet or tea ball with the verbena, chamomile, and fresh mint and drop it into the hot chocolate. Let this sit for 4 minutes to infuse fully.

**3.** In the meantime, if you are planning on serving whipped cream, whip the remaining <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup cream and sugar to make Chantilly cream.

**4.** Have a little taste of the hot chocolate to determine if you wish to infuse any longer. If it tastes Alpine enough, transfer into a copper hot chocolate pot and serve with or without whipped cream or marshmallows.

A master of all things DIY and a much <u>in-demand</u> designer, <u>Sarah Sherman Samuel</u> brought her magic touch to her most personal project yet: transforming an <u>epic fixer-upper</u> in Grand Rapids, Michigan, into an airy family home.







IN JUST FIVE YEARS, interior designer Sarah Sherman Samuel has amassed an obsessive following. With a slew of high-profile renovations (Mandy Moore, Garance Doré) and sold-out collabs (Semihandmade, Cedar & Moss, Concrete Collaborative, Lulu and Georgia), her layered California-cool aesthetic is now a mainstay on just about everyone's Instagram feed. "My career in Los Angeles was suddenly going crazy," Samuel affirms. "But I realized I was designing dream homes for everyone except myself." Indeed, by the end of 2017, her family had outgrown their 1,400-square-foot 1940s bungalow in Venice Beach (as well as their much-photographed one-bedroom A-frame vacation house in Palm Springs), and, with the arrival of their second child, Clover, Samuel and her husband, Rupert, had even given up their master bedroom to be used as a nursery. It was time for a change. After making offers on a handful of properties from California to Texas, on a sweeping cross-country search, they ended up buying sight unseen off Redfin.com. "It was crazy," says Samuel with a laugh. "But once we took a few FaceTime video tours with our real-estate agent, I just knew it was home."

Located not far from where Samuel grew up (her parents still live about an hour away), the 1980 postmodern fixer-upper in Grand Rapids, Michigan, is surrounded by densely wooded pine groves and boasts more than 4,300 square feet—making it an idyllic spot for raising 5-year-old son Archie and now-2-year-old Clover. Yes, it was in need of some paint and serious updates, but the bones were there, as were a few killer design details that Samuel was swooning

over—like the round skylight in the family room, a retro lofted library, 22-foot-high ceilings, and a screened-in porch looking out to a sprawling swimming pool. "It had the mid-century lines I'm drawn to, but on a postmodern house. And I wanted the kitchen and bathrooms to be ugly," explains Samuel, who prefers having a totally blank slate on big-scale projects. Before even setting foot in the space, she had made 90 percent of the structural renovation decisions in her head and was drawing up plans with local contractors, leaving only the finishes and furnishings to figure out once the family arrived in July 2018. Plus, she and Rupert were prepared to roll up their sleeves and do as much of the work themselves as possible—with the help of her father, a craftsman and woodworker whom she had watched build several of their family homes growing up.

The first major updates? Repainting the entire bright red exterior a sleek Caviar black by Sherman-Williams. "They really like red out here in Michigan," jokes Samuel. Next, the over-the-top '80s relics had to go, like the navy and rust-colored shag carpeting that covered the living spaces and bathrooms (yes, the bathrooms: "You should never, ever carpet a bathroom! You'll end up dealing with major mold remediation!"), as well as the glass and mirrored built-in bookcases straight out of *Scarface*, the nausea-inducing acid yellow walls, and, of course, the porch's Astroturf flooring.

The original pinewood tongue-and-groove ceilings dictated a major design decision: After polling her Instagram followers, Samuel decided against painting them white and left the natural wood color untouched, but needed to lighten up the floors to balance out the whole. In the kitchen and family room, she chose an ivory terrazzo tile for the floor, while in the formal living room—where retro curved CB2 sofas and rattan chaises encircle the original travertine fireplace—she opted for off-white wall-to-wall carpeting to make the

Samuel, who worked as a graphic designer before making the switch to interiors, was equally hands on when choosing the artwork. She collaborated with artist Jen Garrido on a series of abstract watercolors (below left); commissioned the ceramic-and-fiber piece by Cindy Hsu Zell (opposite); and made her own totem out of Styrofoam and gauze (below right).

space feel extra warm and cozy during Michigan's wintry months. "I've never put carpet in any of my own houses, as there's always been this stigma about it," Samuel says. "Turns out it's not cheap! But it's one of my favorite things here."

Meanwhile, the gigantic skylight's circular shape also inspired some cool architectural details throughout the living spaces, like tearing out tiny pocket doors and adding in a handful of arched doorways; the airy decorative cutouts not only create visual interest but also help the flow of the living and dining areas, flooding them with natural light. (The dining room—where a vintage Italian marble table Samuel found at Sotheby's is now surrounded by leather-andwood chairs from Barnaby Lane—was so dark and closed off that she used it as the time-out area for Archie and Clover.) "We brought even more postmodern elements into the house—I really played that up," says Samuel. Poured-concrete recessed built-ins display design books and objets, and a super-mod white spiral staircase, constructed with some bent drywall and Rupert's help, leads up to the lofted reading nook. "There was a ladder with beige carpeted stair treads before," she explains. "It looked like a giant cat scratch toy and really had to go."

By painstakingly documenting the #SamuelFamilyFixer transformation process for her devout Instagram following and blog, Samuel showed how the renovation, like many, wasn't without its hiccups—such as when she and Rupert encountered a family of racoons camping out for the winter in their living room chimney,

unearthed major toxic mold in the powder room, and weathered a power loss on an install day following a tornado that passed through the area. ("Send me your marble slabs, your generators, and your nannies!" Samuel quipped in one Instagram post.)

But now, after 18 months of renovation, warm neutrals, ochre tones, geometric wall hangings, and sunny upholstery (most notably the pop of marigold in the family room) fill the airy and considered yet casual spaces. "I covered the couch in a performance velvet from Fabricut and so far it has withstood Popsicle stains, yogurt spills, and wear and tear from our two dogs, Pikku and Cracker," Samuel explains, adding how there's always a sense of practicality behind her pieces. The sofa is flanked by cream-colored Maralunga armchairs, reissues of the iconic 1973 design from Cassina, as well as earthy Küdd:krig Home tapestries, Cindy Hsu Zell sculptures, and Eny Lee Parker's quirky ceramic sconces that are "very '80s in a good way." Most of Samuel's favorite decorative discoveries have come from online searches: "I'm

essentially a professional Wayfair scout," she says, referring to how she scored everything from the soaking tub and brass hardware for the master bath to inexpensive blush-hued bedding on the site.

The designer found other clever ways to work within her budget. "I feel like I've hacked every single thing in this house," says Samuel, whose DIY projects have included spray-painting her daughter's Lulu and Georgia dresser a mauve-hued Audrey's Blush; gluing wood blocks to add height to a pair of Urban Outfitters bathroom mirrors; painting Archie's bedroom walls and ceiling an oakmossand-white stripe meant to mimic a circus tent; and recovering Ikea

kitchen cabinets with her own Semihandmade beaded drawer and door fronts. This was the first major kitchen renovation she's ever done in one of her own homes, so she took the creative process to heart: "I often reference clients' wardrobes when designing for them, because what you choose to wear is such a great reflection of your style, and your home should channel that, too." For Samuel that meant "bright and natural, with lots of whites and ivories and a touch of gold," as well as mixing in subtle quartz, brass, marble, and concrete finishes. She also ditched the ugly baseboard heating and installed Warmboard heaters underneath the floors—which she laid down to keep costs low. (Check out her saved Instagram stories to see Rupert going to town with an electric screw gun.)

"The house really tells my story as a designer," Samuel says. "It feels the most 'me' of any of the places I've ever lived in or renovated." Not having client input or an architect to bounce ideas off of was a challenge, but it also pushed her to be more flexible and creative than she's ever been before. "My worst and pickiest client is, I have to admit, me," she adds with a laugh. "But creating the perfect place for raising our two kids here at home in Michigan and seeing them reconnect to nature is hands down my greatest project yet."

Channeling his creative skills into successful renovation and real-estate ventures, Anthony D'Argenzio infuses each of his spaces in Hudson, New York, with a soulful minimalism.

**DESCENDED FROM A LINE** of Los Angeles cabinetmakers, Anthony D'Argenzio named his creative studio Zio and Sons as a nod to his grandfather's workshop, where he swept the floors growing up. In Italian, *zio* (also the last three letters of his last name) translates to "uncle," of which he has four, one of whom has carried on the family business. That heritage is clear in D'Argenzio's approach to renovation ("I love working with my hands," he says), as well as his thoughtful collaborations with such companies as Rejuvenation and Clé Tile. (Next up: an online shop for vintage art.)

D'Argenzio first gained attention when he renovated his apartment on Manhattan's Lower East Side in 2014—a whitewashed space with exposed brick walls, reclaimed wood shelves, and classic subway tile that defined rustic sophistication on Instagram and beyond. In 2016, he and his wife, Hillary (a sommelier), purchased a turn-of-the-20th-century building in the historic town of Hudson, two hours north of New York City, where D'Argenzio often traveled to source antiques and scout photo locations. He dubbed the building This Old Hudson and painstakingly transformed it—adding to his already unique mix of photography, styling, and brand-building skills. The property, like all his work, elevates the standard "white box" aesthetic into a layer cake of dreamy creamcolored tile, artfully weathered wood, and plaster the texture of freshly whipped frosting.

On the heels of This Old Hudson's success, the D'Argenzios tackled their next project in town: transforming a four-family building into long-term rentals. "It was in true disrepair," he says, but the chance to take on a larger renovation while adding value to the neighborhood was too alluring to pass up. After two years—during which the couple welcomed daughter Havana in September—the work in progress is almost complete. Here, he invites us behind the scenes.







### Look to the Past

Above all, D'Argenzio seeks to "stay true to the structure" and honor the history of a home. "This building is solid and well-made, with beautiful moldings and decorative trim," he says of his latest project. Still, modern comforts like new wiring, washers, and dryers—were a necessity to make the apartments livable. A board member of the Historic Hudson preservation society, D'Argenzio draws on local contacts for sourcing materials: Rogerson's, a store that's been around since 1830, for period hardware, and Hudson Valley Lighting, which spans classic and modern styles, for fixtures. D'Argenzio also recommends Hawkins New York for decor. The mix of new and old, inspired by local businesses, roots his work with a true sense of place.

#### **Build Your Budget**

To make his latest renovation financially feasible, D'Argenzio divided the project into stages. First, he brought the building up to code, which required new windows, a new roof, and replacing old wood siding. After finishing two of the apartments, he rented them out and put the earned income toward the other units. "I splurged on certain things, like kitchens and baths, but I left the bones and the structure so as not to go overboard," he explains. He compared prices online, sourcing plumbing from Hausera, and relied on paint as an inexpensive way to clean up surfaces. The building's exterior received a refresh with Farrow & Ball's Schoolhouse White and Off-Black trim, and the interiors feature Cornforth White and Purbeck Stone.

#### **Design for Flexibility**

D'Argenzio has a talent for designing fluid spaces that can adapt to various uses. Rather than using bold patterns or colors-which could be difficult for a renter to personalize—he applies texture to create subtle interest. "I'll mix a plaster wall with a shiplap or tile," he says. "I like every surface to feel a little different." At the four-unit rental, he expanded on his go-to weathered white Moroccan zellige tiles to include a diamond-inset pattern, developed in collaboration with Clé. Natural wood flooring, which he sanded and restored in some areas and painted in others, and a black-and-white palette lay an enduring foundation. D'Argenzio bought the property, built in 1915 (reportedly to house sailors), for its "great bones" and kept the layout largely intact, with the exception of converting former pantries into bath and kitchen extensions to maximize counter and cabinet space. "I left the floor plan open and didn't go crazy with built-ins, since it's a rental," he explains. "People want to bring in their own things and tell their own stories."

**NESTED ATOP A HILL** along Minneapolis's Pleasant Avenue stands a three-story Neoclassical structure that has played many roles over its 100-year existence—including the winter home of a prominent grain family, the offices of an insurance agency, an outpatient treatment facility, and, more recently, a vacant, dilapidated edifice. But in May 2017, the dwelling found its next calling, which was in many respects a return to the beginning. "Even when the floors were covered in tar paper and there were extra walls, you could still see this magical light," say current owners Liz Gardner and Josef Harris.

The couple and founders of Bodega Ltd.—a multidisciplinary creative studio with clients ranging from Nike to a local Hmong cuisine pop-up called Union Kitchen—christened the 4,000-squarefoot space Maison Bodega when they bought it and started planning how to maximize every inch. They envisioned public events and retail experiences on the ground floor (made possible by favorable zoning laws and a 14-spot parking lot), a salon-style entertaining area on the second (which could double as their workspace), and a serene apartment to call home on the top. Just as the corner-store namesake of their company stocks a variety of goods, the duo designs across interiors, websites, and workshop activations, opting to collaborate with brands that seek a holistic, "world building" approach, says Harris. "Everything is an opportunity to create your story and apply your values to it. Everything is connected."

The property is no exception. Years earlier, Gardner happened upon the building, its European frame set in sharp relief to the handsome, dark wood features of the neighborhood's predominantly Arts and Crafts homes. She immediately fell for the plaster stucco arches and original wavy glass windows. It was a "dream space." But the couple wasn't prepared for the investment and it slipped away. When a developer's plan to convert the lot into apartments failed abruptly, Gardner and Harris quickly seized upon their second chance.

The meant-to-be clues only continued: Looking through records dating back to the 1800s, they discovered two names at the top of the property's permit card: Gardner and Harris. Add to that its lineage as a cultural and entertaining hub for everything from themed parties to readings to weddings led by dynamic local entrepreneurs of the era, and they sensed a fated magnetism at play—something they reminded themselves of in the "dark part" of the renovation. "You have to tell yourself it's destiny, otherwise you can get pretty discouraged," says Gardner with a laugh.

During the first part of the two-year project, the antiquated electrical setup, plumbing, and HVAC had to be completely reworked with the help of architect Toby Rapson and electrician and lighting designer Matthew Baird. (It became clear early on that the general contractor they had hired prioritized efficiency over thoughtfulness, so the couple designated Gardner's father, Jim, a natural problem solver and talented woodworker and craftsman, to act as point person.) The mental gymnastics of modernizing the century-old structure was matched only by the sheer physical labor of demolition (much of which they did themselves)—tearing down walls, jackhammering through cement floors, and excavating horsehair and plaster ceilings. Then came the quieter task of carefully stripping away layer upon layer (wood-print linoleum, tar paper, Berber carpets) in order to reveal the underlying essence of the space.



#### "The most beautiful things aren't always the fanciest," say Gardner and Harris, who unpeeled layers of vintage wallpaper in the bedroom to unearth the honeyed patina of the original plaster beneath.

While friends and clients were puzzled by the seeming lack of progress (Bodega Ltd. meetings took place in the unfinished headquarters, as physical representation of the pair's hands-on approach), Gardner and Harris knew that this "invisible work" was essential in "pulling things apart, looking at them, and then really thinking about how materials were used and how the space was built—to respect the past and take it into the future," explains Harris.

When it came time to install a full kitchen (it had been lost somewhere along the way), a former dining room was selected for having "the most beautiful light at all times of day," says Gardner. To build their ultimate hosting space from scratch, the duo brought in elements both practical (double dishwashing drawers for "pace cleaning" during the sprawling dinner events they've become known for) and sublime (brass counter fronts that make the kitchen seemingly radiate from within). Down the hallway and through an arched doorway, the larder serves as a prep area, outfitted with a 1920s garden sink raised on a brass base that was designed by a friend, its marble basin and shallow tray ideal for arranging flowers and icing drinks out of view from guests.

Keeping an ongoing conversation with the building—Gardner describes it as "a lady who needed to be listened to"—helped them stay attuned to more hidden opportunities buried in the rough. Case in point: Removing Sheetrock from a ballroom wall boarded up in the 1960s revealed the original banister of a spectacular "Rapunzel perch" overlooking the marble staircase. The additional natural light now streams through the opening and illuminates the ballroom fireplace. After removing a discordant back stair from the rear exterior, Gardner spied an antique "rugshaker balcony" in an architectural salvage yard with the exact width needed to frame the custom kitchen doors the couple had sketched out (yet another kismet wink to let them know they were on the right path).



Beyond structural restoration, Gardner and Harris consider themselves stewards of trade skills, seeking to revive and celebrate craftsmanship—from the custom yellow onyx, pink quartz, and oxblood terrazzo mixed by local artisans who had once specialized in Italian churches to the kintsugi-style repair of the bathroom tile (in which gold-tinted mortar is applied to the cracks, and, in a beautiful twist, makes it more valuable than if it were new) to the herringbone wood floors lovingly remilled by Jim on the apartment level—treating each surface as an investment in the future and allowing the building's bones to literally shine.

Just as the kitchen's brass fronts are meant to develop a patina with time, Gardner and Harris intend for Maison Bodega's "living finishes" to wear in, develop further unique character, and layer new chapters to the storied structure—including a weekend workshop series exploring vegetable fermentation as an art practice (a collaboration between Berlin-based artist Anaïs Hazo and Minneapolis-based artist Miriam Karraker) and an upcoming furniture collection developed with a Bodega client looking to revive the rosewood antiques her family saved during the Chinese Revolution.

In the end, all the hard work paid off. "If we had every dollar in the world to do everything we wanted, we wouldn't have the same connection to the space," affirms Harris. "Now it's richer in a different way that can't be replicated."

# All Together Now

**FOR A COUPLE OF YEARS,** Joanne Duong Bartels and Luke Bartels left the free-spirited surfer haven that is San Francisco's Outer Sunset neighborhood for Chicago. It wasn't long, though, before the city lured them back—first to the other side of town, but eventually to right where they started: on the ocean, surrounded by their fellow artists and craftspeople. (Joanne is a wardrobe stylist; Luke is a furniture designer and woodworker.) "One of the reasons we've stayed out here is because it's a draw for a lot of people who want to make things," says Luke.

So a decade after their return, when it became clear they had outgrown their 1907 cottage, the subsequent renovation quickly turned into "a family affair," as Joanne calls it. The couple never went searching for an architect; they simply called up their friend of 15 years, designer Timothy Balon. A neighbor with her own construction firm became their contractor. And Luke's colleagues at the collaborative workspace Woodshop—Danny Hess, Josh Duthie, and Jeff Canham—were tapped for their expertise. "Like I do every day," Luke points out of his built-in sounding board for all construction issues. The plan: completely overhaul the house's back addition, expanding both up and out to accommodate another bedroom and bath. (While the home's set of bedrooms and single bathroom had been "the perfect size" for two, children Veda, 6, and Alfie, 2, had since come

Most store-bought ball knobs lie flat, making them difficult to grab onto. Not Luke's version. He added tiny dowels behind his pulls (purchased at American Woodcrafters Supply Co.) for the kitchen and hallway cabinets, ensuring a true orb shape that's much easier to grasp.

along.) "Everyone lives in the neighborhood, so it was constantly like, 'Oh, there's this issue—can you come help us?' We were always problem-solving together," Joanne says. When, at the very last minute, she, Luke, and Balon decided the wall above the stairs should be curved rather than squared off—"We wanted as many organic shapes as possible," Joanne notes—their merry band of artisans made it happen over a weekend.

And the porthole in that now-rounded nook? At first, it was going to be near the bathroom—but then the painter (another acquaintance, of course) stopped by to give an estimate. "He said, 'If you had a window here instead, I think you'd be able to see the ocean from the stair landing," Joanne recalls. "And we thought, Oh, my God, let's move it!"

Throughout the process, creative friends and handy folks were pulled in—"including us," Joanne adds. Wherever wood was meant to be wood, there was Luke. He installed the floors, built the staircase, and paneled the playroom walls, all with salvaged elm from another comrade, Evan Shively, founder of Arborica. For the kitchen cabinet fronts, he used FSC-certified plywood, while the doors and window frames are deodar cedar (which gives the whole home a heady, woodsy scent), a nod to his childhood. "Growing up, we had a bunch of those trees in our yard, and my dad would always take the saplings and plant them anywhere that people would let him," Luke remembers. "He was like the Johnny Appleseed of Cedrus deodara."

Joanne took the reins for the finishing touches—before a revamp was even on the horizon. A full year in advance, she bought yellow bouclé fabric to reupholster the living room sofa (an eBay score) and Clé zellige tile for the yet-to-exist master bathroom floor. Same goes for the vintage bar cabinet in the dining area, a Craigslist find. "I would always say to Tim, 'What do you think of this?' And he'd say, 'You don't even have a remodel yet!" Joanne recalls, laughing. "But I feel like buying stuff or starting a project makes the process actually happen."

The decorating phase, too, was a group effort. Luke's sister helped the couple procure 100 percent Italian wool carpet in a deep scarlet hue for the library, then connected them with a rug binder, who cut one side into a sinuous wave—a genius solution for one wall of the space being longer than the other.

With Luke up to his ears in carving and sanding, they turned to L.A. brand Kalon for the kids' beds; each is handmade in the U.S. out of local timber. Veda had just two requests: a sky blue ceiling and to share a room with her brother. How could they say no? For now, the third bedroom has been designated an arts and crafts zone-slash-friends hangout. "Before the reno, everyone started having kids and it became crazy," says Joanne. "We had to make a space for them!"

With the help of yet another talented friend, Joanne sewed almost all of the curtains, pillows, and upholstery, including the velvet headboard for the couple's bed frame, another Bartels and Balon special. Long story short: Balon found a picture of an antique wood bed up for auction "a long time ago"; Luke re-created the zigzag design out of reclaimed bay laurel; and the trio put their own spin on it with a rust-colored cushion. This back-and-forth defined the whole experience. "Tim would introduce us to things or we'd find stuff, then the three of us would debate," explains Joanne, with one person taking on the role of tiebreaker.

Wrapping up the year-and-three-month-long transformation wasn't the end of the family's home as the unofficial neighborhood gathering spot. In fact, just the opposite. "I always have a fully stocked bar; that's my thing," notes Joanne. "Our house is the place where everyone goes; we host a lot of dinners and cocktails." In the summer, they serve Negronis; in the winter, Manhattans—in their eyes, it's the least they can do. "From the plates we eat off of to the things we look at, they're all made by people we know and love," says Joanne. "We wouldn't be where we are without our community."

# All Here

Entrepreneur <u>Courtney Adamo's</u> Byron Bay home might just be 1,600 square feet, but it's made to measure for her <u>family of seven</u>.

**IT'S HARD TO IMAGINE** Courtney Adamo's home ever being anything less than picture-perfect. But when she and her husband, Michael, first found the 120-year-old property they would eventually buy in an idyllic town north of Sydney, Australia, it was a diamond in the rough.

If you recognize her warm smile and laid-back chicness from Instagram, where she regularly shares sunny snapshots of her life with Michael and their five children, then the image of Courtney falling in love with a Federation-style cottage with aluminum-framed windows and asbestos paneling won't track. Her reputation as an arbiter of well-chosen goods for the whole family (no plastic; thoughtful design) began with Babyccino, the site she cofounded in 2007, and interest in her intentional approach and lifestyle has only grown. Her obsessive and loyal fan base looks to her for the tips, tricks, and must-haves she leans on for living the good life. She responded by launching In the Loop in 2019, an e-course for parents wanting to know just how she keeps her home tidy, kids fed, and nutmeg-colored bangs trimmed—and still finds time to surf. Part of the secret is her home base. When the Adamos first landed in Byron Bay three years ago, the storied surf outpost quickly won them over. The family was on an 18-month around-the-world trip inspired by their desire to downshift from their fast-paced life in London. "Within two days we all knew it was our spot," says Courtney of the beach town. They just needed to find the right home to settle into. A for-sale listing popped up for a house down the road from their rental, and Michael encouraged her to take a look. Reluctantly,

she agreed. "As soon as I stepped through the front door, I saw all the charm that I couldn't see from the outside," explains Courtney, who felt more at ease there, among the old, creaky sash windows and ramshackle doorknobs, than at any of the newer, more conventional properties they had been considering. At 1,600 square feet, "the home was too small for us, but I wondered if I could make it work," she says.

It turned out she could—with the serious prioritization of a fivemonth renovation. Courtney had some experience in that department: The family had bought their old Victorian in Highgate, North London, in an "unlivable state" and restored it from top to bottom. She also made a resolute commitment to finding the exact right pieces for the space, as she's always done. "Of course everyone has a different financial threshold, but when we need to buy something, we try to find the best quality available or the one thing that will last the longest, even if it is more expensive," explains Courtney. "When an item is more dear, I treasure it more. I take better care of it and make sure my kids do, too, which inevitably extends its life span."

At the top of her to-do list was sorting out the kitchen. True to houses of the era, it was small and centrally located on the first floor. But with a family as passionate about cooking and eating together as the Adamos, relocating it to the back of the building where they could spill out into the garden became the top order of business. "The kitchen is where we spend the majority of our time, so this was the room we decided to invest the most in," says Courtney, who went with all custom-built Shaker cabinetry. The update not only gave the room the open airiness required for such a high-traffic and high-functioning zone, but helped create space to solve another issue: the one-bathroom-to-seven-people ratio. A second bathroom now stands where the kitchen once was, making the most of a window that looks out onto a lush, green tree fern. Last but not least in a family

During renovations, Courtney considered removing the archway (opposite) to let more light into the living room and make space for the laundry room, but Michael was 100 percent against the idea. "We kept it and I'm glad we did," she says. "These original details bring so much charm to the house."

with five kids: a laundry room. Devoting a section of the enclosed veranda did the trick, as did including a large butler-style sink for handwashing, a wood benchtop for folding, and a few cupboards for stashing away cleaning supplies.

What didn't make Courtney's list of reno must-haves is almost as surprising as the modest square footage. The thought of extra bedrooms beyond the original three didn't even cross her mind. Turns out, her older sons Easton (14) and Quin (12) have always shared a room (and are so close they often choose to sleep in the same bed), as have her daughters Ivy (10) and Marlow (7), whose bunk beds "take advantage of the high ceilings and vertical space, and give them more room to play," explains Courtney. The child who did need an area carved out was Wilkie (2), the only member of the brood to be born in Australia. The sunroom off the master transformed into a cozy sleeping nook.

Another issue of no concern? Storage. "When we bought the house there was not a single cupboard or closet," says Courtney. "I don't mind having very little storage because it forces you to keep only what you need." Aside from building one closet in the girls' room and another in the sunroom-turned-nursery, the rest of the clothes are kept in vintage dressers and wardrobes she has found. "My husband jokes that I can't drive past a charity shop or antiques store without stopping to check it out," she says. "Some of my favorite art on the walls I rescued for less than \$5!"

It's been just over a year since the renovation, and the Adamos have fully settled in. "Michael and I both grew up in a big family, so we're used to living with noise and chaos," says Courtney. "I love that at any given time in our house, there is a tower being built, food being cooked, tutus being twirled, art being crafted, music on, people laughing, someone crying, and sometimes all of it at once. A busy home is all I've ever known and my absolute favorite."

Cozy farmhouse meets breezy surf shack for the ultimate coastal family hangout.





To completely renovate her Victorian-era home in San Francisco, Erin Hiemstra looked to the space's dramatic raw beauty and gave it a contemporary twist.

#### CHARACTER STUDY

Crumbling ceilings, scratched floors, a two-by-four plank as a staircase banister—this is not the archetype of a perfect house. But it *was* for Erin Hiemstra, founder of design website Apartment 34, when she saw a Victorian circa 1850s in San Francisco's Bayview neighborhood five years ago. "It was the turn-it-into-your-dream-home scenario," she says. Having been outbid twice on other properties over the course of two years, she hoped the third time would be the charm.

#### CHARACTER STUDY



Like most San Francisco real estate (a notoriously competitive market), this house came with a great acquisition story. Hiemstra's husband, Chris, was driving by the lot, saw a "For Sale" sign out front, and wrote down the details. It wasn't even officially on the market yet, but the couple made a preemptive bid and snapped it up. That analog start is fitting for an antique home in which charming eight-foot arched windows and a clapboard exterior give way to equally beautiful interiors: vast, light-welcoming bay windows and transoms, original glass and brass doorknobs, and rooms full of crown molding. What seemed to be drawbacks—ceilings and walls painted in "a sea of insane colors," a jerry-rigged mishmash kitchen, modified 1970s fireplaces (of the garish variety) were no match for Hiemstra's imagination and grit. She began her career in politics on Capitol Hill (more points for grit),



which masked her latent design talents but inadvertently influenced her future passion: She lived in a classic D.C. row house, and 100-plus-year-old buildings have stayed in her creative psyche since.

As the founder of one of the first recognized interiors blogs, Hiemstra was a great candidate to take up a restoration. Though it was an adventure, to be sure. Completely self-taught, she had dabbled in cosmetic projects at her rental lofts and former condo in Seattle (the inspiration that launched Apartment 34)—paint, fixtures, furniture—but had never taken on a full-scale gut renovation. That didn't deter her. "I loved the historic details, character, and uniqueness of this home and didn't want to strip it of the feel it deserved," explains Hiemstra. She tapped architect Seth Brookshire to help bring her concept (dubbed This Old Victorian on her blog) to life.

First came the loving yet painstaking process of maintaining the important original features: rebuilding ceiling medallions, preserving moldings, ensuring the functionality

The juxtaposition of black and white extends throughout the space, whether it's a high-gloss black staircase against light oak floors or dark planters next to a shelf stacked with tonal ivory books and objets.

of pocket doors (down to the hardware), and restoring fireplaces in a Victorian-era style. Without a general contractor, Hiemstra relied on Google, Instagram, local Bayview shops, and her DIY-savvy husband to help source the right builders and materials. She also read up on electrical plans, teaching herself about wallboards and insulation, figuring out permits, and getting a grasp on stone sizes.

Still, a few mishaps crept in along the way. The wood floor stain didn't take properly and had to be redone, turning a days-long task into a weeks-long saga. In another setback, when Hiemstra was six weeks postpartum with now 4-yearold son Carter, she discovered she needed to choose final light fixtures in order for any in-wall wiring to begin. "I was sleepdeprived and picking things in haste," Hiemstra remembers. Within days, dozens of designs were en route (some regrettable and later subbed out).

Sleep or not, the job got done. The couple managed to maintain the building's historic elements while updating it for a family of three (plus an energetic French bulldog puppy),

They took away walls downstairs between the dollhouse-size rooms, creating an open and functional kitchen, family room, and dining room, and reconfigured the second floor with a master suite and an extra bathroom. The rooms now flow seamlessly from one to the next—a luxury not inherent to 1800s American architecture. "I step into every single space every day," says Hiemstra of the new layout.

Though she's not a technical designer by trade, you'd never know that by looking at the home. The revitalized framework gave her a platform to flex her design muscles, incorporating a mix of European and West Coast influences. Pale wood floors contrast against high-gloss black window frames and matte white walls. "A mellow palette lets the items pop, rather than the walls themselves being the decor," Hiemstra explains. "Plus, the house needs to be calm because chaos comes through every day!" Modern light fixtures—caged, lampshade-style, abstract—hang from decorative Victorian ceiling medallions in nearly every 12-foot-tall room. Opening to the media room, a double-width windowed steel door hugs classic white

"For your own sanity you should renovate your master suite first. I, of course, did not follow that advice, but it's now fully an adult respite from the rest of the world," says Hiemstra.

"It's a dream to pick every detail, but expect decision fatigue."

#### **Go Social**

Source vendors, glassmakers, and dealers on Instagram. "Go down rabbit holes to hunt things down."

Create a neutral palette with depth by "adding layers and a lot of texture with different materials."

#### Pare Down

Focus on buying special items: They'll have longevity and look more impactful in your home. "You gloss over crowded collections and don't notice individual pieces."

molding—a shoulder-to-shoulder combination of new and old. Hiemstra even included a window above the industrial door to echo the original transoms in the second-floor bedrooms.

"I had this vision of the character shining through in a really neat way. You want to ask questions about the history, but then you're also intrigued by elements that feel very now," she says of her inspiration.

The designs placed in each airy room are, in a word, intentional. Hiemstra's visits to Sweden and Denmark last year inspired her to pare down and use negative space to highlight an object's individuality, from mid-century seaters and artwork sourced on Elsie Green to an 1890s French gilded mirror (a 1stdibs find) and a vintage Dutch rattan-and-wool chair scored at Amsterdam Modern. She also invested in custom furniture for larger pieces, like couches and beds, to complement the



scale of the architecture. (The first bed she bought looked miniature in the master bedroom—a measurement misjudgment they lived with and laughed about for two years.) As for accessories, Hiemstra gravitates to interesting finds she can't look away from: "I am meticulous about hunting down items' sources in photos. You have to be like a detective buying things you love," she advises. Once she has the right objects, whether it's a lamp from Finnish Design Shop or a planter from Ikea, she practices removing and swapping things for the perfectly balanced vignette. When a room is appropriately understated yet bold, it's finished.

Good things take time, and five years later, after much scrupulous rebuilding and redoing, the paintbrushes have been set down and the renovation is complete. "It took this long because I made a point to have truly special elements," Hiemstra explains. "In these days of HGTV and design blogs, the expectation is that a house should come together both quickly and cheaply, but that's a myth."

In Carter's room, Hiemstra painted a curved wall with a constellation map, working with the irregularity instead of knocking it down.

For Eli, her 10-year-old son, Kraiem took a modern approach, featuring customized furniture from Lee Industries. Chinoiserie wallpaper lining the hallway continues the whimsical theme into the shared area. "Now we really feel like we're up in the trees," says Kraiem.

#### **KEEP THINGS LIGHT**

Although she brought in desk lamps and sconces with pleated shades by Hudson Valley Lighting to cast a softer, bedtime-friendly glow, Kraiem also likes a statement piece. "I used a large fixture for the ceiling to bring the eye up," she says of the Lily Chandelier in Andree's bedroom. A bright idea for all ages.
