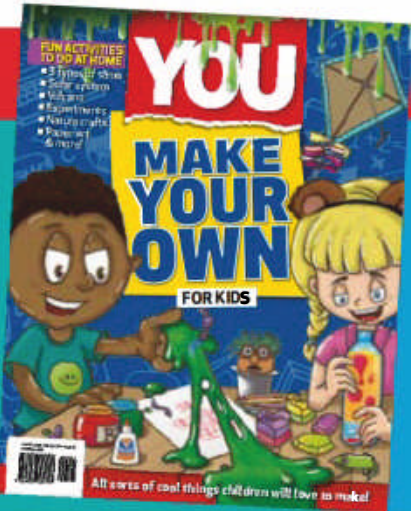

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IT'S JUST NOT TRUE!

No, she doesn't flee the palace. No, her foundation is not in trouble. Princess Charlene hits back at the rumours

SHE'S had her fair share of criticism over the years and she's usually okay with that – she knows it comes with the territory. After all, when you marry a prince who presides over one of the most fascinating principalities in the world, you have to take the good with the bad.

And for the most part, her Serene Highness Princess Charlene of Monaco has managed to maintain a dignified silence.

But sometimes she feels it's important to speak out – especially when your reputation and everything you've fought so long and hard for are on the line.

Which is exactly what the Benoni-bred mom-of-two is doing now. She didn't want to – her attitude when scathing stories appear about her is to look the other way. Yet this time she felt she needed to say something, especially as her beloved foundation has been dragged into it.

Popular French magazine Paris Match recently published an article which has the princess and her camp up in arms. It paints a picture of a lonely, brittle princess who seldom smiles and had trouble settling into Monaco – a place peopled by “sharks and vipers”, as she allegedly called them.

The story also claims she disobeys royal rules and regularly flees to Corsica or

Turkey and has grown suspicious of everyone, even those who have supported her for years.

What's more, the princess believes she's become untouchable, the story says, and often cancels appearances at the last minute – something those close to her say simply isn't true.

“She often packs in three to four engagements a day,” a palace insider says.

Yet what has upset Charlene most are the allegations that her foundation is in disarray.

One of the bombshell claims is that former Springbok rugby captain Francois Pienaar, a long-standing member of

the board, quit due to internal strife and that Charlene herself appears to have lost interest in her foundation. Francois denies this and the allegation is refuted by the board of directors.

Speaking exclusively to YOU from the Pink Palace in Monaco, the princess says the claims and allegations are “a total fabrication”.

“None of it is true. It has come as a shock and I'm saddened by it.”

She wasn't approached by the publication for comment and neither was Albert, she says.

Charlene was all the more stunned because the family had been on good terms with the magazine and posed with then-10-month-old twins Prince Jacques and Princess Gabriella for a cover in October 2015.

Albert, however, has a history with the publication, and sued it in 2005 after they ran a story outing his love child, Alexandre (17), from his fling with French-Tongolese air hostess Nicole Coste.

The case went to court and Paris Match was ordered to pay €50 000 (then R380 000). Albert also successfully sued The Sunday Times in the UK for the same story.

However, in 2015 the European court of human rights overruled the French court's decision, saying that Paris Match was justified in publishing the piece as it was in the public interest.

“The story had importance that went beyond the scope of the prince's private life,” the judges said.

ALMOST no stone is left unturned in the Paris Match article and even the early years of her relationship with Albert are delved into.

One incident recounted is from 2007 – long before their 2011 marriage – when she accompanied Albert to the opening of an exhibition about the life of his mother, Grace Kelly, at the Grimaldi Forum.

Charlene is told to wait as two Hermès Kelly bags are given to Albert's sisters, Caroline and Stephanie – “the true princesses”.

The early years of her marriage are also picked apart and she's quoted as saying the people in Monaco “didn't understand my mentality or my South African humour”.

The princess battled to settle down in a land where French is *de rigueur* and outsiders struggle to fit in.

“They laughed at her French,” the article says. “Despite taking courses at an institute in Villefranche-sur-Mer it was limited to a few words taught to her by her guards.

“To remedy this, the palace assigned a butler who was already employed in the service of the royal family. Dedicated and attentive, he guided Charlene through the protocol of the palace.”

Insiders say Charlene is now proficient in French and this much was evident when she delivered a perfect speech for Albert in the language at the 10th anniversary of her husband’s reign in June 2015.

The story goes on to say she grew in self-confidence over the years and walks with her head held high. “I might be a South African country girl but I can see through people,” she’s quoted as saying.

There are also insinuations that Albert and Charlene are unhappy and that she grants herself “formerly inconceivable freedoms”.

None of it is true, a close friend of the family says. “They are more committed than ever to each other.

“They truly love each other and

Albert really adores Charlene. He has huge respect for her because she’s her own woman and she in turn has great admiration for him.”

BUT of all the allegations, the most hurtful are the ones against the South African branch of her Princess Charlene of Monaco Foundation (PCMF).

The charity organisation, which she started in 2015, was born out of personal tragedy.

“My cousin drowned when he was five years old,” she told Times Weekend magazine in 2013. “He went to swim in a neighbour’s pool and fell in.”

Ever since then she’s worked tirelessly to promote water safety among kids, especially in disadvantaged areas. The foundation has also thrown its weight into supporting several charitable endeavours.

However, in January, Charlene decided to close her SA office, believing it

would be more efficient to run everything from Monaco under her PCMF umbrella, explains Chantell Wittstock, the foundation’s director.

“It just made better business sense for her. We’d still run projects in South Africa but decisions would be made in Monaco.”

The board was told of the developments and everyone understood, Chantell says. “There was no ill will and no one was forced to resign.”

Francois tells YOU the claims in the article – that he left after a letter was sent demanding explanations about expenses and that he felt he could no longer support the “sad princess whom he previously admired” – are “categorically untrue”.

“I was never contacted for comment,” he says.

Yes, he adds, it’s true he resigned but “that was due to the foundation closing [in SA] and for no other reason”.

YET before the foundation could properly close its doors in SA, Covid-19 reared its ugly head.

Chantell, who’s married to Charlene’s younger

brother, Sean Wittstock (37), says they felt they simply couldn't stand back and do nothing.

"We launched the #StrongTogether campaign, which was a huge success. It reached 92 million people around the world and benefited 45 local charities. We managed to raise R2,57 million for communities and charities struggling during the pandemic."

On the back of this success a decision was taken not to close the foundation and instead restructure it and breathe new life into it with effective projects on the near horizon, Chantell says.

One of their major changes was getting TV presenter and businesswoman Clare Wiese-Wentzel (37), daughter of South African business magnate Christo Wiese, on board.

"I'm delighted to welcome Clare as a new board member," Charlene says. "She's an outstanding individual in her own right and I'm sure she'll bring much value to my foundation in the future."

One of their goals is to expand into Sub-Saharan Africa.

"Charlene has already built a school and church in Zambia, where her uncle is a pastor, and we want to do more of that," Chantell adds.

"We really want to turn the founda-

tion into a young and dynamic organisation, which makes a real difference."

CHARLENE is no stranger to challenges and now she's also facing one of the biggest physical ones of her life: a water-bike race from Calvi in France to Monaco, which kicks off on 12 September.

Called The Crossing, its aim is to raise funds for various programmes run by her foundation and it will see her leading her own team called Serenity over 180km of open sea.

She'll be up against her older brother, Gareth Wittstock (40), who's also leading a team.

Among the big sports stars taking part are mixed martial arts star Conor McGregor, former French Olympic swimmer Yannick Agnel and Australian road cyclist David Tanner.

Charlene has been training relentlessly for months to get into peak condition – and one glimpse at her social

media attests to this, with many images showing her training out in the ocean, often at night.

Chantell says it's ridiculous to suggest the princess is too thin. "She looks better than she ever has. She's been training day in and day out. She's fit, strong and healthy."

As for their allegation that she "fled" to the island of Corsica earlier this year, it was to train, Chantell says.

And Albert supports her all the way. "Often when she's out in the ocean training, he's there on the sidelines supporting her. He knows as a fellow Olympian [he was in the bobsled team of 1971] what it takes mentally and physically to compete in something at this level. He's truly so proud of her and backs her all the way."

Charlene too is hardly going to let recent events get to her either.

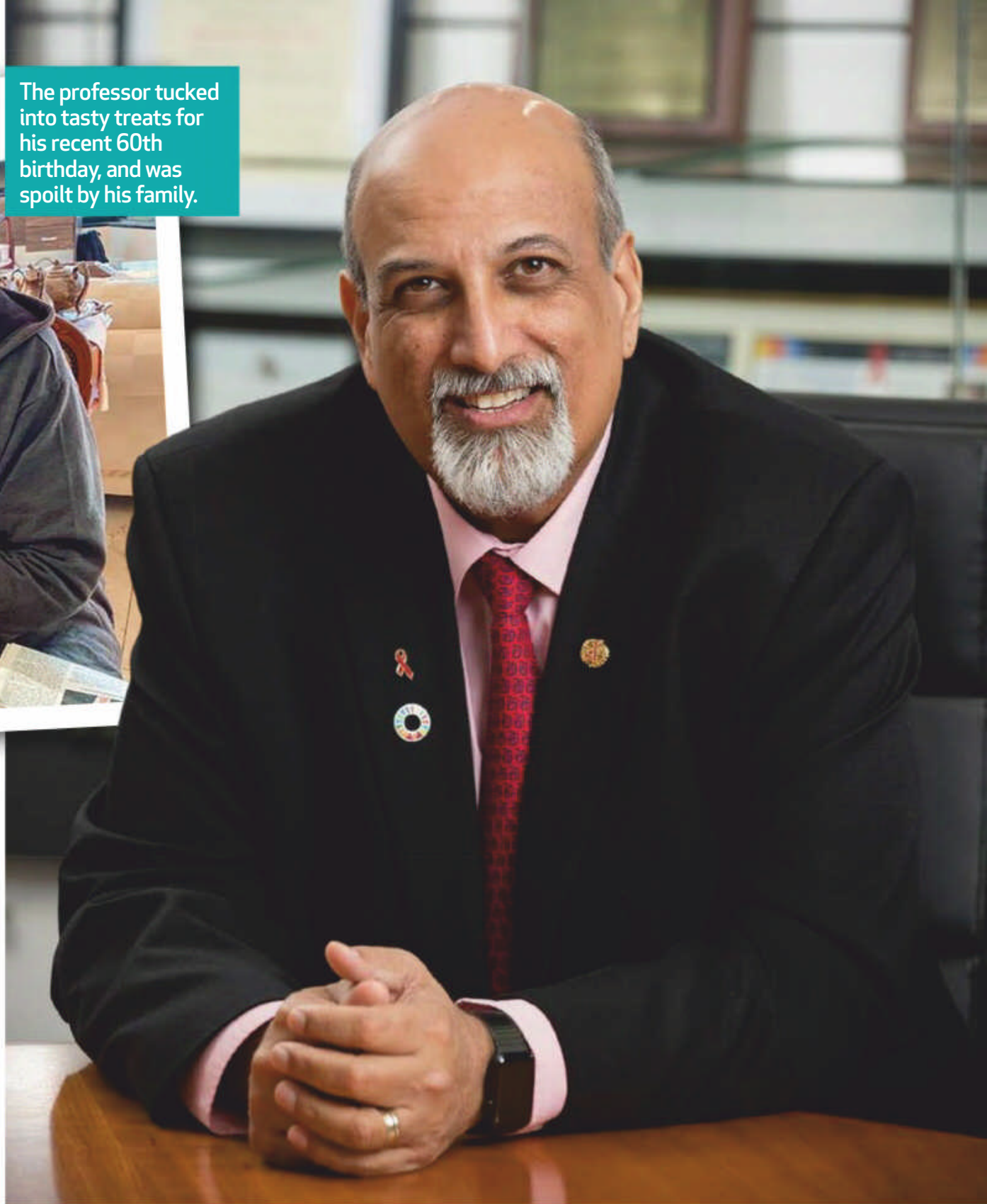
"She's formidable. When she sets her mind to something, absolutely nothing will derail her – it's why she became an Olympic swimmer in the first place."

Helping others is what ultimately drives her and why she started her foundation in the first place.

"She has the biggest heart, and that's what people don't know. She's absolutely dedicated to helping others and making a difference." ■

The professor tucked into tasty treats for his recent 60th birthday, and was spoilt by his family.



ATABLE groaning with delicious doughnuts, flaky croissants and enough koesisters to satisfy his sweet tooth. It may seem a little indulgent for breakfast but it's not everyday Professor Salim Abdool Karim takes the morning off.

Still, this is a special occasion: his 60th birthday. And if anyone deserves a little downtime, it's the good prof.

As government's chief adviser on Covid-19 "Slim", as he's known to his friends, has been working around the clock – and he's the first to admit trying to get a handle on the deadly virus has been a Herculean task.

"Covid-19 is non-stop work because there's so much to do, and it all needs to be done quickly because the epidemic moves so fast," he tells YOU.

"If you lose two or three days, it's just too much. The epidemic will get ahead of you. We've really had to pull out all the stops over the past few months."

With numbers easing somewhat now and evidence that the country has passed its first wave, Salim is finally able to take a bit of a breather. But work is never far from his mind, not even on special occasions.

For his birthday, his children gave him a customised hoodie with #ProfKarim emblazoned on the back. On the front is his catchphrase, #NextSlide – because anyone who's watched the professor give his updates on TV will know how much he loves a slide.

The kids were clearly having a good-

natured dig at their dad's newfound popularity. The scientist and activist has become a household name, thanks to his calm presence and easy-to-understand explanations of where SA is tracking with the pandemic.

But for Salim, the best birthday gift was having all his kids under one roof. "Both my daughters live in Johannesburg and my son lives in Cape Town, so it was

really special to have them come over during lockdown," Salim says, chatting to YOU from his offices in his hometown of Durban.

His wife, Quarraisha, and the kids went to town spoiling him. "They made such a scrumptious breakfast, it took me at least a week to recover," he says with a chuckle. The Abdool Karim women are master chefs, he says proudly, and the

girls love competing with their mom in the kitchen.

"They love cooking mostly Indian dishes that have been passed down the generations," says Salim, whose favourite meal is Quarraisha's biryani.

YET the family is far from conventional.

"For some people it may be seem odd and uncomfortable, but we easily talk about condoms and pertinent issues over dinner," Salim says.

Everyone in the family has been doing their bit to fight Covid-19. Their eldest, Safura (28), is a public health lawyer; Aisha (25) is a journalist at the Bhekisisa Centre for Health Journalism; while Wasim (21) is studying computer science at the University of Cape Town.

Quarraisha (60) is one of the country's leading epidemiologists and has been at the forefront of the coronavirus battle alongside her husband, whom she met when they were both medical students in the department of virology at the then University of Natal.

In 1986, Salim accepted a scholarship to study at Columbia University in New York and hung out with Quarraisha at his farewell party. The two talked through the night and promised to keep in contact.

"While I was in New York, we kept in

touch by writing letters to each other. I then asked her if she'd like to marry me and she agreed."

He took a break from his studies for a quick visit home to wed his bride, who then joined him in New York. More than three decades later, they've travelled the world, raised a family and collaborated on several award-winning projects, particularly in the field of HIV/Aids research.

"We've also been sharing a secretary for the past 20 years," Salim says.

He learnt to be frugal from his father. As a young boy Salim would accompany his dad to work at a Durban clothing factory and his school holidays were all spent toiling alongside him.

"My job was to count each box and see that there were six shirts in each box. I used to do that every day, all day, and it was lovely. I have very fond memories of meeting all the different workers."

HIS father had a strict work ethic, which Salim adopted as a young boy.

"I was a very studious student. I played a leadership role in setting up social clubs and various activities in the school,"

he recalls.

A bright student with a love for physics and maths, he earned his nickname because he was bold enough to speak his mind. His Afrikaans teacher would often tell him, "*Jy dink jy's slim*" (You think you're clever), and the nickname stuck.

Salim still stays in touch with his high-school physics and maths teachers. "Those two had a significant impact on me; they inspired me. I couldn't wait for those classes. They were so exciting," he says.

But you'd be wrong to think the professor was a dyed-in-the-wool nerd.

He's always loved music and was known as "disco diabolic" back in the day.

"I was a huge fan of pop and disco music after seeing the film *Saturday Night Fever*. I used to run a disco that I built myself in 1978. It had a disco ball, lighting system, smoke machine – the works! People would hire me for their events."

These days he's swapped his bootleg pants and disco balls for walks on the beach. And after a long day's work, Salim enjoys watching *The Daily Show* with Trevor Noah.

"I tape it every night because I don't always get the chance to watch it live. I love Trevor – he's funny and his commentary is so relevant," he says.

As with many families, there's always a battle for the TV remote in the Abdool Karim household. "We have big debates – my wife likes rom-coms while I prefer action movies, so we take turns."

Now that the curve has flattened, the couple plan to make up for lost time and catch up on their favourite Netflix shows.

"Hospitals are much more prepared now: they know which wards to set aside, they know how to manage Covid patients and where to get their office supplies, so it's going to be much easier with the second surge," Salim says.

But that doesn't mean we should all breathe easy, he warns. "We've got to maintain vigilance, we've got to monitor where the cases are occurring, we've got to be able to respond if there's an outbreak somewhere, and we need to ensure we're well-stocked and ready for when the second surge does arrive."

Aye, aye, Prof. ■

"Minka has dated a lot of guys, but has never found Mr Right," a source says. "She's finally found her Prince Charming in Trevor."

So just who is the leggy brunette who's moved in with one of South Africa's biggest exports? Let's take a look.

A LOW-KEY RELATIONSHIP

Minka, who's best known for her role as a cheerleader in the TV series *Friday Night Lights*, has been linked to a string of celebs, including *Grey's Anatomy* hottie Jesse Williams and Captain America, Chris Evans.

Now it's Trevor who's caught her eye. The pair move in the same circles and met through mutual friends. Minka, who at 40 is four years older than Trevor, has had a "huge crush" on the comedian for years, an insider says.

When friends told him about her inter-

est in him, Trevor reached out and they built a connection.

The new couple haven't breathed a word about their relationship on social media, nor have they been spotted in public together. But sources close to the pair say they have been isolating in Trevor's swanky Manhattan pad, where he's been filming *The Daily Show* since lockdown.

RULES ARE MADE TO BE BROKEN

Cosying up behind closed doors goes against what Trevor said in an interview on the *Howard Stern Show* last year.

Like Trevor, Minka keeps her cards close to her chest but in a rare interview she disclosed some dating advice.

Mom and daughter had a complicated relationship but Minka says they'd made their peace by the time Maureen died of colon cancer a few years ago.

Minka has worked in modelling and was once asked to become a *Playboy* Playmate. But she channelled her energy into acting instead, making a name for herself as Lyla Garrity in *Friday Night Lights* and appearing in *Charlie's Angels*, *Jane the Virgin* and *Almost Human*.

In her latest role she plays Dawn Granger, a vigilante superhero, in the teen series *Titans* on Netflix.

BIRDS OF A FEATHER

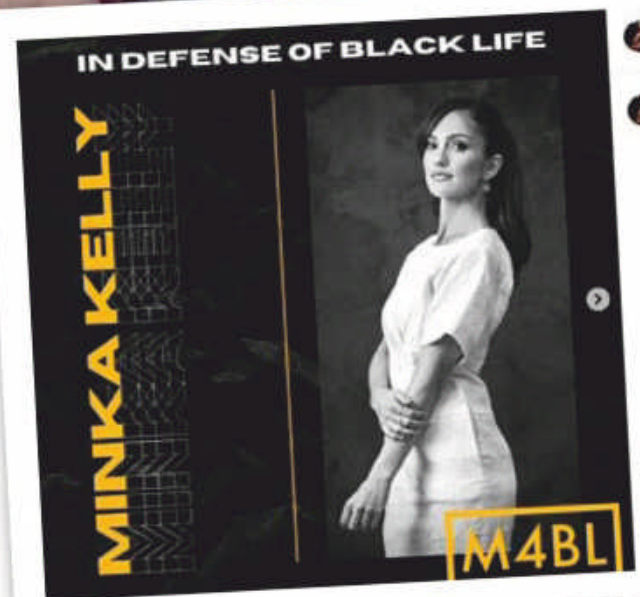
Minka, who was once voted the sexiest woman alive by *Esquire* magazine, is an ambassador for the International Fund for Animal Welfare and often uses her social media platforms to draw attention to the plight of animals.

She often speaks out against discrimination too – just like Trevor, who's becoming an increasingly significant voice in American politics.

The talk-show host, who recently made it onto the *Fortune* 40 Under 40 list of the most influential people in the world, has been frank about the racial tension brewing in the US – and Americans are tuning in to what he has to say.

The *Daily Show* has increased its viewership by more than 50% since he took over and, according to the *Los Angeles Times*, the show has logged more than 2,8 billion views on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and YouTube this year – the most of any late-night show.

Trevor hasn't lost his funny bone, though. "I believe in the importance of jokes. I will never lose that. I always tell people, jokes are what made me," he says. "But I no longer have to choose between a joke and what I want to say." ■



THE EX FILES

Minka Kelly previously dated *Grey's Anatomy* star Jesse Williams but ended their relationship in 2018 after months of dating.

They reportedly met while working on a videogame, just three months after Jesse split from his wife, Aryn Drake-Lee, with whom he has two children.

The actress has denied breaking up their marriage.

"I hope the cheating rumours aren't true. It would be disappointing," an Instagram follower wrote on her feed. "They're not," Minka wrote. "Hate for you to be disappointed. Glad I could clear that up for you. Now f*** off!"

Trevor's last relationship also seemed quite serious. He dated singer, songwriter and model Jordyn Taylor for four years.

The couple often attended red-carpet events together and things seemed to be going somewhere when he took Jordyn to meet his mother and grandmother in Soweto.

But sources say they grew apart, and in 2019 Jordan made the news of their split Instagram-official.

Yet even though they'd broken up, she says there was no bad blood.

"Of course I love him. How can you not? I love him so much, but you guys should know we broke up but yeah, I love him."

HE COULDN'T understand why his son wasn't answering his phone. They'd scheduled a 9.30am video call so it was strange that he wasn't responding.

Maybe something had come up at the private lodge in Limpopo where Sheldon Hooper worked as a field guide, his dad, Gordon, decided.

Still, he had an uneasy feeling and so he dialled his son's number again.

What he didn't realise was that hundreds of kilometres away, his son's phone was lying on the ground, ringing, while Sheldon was hanging on to life by a thread.

Moments later Gordon's whole world imploded as his wife, Cindy (47), burst into his home office.

"Sheldon's been attacked by an elephant," she told him.

Someone from the Thornybush River Lodge, the luxury reserve where he worked, had phoned but the details were vague.

Gordon (63) phoned the lodge and the news was devastating. By that point paramedics were on scene, he was told.

Sheldon (27) was lying in the arms of his 22-year-old girlfriend, Rebecca Rowles, who also worked at the lodge. CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) was being administered.

"At that point I knew he was going to die," Gordon, who's experienced in first aid, tells us. "I know that when you get to CPR, the heart has stopped."

About 20 minutes after the attack, Sheldon was dead.

The resort is about seven hours away from his home near Hartbeespoort in the North West, but Gordon tried to get there as soon as he could. When he and Cindy arrived, the lodge's management and volunteer trauma counsellors were waiting to comfort them.

"I asked to go see the site where he had died," Gordon tells us.

He stood there trying to take it all in: the upturned earth where the elephant had trampled and gored his son and the blood splattered across the grass.

DETAILS about what happened to Sheldon are still sketchy. He and a colleague were apparently out trying to fix a fence.

They were in a thicket and so focused on their work that

they were oblivious to the fact they weren't alone. Although the lodge was surrounded by an electric fence, a herd of about four elephants managed to get across from the neighbouring Kruger National Park.

One version of events is that Sheldon may have inadvertently got too close to

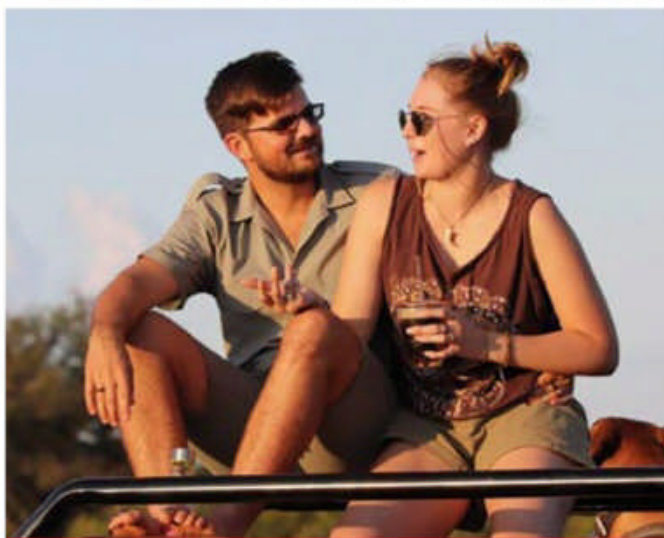
a calf, causing an adult elephant to charge at him. But Rebecca rubbishes this, saying an aggressive elephant was the cause of Sheldon's death.

The autopsy results show a massive gash in his femur, a ruptured spleen and liver, a neck injury to the C3 vertebrae and a stab wound to the chest – severing

"She was unusually aggressive and had charged numerous staff members, including myself. I mentioned that this elephant would kill someone."

But he didn't actually expect it to happen. He feels a certain degree of responsibility for what happened.

"I'd injured my knee trying to fix the fence the elephant broke. I needed medical attention and was off work for five weeks. That's why Sheldon was brought in to replace me temporarily," he explains.

Matthew says he got a voice message from Sheldon early in August, telling him that the aggressive elephant had broken in again. A few days later he phoned complaining that he'd run out of ideas about ways to fix the electric fence.

"Since Sheldon's death a fencing company fixed it and that elephant hasn't been broken in since," Matthew tells us.

A FEW weeks have passed since the accident, but the pain is still raw.

Cindy tries to stay strong while talking to us via a video call but it's impossible and the tears flow.

The couple have two younger children, Jason (24) and Carmen (21), while Gordon has a daughter, Sarah Rambarran (34), from a previous marriage.

Sheldon had chatted to his dad via Skype the day before the tragic accident.

Gordon, a managing director at a brand planning company, needed his son's help to explain how to use a piece of software to himself and three of his staff members.

Sheldon, who'd actually designed the software, was happy to oblige and they'd set up the meeting for the following day.

After they finished their call, Sheldon sent Gordon another message, saying, "Love you dad." That was the final communication he'd ever receive from his son.

Cindy reminisces about Sheldon and his incredible connection to the great outdoors.

"That's why I needed to get to the lodge, to be able to feel the things that had surrounded him – that he loved," she

says. "That gave me a lot of strength and support."

Since he was a young boy, Sheldon seemed to have a knack for connecting with animals and he also had a talent for fixing things – broken plumbing, electrical appliances, you name it, says his mother who runs an environmental events sanctuary.

Sheldon had worked at the lodge for only three weeks before the accident. But even in that short time he'd managed to make a good impression.

"The lady in the scullery came to me and she hugged me, and she said, 'You know, my angel has left us,'" Gordon says.

"And I asked, 'Why do you call him, your angel?' And she said, 'The first day I met him, when he came to River Lodge, he came and said hello to me and he said please can I see your room, all in Shangaan.

"I took him to my room. He looked around and he noticed that my fan was broken, and he just fixed it."

That's just the kind of person he was, Gordon says.

After finishing school, Sheldon enrolled to study engineering but after a year he decided it wasn't for him. Once he completed his field guide training, he found his calling, working at a number of resorts.

It was for this reason his family decided to hold his memorial in the bush in Mpumalanga.

And as they gathered to pay tribute to Sheldon they were stunned when an elephant matriarch and her herd that were grazing at a nearby dry riverbed, slowly inched closer to the crowd of mourners.

"They can feel our emotions, I believe," Cindy says.

"For me that was a real eye-opener. It made me understand what I felt from when Sheldon was a little boy – that he was connected and this was his happiest place on earth." ■

all the major arteries connecting his heart and brain.

"Had he survived he probably would've been an invalid," Gordon says.

Sheldon's colleague and best friend, Matthew Dyson, tells us he was shocked when the lodge's operations manager, JB Burger, phoned to tell him that "the elephant had got Sheldon".

But he reveals it wasn't a complete surprise. He's convinced it was the same elephant that had been terrorising staff since June.



THE FLYING SAMARITAN

Tertius has gone to heroic lengths to fly home stranded southern Africans during the Covid-19 pandemic

Tertius Myburgh has even used his own money to help stranded South Africans and Zimbabweans.

HIS Facebook profile is chock-a-block with messages of gratitude: people thanking him for reuniting them with their families, for stepping in to help when they were stranded in foreign countries without any clue how they were going to get home.

“He will always be my hero,” writes one woman. “Without him we would still be stuck!”

“My daughter together with many others is now safely home and this would not have been possible without you,” says another.

For the past few months, commercial pilot Tertius Myburgh has been helping desperate South Africans and Zimbabweans stranded in foreign countries as a result of the global lockdown to get home.

As Covid-19 hit with a vengeance, Tertius had every reason to feel sorry for himself. Late last year he’d packed up his home in Roodepoort, Gauteng, and moved with his wife, Nicolene (39), and kids, Nicolas (16), Rhodes (10) and Elenore (9), to start a new life in New Brunswick, Canada.

But three months after he’d started a new job there, the coronavirus pandemic grounded most of the world’s planes and Tertius (42) found himself out of a

job.

Although he was disappointed, he didn’t have time to mope because he soon had his hands full organising repatriation flights.

After hearing about his countrymen who were stranded in every part of the globe with no idea how they were going to get home, Tertius knew he had to step in to help.

Using only his cellphone and laptop, he has so far managed to organise five rescue missions to places as far afield as Wuhan in China and Myanmar, and he has another two lined up.

It’s no small task and speaking to us by video call from his new home in Canada, Tertius admits he wanted to quit after the first flight, which took five weeks to organise.

But word soon got around and he was bombarded with hundreds of WhatsApp messages from frantic South Africans.

TALL started back in March when Tertius’ former high-school principal, Klaus König, contacted him via Facebook Messenger.

Klaus, a former principal of Hoërskool Florida in Gauteng’s West Rand, was stuck in the Asian country of Myanmar with his sister and a colleague and knew of four other South African citizens who were in a similar predicament.

He turned to Tertius after an unsuc-

cessful bid to get help from South Africa’s department of international relations and cooperation (Dirco).

Tertius knew no South African Airways (SAA) plane would fly to Myanmar for seven people.

The only way this would be viable would be to find more citizens who wanted to be repatriated.

“Besides, SAA was doing their own repatriations and they were focusing on major cities in the United States and United Kingdom,” he says.

“Nobody was flying to that side of the world to fetch people.”

Tertius reached out to embassies in Vietnam, Cambodia and Thailand – countries on the border of Myanmar – to find out if there were any stranded South Africans in those countries but received no response.

He eventually got hold of a woman who was a seafarer on a ship in the Philippines. She put him in touch with a man who was arranging for South African and Zimbabwean citizens to get back home.

Between the two of them they discovered they now had enough stranded people to fill up a plane – but the next problem was finding an aircraft.

After being turned down by Air Namibia, Tertius approached Air Zimbabwe.

“I have known their top management for a few years due to the work I did in South Africa,” he says. “They were

immediately keen."

They agreed to supply him with a plane and cabin crew on condition that he organised all the other logistics.

Although Tertius isn't flying the aircraft himself, he's arranging everything – from organising the petrol for flights and filling up the seats to lining up all the necessary clearances from the civil aviation authorities across the world. This he has been more than happy to do.

By early April, the first flight took off from Zimbabwe to Myanmar.

There they picked up Klaus and the six other South Africans before heading to the Philippines, where they filled the seats with a mix of South Africans and Zimbabweans.

The South Africans disembarked in Johannesburg before the rest travelled on to Harare. However, the trip wasn't without problems.

"I sent my paperwork to Dirco, but they never replied to approve my flight," Tertius recalls.

"So this plane arrives at OR Tambo In-

ternational Airport, requesting landing clearance and nobody knows about it."

Tertius also hadn't arranged a quarantine facility for the passengers.

"They spent about two hours on the ground, just parked in one corner until I could sort this out," he says. "It was a steep learning curve for me."

The costs involved in arranging a trip like this are sky-high. The aeroplane alone, with just one meal and drink, costs \$10 000 (about R170 000) to hire. An airstair, which passengers use to board the plane, costs \$2 000 (R34 000).

The cabin crew charge \$4 500 (R77 000) an hour and often they're flying for up to 30 hours.

Then there's the fuel. One trip guzzles around 250 000 litres, costing anywhere between R5-R8 a litre, which bumps up the total cost for the trip to more than R1 million.

Tickets are sold to passengers for R17 500. Tertius says they've tried to keep fares low to ensure everyone can afford them. But this means he and his wife, a business developer for South African private airline company CemAir, have had to dip into their own pockets to cover additional expenses.

For instance, during one repatriation trip, the Boeing 767's engine broke down in Bangkok which meant that the 140

passengers were stranded for three weeks, many without money for food and accommodation, while the aircraft was being fixed.

Tertius decided to book out a nearby hotel for these people who'd put so much faith in him. Luckily the hotel was willing to offer him a special rate that included breakfast and dinner.

"I was running that bill from my credit card, giving my credit card details over the phone so they could do manual transactions," he says.

All these unforeseen expenses have added up, making a big dent in Tertius and Nicolene's savings.

"We've used up everything we had but we made the decision to do this. To help people."

His kids have been incredibly supportive, Tertius adds.

"They hear me speak on the phone to some of these passengers and they want to know why this one is crying or why that one is angry."

Nicolene's knowledge of aviation has also come in handy.

She's currently running her own repatriation system for CemAir but it's only within Africa.

It's been two weeks since Tertius' last repatriation flight from China. The next trip is to Riyadh in Saudi Arabia then it's New Zealand.

"There have been many times I've wanted to get out of this," he says. "But then you hear about people's plight and you feel compelled to help." ■

It's the first time in 12 years she's designed crockery, she tells us. Life, after all, goes on.

"I'm a granny of two. I'm a crone but I'm happy. And I'm rich – rich in friendships, soul and love. All the important things in life," she says.

Clients and friends pop in for a cappuccino, or just to say hello to Jenna.

She's taken many under her wing and given them the opportunity to prove themselves in the design industry.

This one's mom she knew from way back, she tells us, while that one is a former client.

All her design consultants are women.

"Women contribute so much but the patriarchal society wants us to sit back and shut up. No," Jenna says, a glint in her eye.

"You can be caring and feminine and strong. I surround myself with women of that calibre and I especially want to mentor and help young women to become successful."

Jenna perches elegantly on an antique chair with her 18-year-old poodle, Rose, behind her.

"Rosy is blind and deaf but she'll always be my baby. She had her little ones in my bed years ago," Jenna says, gesturing with a hand sporting a huge pink jewelled ring, one of her own designs.

After returning from her 11-month sabbatical some two years ago, she's been working harder than ever. But even while away to heal she wasn't idle.

"That would be impossible. I'm a Virgo, so I need to stay busy and live close to the earth. I designed during the sabbatical and wasn't involved in the operational side of the business."

She still insists Dex never cheated and says there wasn't any major blow-out that led to the end of her relationship. He'd simply fallen out of love with her.

Jenna doesn't want to say much about the R1-million lawsuit she's brought against him.

"Dex is a very private person and I respect that. I wanted to keep this news out of the media but I have a fiduciary responsibility that debts against the company are settled," she explains.

The matter is still in court. Directors had been allowed to take loans from her company and she says Dex defaulted on such a loan.

A few moments later two glasses with naartjie juice, ice and fresh mint are placed on the table in front of us.

One of her best friends, Annette Palf-raman, moved in with Jenna during lockdown.

"She's also a Virgo so we moved into my townhouse here in the city and did the garden on the rooftop."

"We cooked delicious, nourishing food. Food isn't just to stuff your face with, it's supposed to be an experience."

She shows us a few of the new designs she's working on.

"They're characterised by strong symbols and the stone associated with strength," she explains.

Then she jumps up again and shows us the 6kg weights she uses to keep fit and strong. She works with a fitness trainer three times a week.

"We go for a walk but it's actually almost a jog. I also do boxing. I put up the inflatable boxing bag in the office and people wonder who's getting a pummeling," she says, chuckling.

OUTSIDE in the lush garden, which she planted herself, Jenna takes a drag on a cigarette.

She's been smoking less since lockdown, she says.

The conversation turns to her relationship status. Despite what's happened, she hasn't entirely lost faith in men.

"I have many male friends. It's been like this my whole life. You get good men out there," she says.

After two divorces and her failed relationship with Dex, does she think she'll ever marry again?

"I'm not closing my head or heart to it. Would it be nice to meet an intelligent, gentle soul who loves strong women and might be a few years younger?"

"Sure, but I'm not holding my breath," she says with a wink. ■

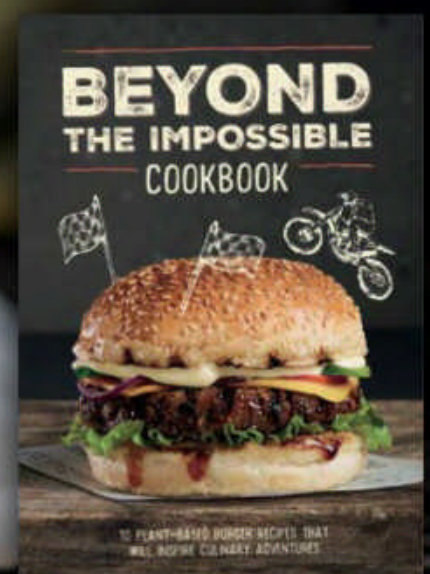

 - ▶ 10ml (2t) whole cumin seeds
 - ▶ 3 cinnamon sticks
 - ▶ olive oil
 - ▶ 2 onions, sliced into rings
 - ▶ 250g basmati rice
 - ▶ 80ml (1/3c) raisins
 - ▶ 750ml (3c) chicken stock
 - ▶ 10g each fresh parsley and coriander, chopped
 - ▶ handful toasted hazelnuts, chopped
- TO SERVE**
- ▶ 125ml (1/2c) full-cream plain yoghurt
 - ▶ 30ml (2T) olive oil

- 1 Season the chicken with salt and pepper. Place in a large bowl and add the spices and a generous splash of olive oil. Mix thoroughly.
- 2 Heat 30ml (2T) oil in a saucepan or pot and fry the onions slowly until caramelised. Remove from the saucepan.
- 3 In the same saucepan, fry the chicken in another 45ml (3T) hot oil until browned. Remove from the pot.
- 4 Add the rice to the saucepan, mix with the flavoursome pan juices, then add the onion. Season with salt and pepper. Add the raisins and 3/4 of the chicken stock. Cover, reduce the heat and simmer for about 20 minutes or until the rice is soft and most of the liquid has evaporated. After 10 minutes of simmering, add the chicken (adding more stock as needed).
- 5 Remove from the heat. Then remove the lid, cover with a tea towel, return the lid and put the saucepan back on the stove to steam for another 10 minutes.
- 6 Mix the herbs and hazelnuts through the dish and transfer to a serving plate.
- 7 **To serve** Mix the yoghurt and olive oil and serve as a condiment with the chicken and rice.



MEDITERRANEAN STUFFED CHICKEN BREASTS

This meal of chicken breasts stuffed with tomatoes, olives and feta is fit for dinner guests.

SERVES 4

PREPARATION: 30 MIN

COOKING: ABOUT 40 MIN

- ▶ 3 chicken breasts, skin on and deboned
- ▶ salt and freshly ground pepper

FILLING

- ▶ 100g feta, crumbled
- ▶ 45-60ml (3-4T) bottled sun-dried tomatoes, chopped

- ▶ 3 bacon rashers, fried and chopped
- ▶ 80ml ($\frac{1}{3}$ c) chopped toasted almonds or toasted sunflower seeds
- ▶ a few sprigs fresh basil
- ▶ oil for cooking

VEGGIES

- ▶ 2 onions, roughly chopped
- ▶ 1 whole garlic bulb, halved
- ▶ 1 can (400g) tomatoes
- ▶ 80ml ($\frac{1}{3}$ c) chopped fresh basil
- ▶ 4 baby marrows, sliced
- ▶ 1 each red and yellow pepper, cut into pieces
- ▶ 125ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ c) black olives
- ▶ 30ml (2T) capers
- ▶ salt and freshly ground

- pepper
- ▶ a pinch of sugar

Preheat the oven to 190°C.

- 1 Make a cut on one side of the chicken breast – but don't slice through – and butterfly. Season with salt and pepper.
- 2 **Filling** Mix the feta, tomatoes, bacon and nuts or seeds and place a spoonful of the mixture on the bottom half of the chicken breast. Add the fresh basil. Close and secure with a toothpick or string.
- 3 Heat a little oil in a pan

and fry the chicken until light brown.

- 4 **Veggies** Mix all the ingredients, season with salt, pepper and sugar and transfer to an oven-proof dish. Cook for about 20 minutes, then add the chicken on top – skin-side up – and cook for another 20 minutes until the chicken is done but still moist and most of the liquid has evaporated. Serve with noodles.

TIP

To cook the chicken separately in the pan, fry until browned, close the lid, turn the heat down and steam for another 10 minutes until cooked.

CHICKEN KEBABS

The curry basting used for lamb kebabs works equally well on chicken. I use chicken breasts with skin on and I debone them myself.

MAKES 5 LARGE KEBABS

PREPARATION: 30-40 MIN

MARINATING: 1 HOUR TO OVERNIGHT

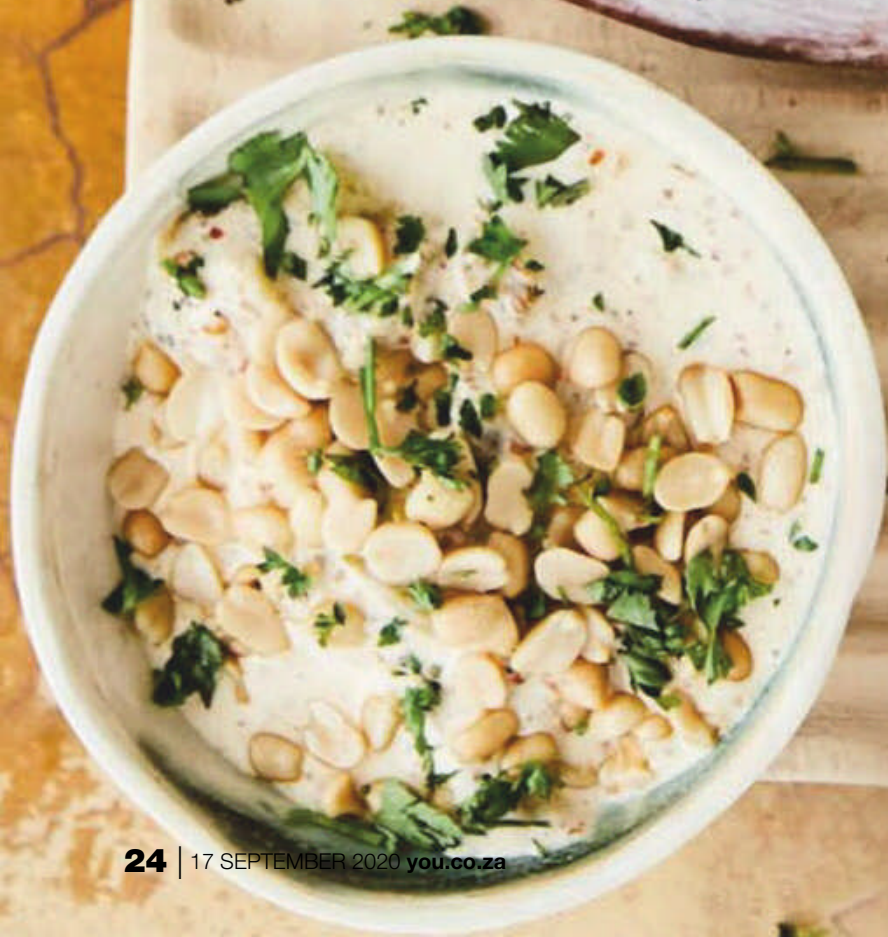
COOKING: ABOUT 20 MIN

- 1 small onion, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, roughly chopped
- 15ml (1T) grated fresh ginger
- 5ml (1t) grated lemon zest
- 30ml (2T) lemon juice
- 15ml (1T) ground coriander
- 15ml (1T) ground cumin
- 15ml (1T) roasted masala
- 15ml (2T) biryani masala
- 5ml (1t) salt
- 60-80ml ($\frac{1}{4}$ - $\frac{1}{3}$ c) chutney
- 125ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ c) full-cream plain yoghurt
- 3 chicken breasts, skin on and deboned
- 2 red onions, cut into wedges
- 100g dried peaches

TO SERVE

- flatbread
- mango atchar sauce (recipe below left)

- 1 Add the onion, garlic, ginger, lemon zest, spices and salt to a food processor and chop. Mix in the chutney and yoghurt.
- 2 Cube the chicken, place in a non-metal dish and pour the marinade over. Marinate for an hour or overnight in the fridge.
- 3 On kebab skewers, thread the chicken alternating with the onions and peaches. Braai over coals or roast in a hot oven until cooked.
- 4 **To serve** Serve on flatbread with the mango atchar sauce.



MANGO ATCHAR SAUCE

MAKES 250ML (1C)

- 1 jar (410g) store-bought mango atchar
- 125ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ c) coconut milk
- generous handful fresh coriander, chopped
- 60ml ($\frac{1}{4}$ c) toasted coconut
- handful unsalted peanuts

- 1 Put the atchar and coconut milk in a food processor and pulse until smooth and well-combined. Transfer to a serving dish and sprinkle the coriander, toasted coconut and peanuts over. Serve with the kebabs.

STIR-FRY CHICKEN WITH ORANGE SOY SAUCE

The sweet citrus sauce is the perfect finishing touch to this stir-fry.

SERVES 4

PREPARATION: 20 MIN

COOKING: 20 MIN

▸ 2-3 oranges, peeled

STIR-FRY

▸ 80ml ($\frac{1}{3}$ c) lemon juice

▸ 100-125ml honey or sugar

▸ 60ml ($\frac{1}{4}$ c) soy sauce

▸ 3-4 chicken breast fillets, sliced into strips

▸ salt

▸ oil

▸ handful sesame seeds

▸ 1 bunch spring onions, chopped

▸ 1 red pepper, seeds removed and sliced into strips

▸ $\frac{1}{4}$ Chinese cabbage, shredded

▸ 15ml (1T) garlic-and-ginger paste

TO SERVE

▸ Chinese noodles or jasmine rice

▸ peanuts and fresh coriander for sprinkling (optional)

1 Cut the orange in segments, catching up the juice while you slice. Set aside the segments.

2 Stir-fry Add the lemon juice to the orange juice until you have 125ml of

liquid. Add the sugar or honey and soy sauce and mix well.

3 Season the chicken with salt.

4 Heat the oil in a wok and fry the chicken strips until just cooked. Sprinkle sesame seeds over.

5 Add the spring onions, peppers, cabbage and garlic-and-ginger paste and stir-fry fast for

about 1 minute – the veggies should still be crispy.

6 Add the sauce and stir-fry until fragrant – about 2-3 minutes. Then add the orange segments.

7 To serve Serve the stir-fry on noodles or rice and sprinkle peanuts and coriander over (if using).

CRUMBED CHICKEN WITH LEMON

This dish is similar to a schnitzel.

SERVES 4

PREPARATION: 15 MIN

COOKING: 20 MIN

- ▶ 4 chicken breast fillets, slightly flattened to equal thickness
- ▶ salt and freshly ground pepper
- ▶ 125ml (¼c) cake flour

- ▶ 125ml (¼c) grated pecorino (or any hard Italian cheese)
- ▶ 2 eggs, whisked
- ▶ oil for shallow-frying
- ▶ butter
- ▶ juice of 2 lemons
- ▶ grated zest of 1 lemon
- ▶ 15ml (1T) chopped parsley

TO SERVE

- ▶ steamed broccoli

- 1 Season the chicken breasts with salt and pepper.
- 2 Mix the cake flour and the pecorino and sprinkle in the bottom of a flat dish.
- 3 Pour the whisked eggs in another flat dish.
- 4 Roll the chicken breasts in the egg, then in the flour mixture.
- 5 Heat the oil in a pan

and fry the chicken until golden. Close the lid and steam until cooked. Remove from the pan.

- 6 Wipe the pan clean and melt the butter. Add the lemon juice and zest, parsley and garlic and heat until warm.
- 7 **To serve** Serve the chicken breasts on the broccoli and pour the lemon sauce over it.

TIP

Halve a lemon and fry lightly in a pan – sliced side down – until slightly toasted. Serve with the chicken.



CRISPY SESAME CHICKEN WITH STICKY SAUCE

This dish is simply delicious.

SERVES 3

PREPARATION: 20 MIN

COOKING: 20 MIN

FLOUR MIXTURE

- ▶ 160ml ($\frac{2}{3}$ c) cake flour
- ▶ 2,5ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ t) salt
- ▶ 2,5ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ t) pepper
- ▶ 2,5ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ t) garlic salt
- ▶ 10ml (2 t) paprika

- ▶ 15ml (1T) sesame seeds
- CHICKEN**

- ▶ 2 eggs, whisked
- ▶ 80ml ($\frac{1}{3}$ c) corn flour
- ▶ 4 chicken breast fillets, cubed

SAUCE

- ▶ 30ml (2T) oil
- ▶ 3 garlic cloves, crushed
- ▶ 30ml (2T) rice wine vinegar
- ▶ 60ml ($\frac{1}{4}$ c) honey
- ▶ 60ml ($\frac{1}{4}$ c) sweet chilli sauce

- ▶ 90ml (6T) tomato sauce
- ▶ 60ml ($\frac{1}{4}$ c) brown sugar
- ▶ 125 ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ c) soy sauce

TO SERVE

- ▶ jasmine rice or Chinese noodles
- ▶ chopped spring onions and sesame seeds for sprinkling

1 Flour mixture Mix all the ingredients and transfer to a flat dish.

2 Chicken Put the eggs

and corn flour in separate flat dishes. Dip the chicken cubes in egg, followed by the corn flour, egg again and finally the flour mixture.

3 Heat enough oil for shallow-frying in a wok and fry the chicken until golden but still moist. Remove and wipe the pan clean.

4 Sauce Mix all the ingredients for the sauce, pour into the pan and simmer until fragrant – about 2-3 minutes. Return the chicken cubes and heat through.

5 To serve Serve the chicken on the rice or noodles and sprinkle with the chopped spring onions and sesame seeds. ■

TIP

Buy chicken breasts on the bone and with the skin on – they're easy to debone. Use a fillet knife and use your fingers to find the bone. Use the bones for making stock.

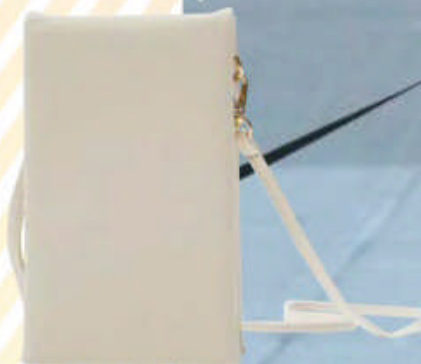

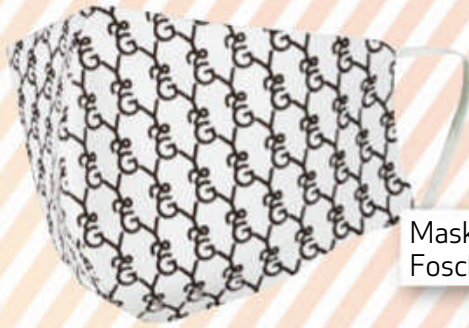

If you don’t cleanse thoroughly, your skin will struggle to do this and the build-up can cause breakouts.”

Woods suggests warming the cleanser between your hands and using deep, lifting strokes to massage it into your face. Then, remove with a warm cloth and repeat the process. Double cleansing ensures a complete clean.

Super-hydrate your hands

These include products with high strengths (1% would be considered high strength for a non-prescription product) of retinol, which mustn't be used during the day as it reacts with the sun, or slow-absorbing ingredients that need time to sink in. First, cleanse skin well and follow with a gentle, alcohol-free toner. Next, apply the mask or facial oil, massaging in well, using upward strokes. Put a towel on your pillow to avoid leaving stains.

"The skin around your eyes is thinner and more delicate than the rest of your face," says Dr Alexis Granite, consultant dermatologist at the Cadogan Clinic in London. "Using an anti-ageing eye cream may help improve or prevent wrinkles here by improving hydration and protecting against UV light and pollutants."

Scrub lips every other day

As we get older, our skin produces less collagen and loses vital lipids (fats). "Collagen is a protein that supports your skin's tissue and makes lips plump, while lipids provide the 'packing,'" explains British anti-ageing facialist Cherry Woods. "By descaling flaky skin, you'll trigger the production of new cells, which leads to visibly plumper lips."

You'll also create a smoother surface so lipstick lasts longer. Apply a layer of petroleum jelly, then use a soft toothbrush to gently slough off any dead skin. Or, try a targeted lip scrub.

Then, brush brows downward, etch along the top with a brow powder or pencil – a colour slightly lighter than your hair will be most flattering – comb the hairs back into place then fill in any gaps. Gently stroke a touch of brow gel over them to keep in place."

"Serums are formulated with smaller particle sizes, which allow a higher concentration of active ingredients to penetrate more deeply into your skin than creams," explains Dr Alexis Granite, consultant dermatologist at the Cadogan Clinic in London.

"Some of the best hydrating ingredients to look for include antioxidant vitamins C and E; vitamin A (retinol); plumping hyaluronic acid; peptides, which reduce water loss and stimulate collagen; and ceramides, which replenish natural lipids and lock in moisture."

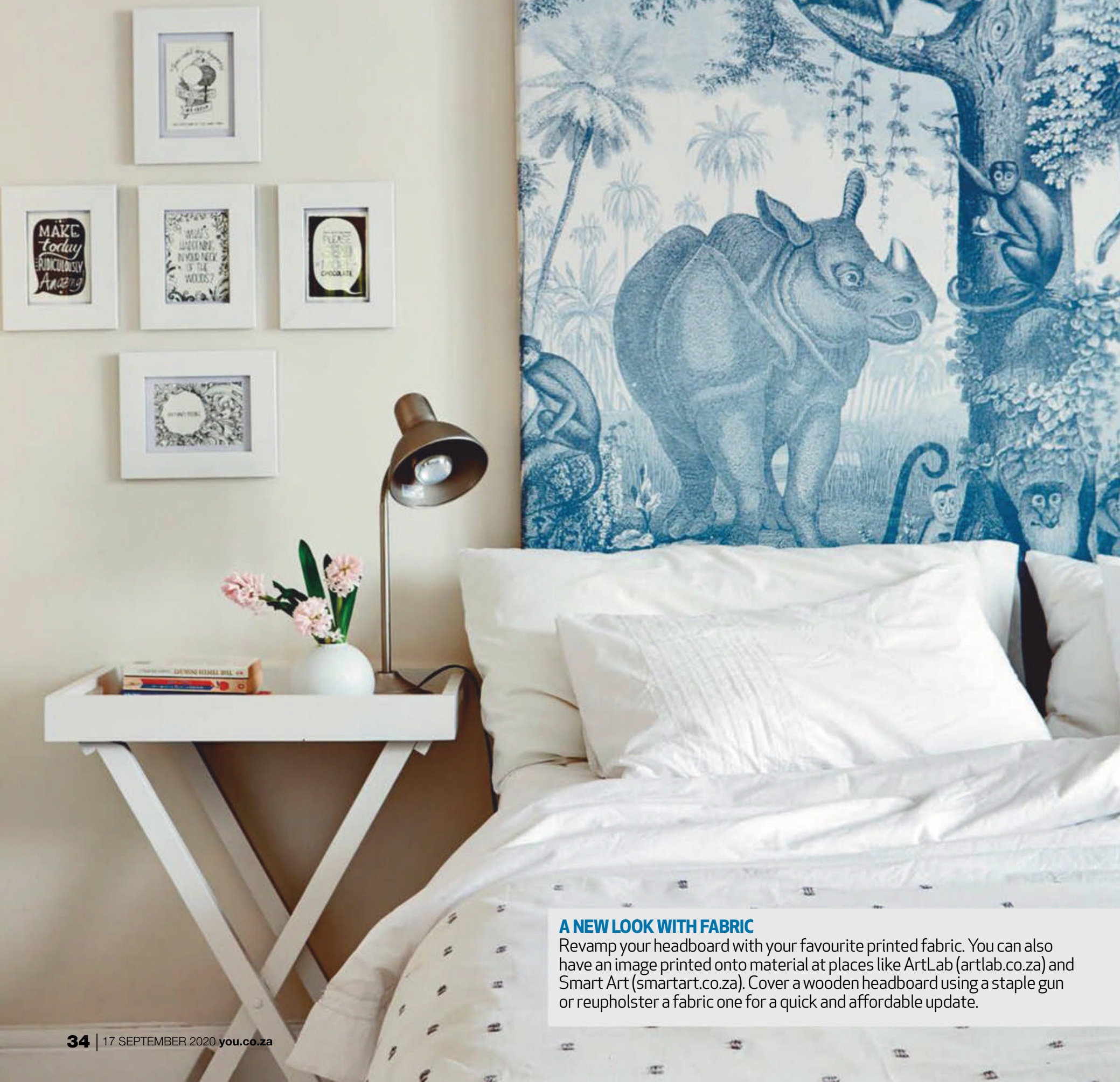

Make a unique headboard or give yours a makeover with these DIY ideas COMPILED BY KIM ARENDSE



A NEW LOOK WITH FABRIC

Revamp your headboard with your favourite printed fabric. You can also have an image printed onto material at places like ArtLab (artlab.co.za) and Smart Art (smartart.co.za). Cover a wooden headboard using a staple gun or reupholster a fabric one for a quick and affordable update.



PLAY WITH PAINT

Use a pencil to lightly draw a silhouette of your favourite city (or anything else you fancy) onto the wall behind the bed, taking into account the bed's width.

Use masking tape to outline the drawing and use paint to colour it in. Allow the paint to dry completely before removing the tape.

DISPLAY A COLLECTION

Use a pencil to lightly draw a headboard shape of your choice onto the wall behind the bed. Then use a collection of pictures, prints, buttons, stickers and anything else you want to stick into the framework you created.

You can use Prestik, glue or modge podge for sticking. Ensure the items are close together but spaced evenly apart.



REPURPOSE A RUG

Give an old rug a new lease of life as a headboard. For this affordable idea, simply buy a second-hand rug from a reputable website such as Facebook Marketplace, Gumtree or OLX, or search in the bargain bin at your favourite homeware store. You could also hang up a large throw on hooks or using double-sided tape.

WRAP IT UP

IT'S not something men talk about in the same way as women do. For women the "change of life" can be an intense experience with distressing symptoms that include night sweats, mood swings and hot flushes.

For men the change is more gradual, so it's not quite as noticeable. The symptoms could even be seen as simply part of getting older – the loss of energy, the bulging belly, the trouble sleeping. Not to mention the accompanying loss of libido...

Most of these symptoms are the result of decreased testosterone, a sure sign of advancing years. But some men are hit harder than others and sometimes the so-called "male menopause" wreaks havoc with the body.

There's a name for the condition: andropause, aka testosterone deficiency syndrome (TDS). And help is at hand in the form of hormone therapy, which involves a testosterone injection every three months.

But experts warn this shouldn't be considered a quick fix for men with erectile dysfunction or general lack of energy. Here's what you need to know about the signs, symptoms and treatment of age-related low testosterone.

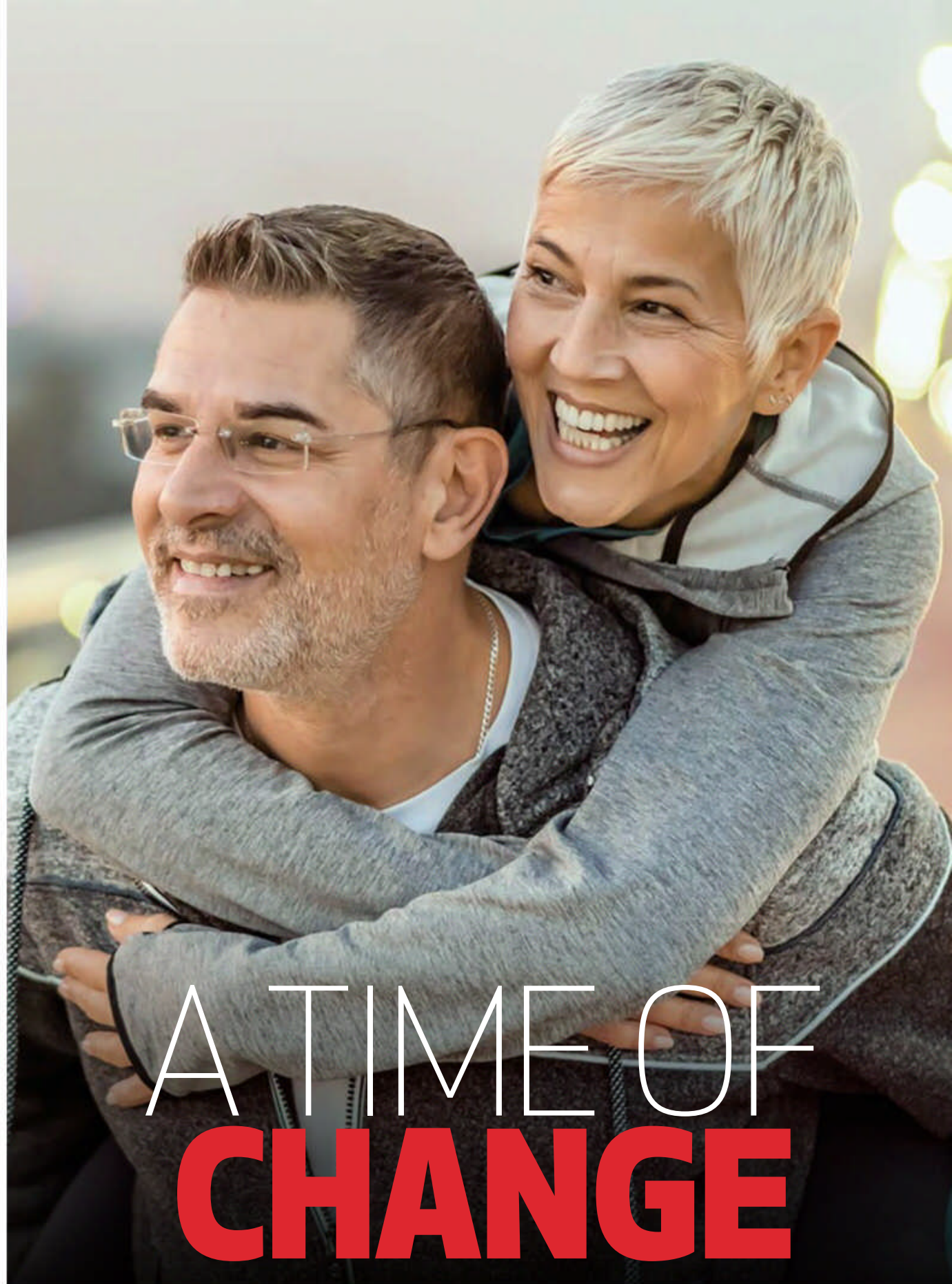
WHEN IS IT ANDROPAUSE?

Boys start producing testosterone in adolescence but production of the hormone starts to decline when men are in their thirties, says Professor Riana Bornman from the University of Pretoria's School of Health Systems and Public Health.

From age 40, they start to lose 1 to 2% of testosterone a year. When testosterone levels have dropped to the extent that a man experiences a combination of symptoms (see box) that wreak havoc with his life, male "menopause" has set in.

By their mid-50s about 30% of men suffer from TDS, says Professor Mohamed Haffeejee, head of urology at Wits University in Johannesburg. By age 70, their testosterone levels may be down by as much as 50%. Though all men suffer lower testosterone production as they age, only some will need hormone therapy, he adds.

The type of therapy depends on the extent of the decline in testosterone level. Nowadays, a testosterone level lower than 12 nanomoles per litre (nmol/L) of blood is considered abnormal, but hor-

mone therapy is usually only advisable when the level drops to 8nmol/L, which is when the patient is diagnosed with TDS, Bornman says.

Contributing factors to an increased risk of TDS include trauma to the testes and contracting mumps during or after puberty.

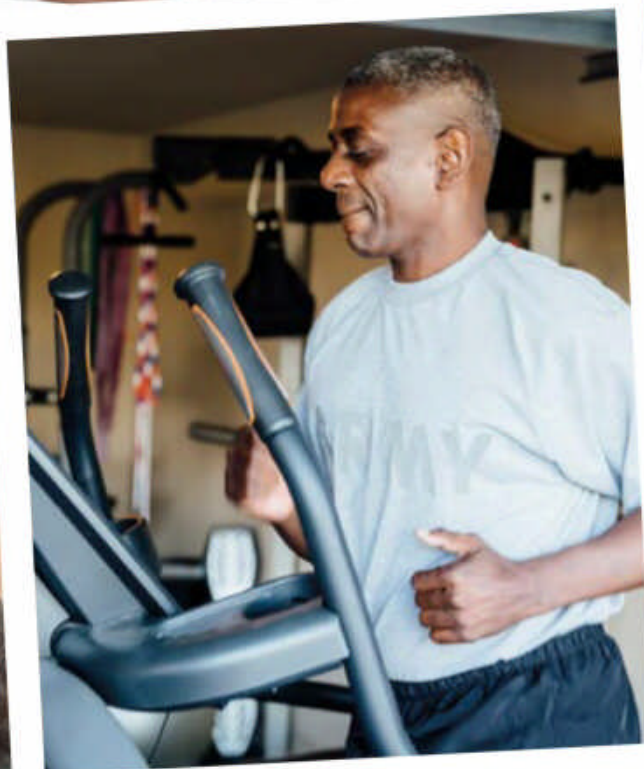
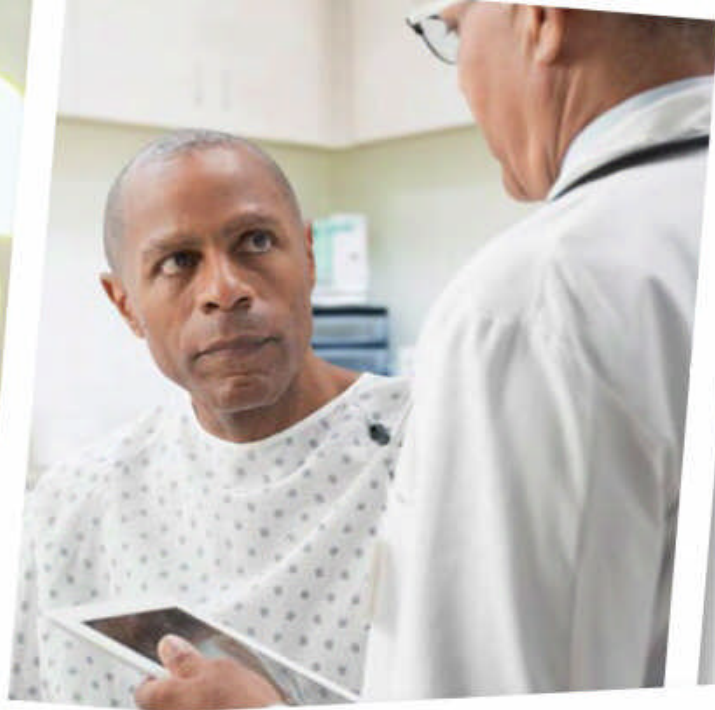
WHEN TO SEE A DOCTOR

Low testosterone levels in older men often go unnoticed. This often happens because many men who have low testosterone experience no symptoms.

Also, the signs and symptoms can be caused by a number of other things. An increased girth measurement, insulin resistance and osteoporosis are all linked to low testosterone levels, says Dr Hilton Kaplan, a Cape Town endocrinologist.

Some of the symptoms of TDS are related to normal ageing, or can be associated with other conditions such as thyroid problems or alcohol abuse. They can also be a side effect of certain medications, such as those prescribed for hypertension.

Erectile dysfunction, for example, can

also be a sign of vascular disease, Haffee warns. When changes to the vascular walls cause the arteries and veins to narrow – as is the case when cholesterol clogs the arteries – too little blood reaches the penis, causing difficulty getting an erection. This should be seen as a warning sign of possible heart disease and it's advisable to get an electrocardiogram (ECG).

Write down your symptoms when you experience them and discuss it with your primary care physician. If a blood test confirms your testosterone levels are abnormally low, the doctor can recommend hormone therapy or refer you to an endocrinologist or urologist for specialist treatment.

HOW TO HELP THE MAN IN YOUR LIFE

Men with testosterone deficiency syndrome (TDS) can experience such a loss of self-esteem and confidence that they'll want to completely avoid sexual contact, says Professor Riana Bornman, an expert in andropause from Pretoria.

It's usually his significant other who'll persuade a man to see a doctor. But be sensitive, she adds.

"Don't say things like 'you're get-

ting old' or 'you're not the man you used to be,' she cautions.

Dr Elmar Mulder Craig, a sexologist and relationship expert from Pretoria, suggests saying something like, "I read somewhere these can be symptoms of decreased testosterone levels. You don't have as much energy to do stuff anymore." Then suggest that he gets his testosterone level checked.

IS HORMONE THERAPY SAFE?

Testosterone injections have had a bad reputation over the years. But that's because the injections used to be administered weekly, causing sharp peaks and crashes in testosterone levels.

"Because of this see-saw effect men would feel fitter and happier one day than they have in years, only for this to be followed by periods of deep despondency," Haffee says.

Other side effects of the weekly shots included irritability, anxiety and possible negative effects on the liver, cholesterol and blood count. The new injection, which is administered every three months, has eliminated these side effects, he adds.

Once you've started with hormone therapy you must continue with it for the rest of your life – unless you're diagnosed with prostate cancer. This is because testosterone supplements can advance the cancer's growth, Bornman says.

So before you start with the treatment your doctor must rule out any sign of prostate cancer. You'll also need regular blood tests for prostate-specific antigen (PSA), a protein the body produces more of when you have prostate cancer.

The three-monthly testosterone shots cost about R2 300 each. It can take weeks or even months before you notice a difference but it's worth the investment, Born-

man says.

WILL LIFESTYLE CHANGES MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

A healthy diet and regular exercise can

help maintain muscle mass and build strength. Exercise is also a mood enhancer and will aid peaceful sleep, Haffee advises.

It's important to keep your weight down as overweight men are more at risk, Bornman warns. The testosterone levels of overweight and obese men drop more dramatically because fat tissue contains an enzyme that breaks down testosterone. ■

SYMPTOMS OF MALE MENOPAUSE

If your ex-husband isn't a threat to your son's mental and physical wellbeing you should allow him to have access to his child. Can I claim for damages or loss because of loadshedding?

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ADVICE

LOADSHEDDING is here to stay – at least for the foreseeable future. That's why it's important to establish if your insurance covers damages or losses to your property or electronic equipment caused by frequent electricity outages.

TIP

Take care when using candles or oil lamps during a power outage. If a fire breaks out due to your negligence, your claim will be denied.



THEFT

Burglars might exploit loadshedding as it disables alarms and electric fences – unless there are backup batteries. Most insurers pay out claims for burglaries that happened during loadshedding, as long as they weren't due to the client's negligence (such as that the alarm was faulty anyway) or lack of proper maintenance (such as failing to replace a dead backup battery).

If, for example, your house alarm was disabled by loadshedding and your backup battery was unexpectedly out of order too, your claim will be considered. But you must be able to prove the alarm system had been properly maintained.

For a successful claim, you must adhere to policy requirements. For example, if your policy requires burglar bars and you don't have any, your claim can be denied.

The insurer also requires there be clear indications of forced entry (such as a broken door or window) to your home or outbuilding to consider a claim.



ELECTRONIC EQUIPMENT

It can cost you a pretty penny if electronic equipment such as TVs, computers, fridges and washing machines give up the ghost when there's a power surge after loadshedding. A power surge is when too much electricity suddenly surges through your home's wiring. It can happen quickly and cause major damage.

Most insurance policies don't automatically cover damages or

loss caused by power surges. You'll need to take out additional cover for that, which means you'll pay a little more on your monthly premium. Ask the insurer how much cover you'll get. Sometimes the claim amount is limited to a specific amount or number of claims, for example you may only claim for power-surge damages twice in a 12-month period.

Lightning storms can also cause power surges. If you live in a lightning-prone area, check your policy documents to see if a lightning conductor is a requirement and if it is, make sure you have one or your claim could be denied.

Bear in mind that if you suffer damages because your power supplier cut your electricity as a result of you failing to pay your bill, you're not covered.



A GENERATOR

As loadshedding has increased, so too has the use of home generators. These are expensive to replace and are also a fire hazard if not installed and used properly. Some insurers cover generators in their policies but it's by no means the norm.

Check your policy document to see if you're automatically covered, says Greta Goosen, MiWay Insurance's head of client services.

If you have cover for a generator, it usually falls under your building or house contents insurance. If it's a non-portable (in other words permanently installed) generator, it falls under building cover, while a portable generator is covered under home contents.

If it's not automatically covered, you can ask for it to be added – which means paying a little extra on your monthly premium.

For a successful claim, you must also comply with the legal requirements and regulations for generators, for example, it must be correctly installed. This includes the requirement that it must be installed by a qualified, licensed electrician who must issue a clearance certificate that the generator meets SABS standards.

Your insurer might have other requirements too, for example that it must be at least 5m away from the house in a well-ventilated area; that you install effective smoke and carbon-monoxide detectors; and that the fuel for the generator must be stored in a separate, locked area. Having a fire extinguisher of a specific size, for example at least 4,5kg, is also often another requirement.



GAS APPLIANCES

You must notify your insurer when you install a gas appliance, or any claims relating to it can be denied.

To get cover, you must also comply with the laws on gas appliances, including supplying a certificate of conformity for

gas appliances. The appliance must be installed by a technician who's certified by the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Safety Association of Southern Africa. This is crucial because if the installation wasn't done properly by someone who wasn't licensed, the claim will be denied.

Your insurer might also have additional requirements, such as that your gas canisters be kept in a locked, ventilated cabinet or cage, even if it's outside the house.

This is usually covered in your building insurance policy but it's worth checking with your insurer.

You must also establish if your insurer has specific installation requirements because bad workmanship is usually an exclusion on policies.

Notify your insurer when installing a gas appliance, or any claims related to it may be denied

Tracee Ellis Ross

The Black-ish star talks about how she prepared for her new movie role

THE RIGHT MOVES Her mom is a music icon, but it wasn't just the singing that Tracee Ellis Ross was worried about for her role in *The High Note*. Turns out Di-ana Ross' daughter was also anxious about getting the dance moves right.

"I've never been more overwhelmed in my life," Tracee (47) said of the dance numbers she had to learn, admitting that she asked the choreographers to cut her some slack. "I was like, 'We've been working on this one little move for quite some time now. Should we perhaps vary it and come up with a different move that my body seems to want to bend in the shape of? Because what I'm doing doesn't look like what you're doing.'"

FORK IN THE ROAD In the movie Tracee plays R&B superstar Grace Davis, who hasn't made any new music in a decade but instead plays it safe by performing her biggest hits over and over for her fans. Her assistant, Maggie (played by Dakota Johnson), is a lone voice of support when Grace says she wants to record a new album.

"Grace spent her life being what she thought everybody wanted her to be so she could make her dreams come true," Tracee says. "And she's at that point in

her life where that crossroad happens – 'I can keep doing what I've been doing because it works or I can be who I am and let my real Grace Davis fly.'"

FINDING HER VOICE The Black-ish star did her own singing in the movie, working with a voice coach to prepare the six original songs. She also studied many, many clips of performers, she told *The New York Times*.

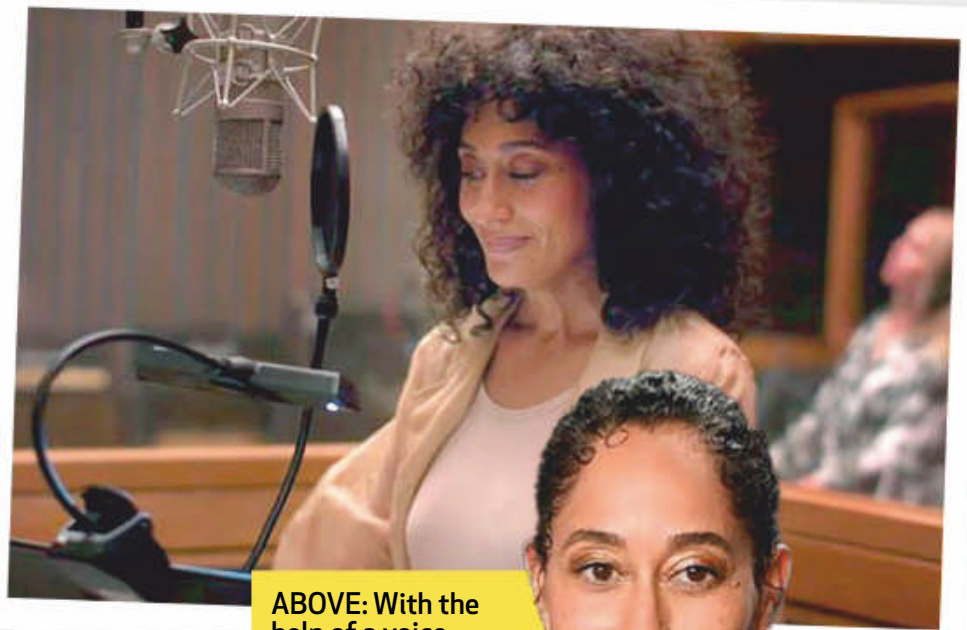
"I've always wanted to sing, and I've also always really wanted the right movie to come along. This was a special enough role to encourage me

to walk through my terror."

The Golden Globe winner was worried her singing would be "comedic and silly", she says.

"It was terrifying for me to face my dreams. But I went after it, and I'm so happy with how it all turned out." ■

Project Power ★★★

Sci-fi action. It's early morning and a freighter docks in the New Orleans harbour. A middleman, Biggie (Rodrigo Santoro from 300), oversees the unloading of crates full of pills, which he offers to a group of "young entrepreneurs" for distribution.

Among them is Newt (Colson Baker, aka rapper Machine Gun Kelly) and teenager Robin (Dominique Fishback), who's desperately trying to pay her mom's medical bills.

The illicit drug, called Power, bestows superpowers on

whoever takes it. You can be anything from bulletproof to invisible or elastic – but only for five minutes. And in some cases, the pill can be deadly.

Robin forms an alliance with policeman Frank Shaver (Inception's Joseph Gordon-Levitt) who takes the pills to give him the upper hand over criminals. But she finds herself in deep trouble when she crosses paths with former soldier Art (Jamie Foxx), who has a history of taking Power and is tracking down his daughter's kidnappers.

Mattson Tomlin, co-writer of the new Batman movie featuring Robert Pattinson, wrote the script. Though many critics have complained about the unoriginality of the premise, comparing it to Limitless (2011), Gordon-Levitt, Foxx and Fishback are its highlights. The latter manages to steal many scenes as the fearless Robin.

There's plenty of action, while generous doses of humour provide welcome escapism from the pandemic.

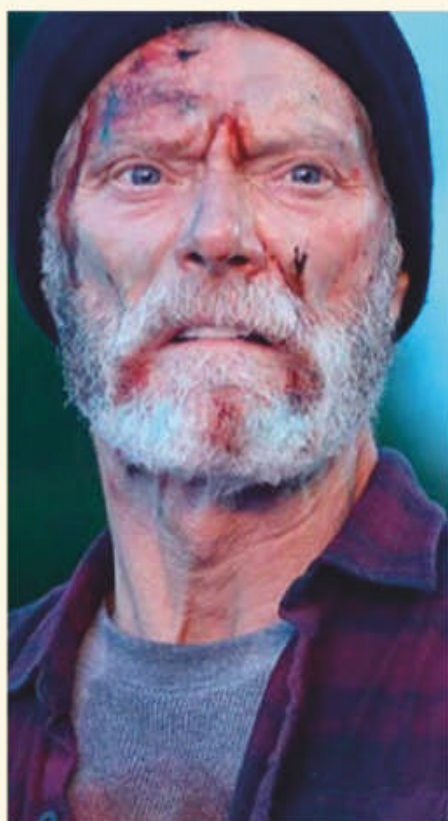

Get to know Snoh Aalegra

LITTLE GIRL, BIG DREAMS If you're a fan of Sade or Amy Winehouse, you'll likely love the soulful, smooth voice of Snoh.

The artist, born Shahrzad Fooladi to Iranian parents in Sweden, started singing as a pre-teen, obsessed with the music her mother listened to. She was drawn to big vocalists from a young age, and credits the likes of Stevie Wonder, Whitney Houston and Michael Jackson for shaping her sound.

Persian music and poetry, which were part of her upbringing, also play a role. "We're very warm, poetic, romantic," she says of her Iranian heritage. "I love that side, but at the same time, my love for melancholy and minor chords when I make music comes from the dark Swedish winters."

ALL THE FEELS After moving to London then Los Angeles, to create and collaborate on a larger scale, she had the opportunity to work with John Mayer and Sia, as well as rapper Common. Then came her debut album, *Feels*, in 2017.

Dealing with a difficult breakup, she poured her heart into the project, much like an open diary for her fans. It paid off, receiving rave reviews.

"There was a lot of self-healing and self-discovery. I had no choice but to share every chapter with you guys," she said to fans. "I may saturate the colours a little, but I use my own experience as the foundation for each song – all my lyrics are real life."

Her follow-up album – *Ugh, Those Feels Again* – was released last year and features singles *Whoa* and *Find Someone Like You*.

"I don't think my sound has changed too much. It's a little bit more open, more airy – a hint happier than the last album. I just make music that I love. I've let go of trying to please people."

STAR QUALITY The 32-year-old, who's been described as a breath of fresh air to R&B, also caught the attention of the late legend Prince. She was mentored by the icon for more than two years, before he died in 2016.

"He was one of the first people – on his level – who told me I'm great."

They went on to become friends, even sharing doughnuts at 4am after one of his concerts. "He was wearing his whole stage outfit, you know? He'd have a turtle-neck, bootleg-cut pants with his diamond-covered sceptre and just two bodyguards, and there we go!"

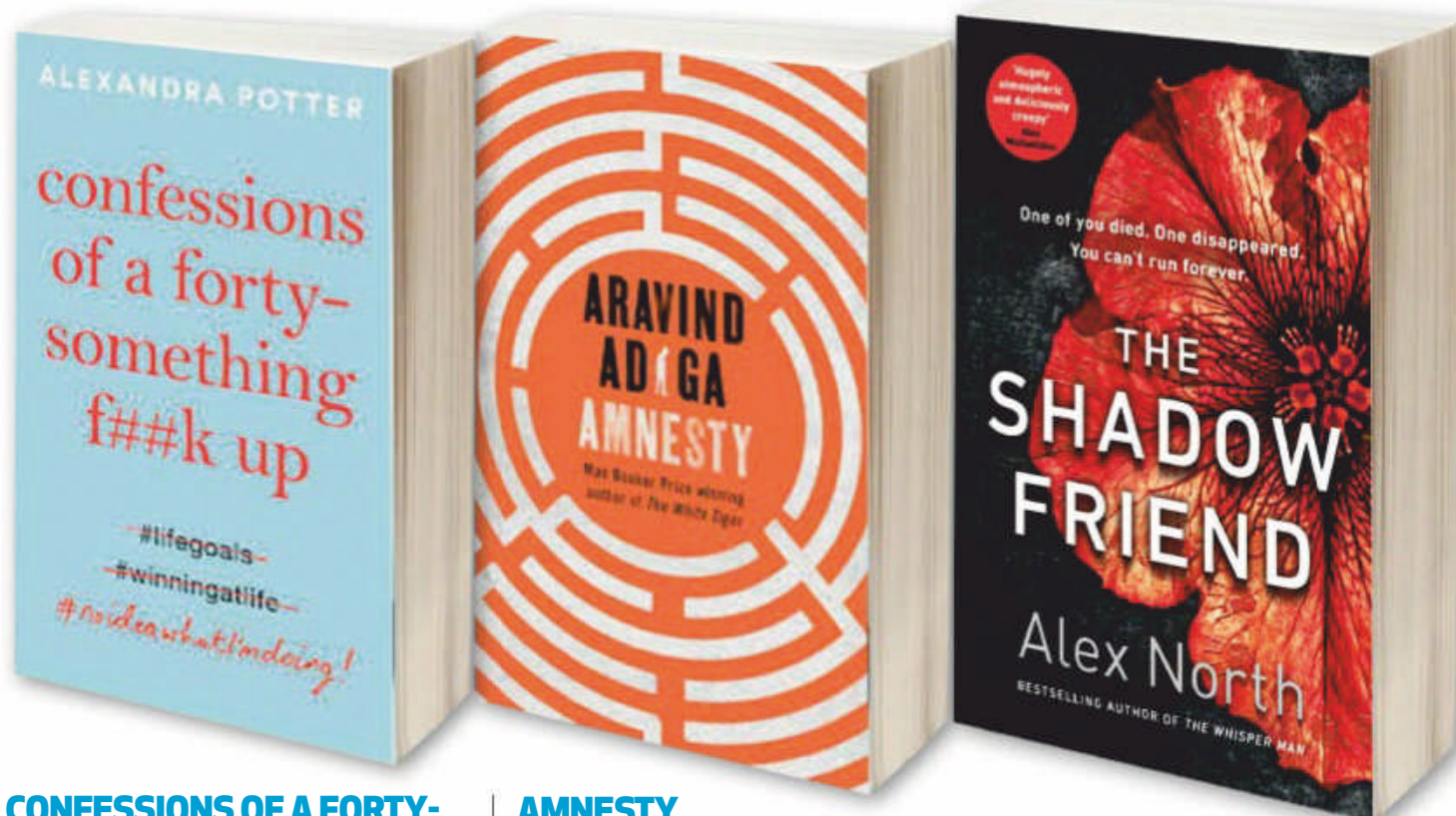

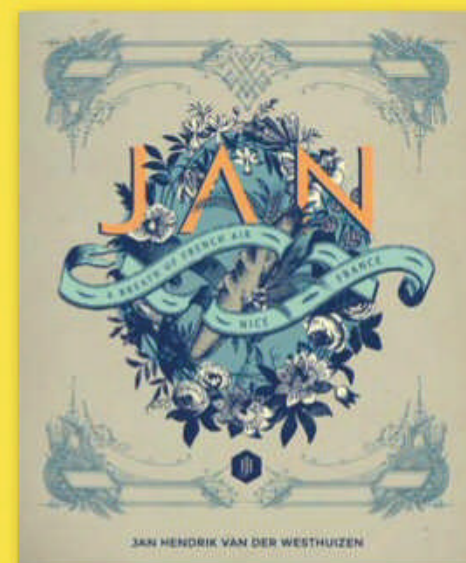

Jan Hendrik van der Westhuizen is a South African chef who opened a fine-dining restaurant in an old motorcycle repair shop in Nice, France, which has gone from strength to strength. Stunningly photographed, high-end coffee-table cookbooks like this one can be daunting, but there are enough recipes in here for the everyday cook to attempt to make it a useful addition to your library. Mineralogy is the scientific study of the chemical composition and crystal structure of minerals, while **gemmology** is a branch of mineralogy focusing on gemstones.

MINERALS are substances found in nature. Most minerals are solid, and non-organic, have a crystal structure and are formed by geological processes.

A mineral can consist of a single chemical element or a combination of chemical elements. There are thousands of types of known minerals, of which two of the most common are mineral quartz and feldspars.

A gemstone or semi-precious stone is a piece of mineral crystal that's been cut and polished to make jewellery and other accessories.

Traditionally, rarer stones such as diamonds, rubies, sapphires and emeralds are regarded as precious, while all the other stones used to make jewellery such as garnets, jade and amethysts, are considered semi-precious.

Precious gemstones are usually more expensive because of their colour, lustre and rarity.

South Africa is rich in a variety of minerals. Some of our largest mineral reserves include platinum, chromium and vanadium. SA is also among the world's top 10 diamond-producing countries, while Russia produces the most.

ARE MINERALS ROCKS?

Minerals and rocks aren't the same thing. A mineral is a specific **chemical compound** with a particular **crystalline structure**. A **rock** is a **mixture** of different ratios of minerals. Two samples of the same type of rock can contain different types of minerals, while **minerals always consist of exactly the same chemical substances** in the same ratio to one another. For example, a ruby is a mineral (and a gemstone). Unlike rocks, a ruby from Namibia will have exactly the same composition as a ruby from Brazil or India.

IN NATURE

Minerals are created through **natural processes**. There are a few substances with the same chemical compounds as minerals that are made by living organisms as part of shell or bone. The **shell of molluscs**, for example, are made of the minerals **calcite or aragonite**, or a compound of both.

Various processes in nature and geology are responsible for creating minerals. The mineral **halite** (table salt or rock salt) forms when **water** in a warm, shallow part of the **ocean evaporates**, leaving behind the salt crystals in it. Many minerals are

formed when **magma** (molten rock) cools and becomes a solid substance – **igneous rock**.

THE MOST COMMON MINERALS

Only **10 minerals** account for about **95% of Earth's crust**. About a quarter or the more than **5 000 known minerals** on the planet's surfaces are known as **silicates**. The **feldspar** group of minerals – a mixture of oxygen, silicone, aluminium and trace elements (small amounts) such as sodium, potassium, calcium and more unusual elements such as barium – are by far the **most common silicates**. They account for nearly 58% of all minerals that geologists can access.

Dark silicate minerals are also called ferromagnesian because of the **presence of iron and magnesium** in them. These minerals – which also contain olivine, pyroxene, amphibole and biotite – account for about 16,5% of the planet's surface.

Common quartz, which is made of silica with trace elements, makes up 12,5% of Earth's crust. Then there's the **mica group** and various metallic oxides, which make up 7%. Lastly, though entire mountains often consist of **carbonate minerals**, these only make up 1,5% of the planet's surface.

The remaining 5% contains thousands of known minerals, though many of these are **extremely rare** and often only found in a **single location** such as Tanzanite, which is only found in northern Tanzania.

USES

We use minerals on a **daily basis**. Each time you switch on the TV or microwave, you're using minerals. The **copper** in the wires that conduct electricity to these appli-

DID YOU KNOW?

The International Mineralogical Association (IMA) is constantly updating its list of known minerals. The latest list (July 2020), published on its website at ima-mineralogy.org, contains information about 5 616 types of minerals, and new ones are constantly being identified. Most of these are extremely rare.

DIAMONDS IN SA

The first diamonds in South Africa were discovered in the 1860s. Kimberley's Big Hole is the result of diamonds being discovered in 1871 on Colesberg Kopje, on a farm belonging to the De Beer brothers. The discovery led to thousands of people coming to SA from all over the world in search of these precious stones. Today SA's largest diamond producer is the Venetia mine in Limpopo which is owned by De Beers.

ances is made of a mineral. **Table salt** or halite is a mineral we use to season our food. The pencil you write with contains the mineral **graphite**. **Ore minerals** are the source of metals from which things such as cars, bikes and gardening tools are made.

PRECIOUS STONES

Though many minerals make beautiful crystals, precious stones are the most valued of all. Uncut **gemstones** look **unremarkable**, like rocks. But once they're **cut and polished**, they take on a beautiful shine – which is why they're so highly valued. The value can change, however. For example, in the past **amethysts** were considered a valuable precious stone. But since large reserves of amethyst have been discovered and mined in Brazil, this particular stone has **lost most of its value**.

Each gemstone is unique in terms of its chemical compounds and how it was formed:

- **Diamonds**, which consist of carbon atoms, are the hardest natural substance on Earth. These precious stones are formed deep underground under high pressure and are fairly rare.
- **Rubies** consist of the mineral corundum. It's red because it contains chromium.
- Corundum is also the main compound in **sapphires**. Mixtures of small amounts of iron, titanium and chromium are what causes the colour variations.
- **Emeralds** are formed from the mineral beryl,

which is a compound of beryllium aluminium silicate. Trace elements of chromium and vanadium influence the colour.

PHYSICAL PROPERTIES

Most precious stones are **hard minerals**. Their hardness is measured on the **Mohs scale of mineral hardness**, which is a measurement out of 10. **Talc** is the **softest** mineral, while **diamonds** are the **hardest**.

The colours of minerals vary greatly, from the translucence of diamonds to pure black. Some gemstones contain **flecks or stripes**, while others **brightly reflect light**.

Like all minerals, gemstones have a **crystalline structure**, in which the solid substance's atoms are arranged in **repetitive, three-dimensional patterns**. Gemmologists

CAN YOU BELIEVE IT?

Minerals are always solid matter with a solid form and set volume. This means liquids and gasses can't be minerals, but in some cases the solid form of a specific gas or liquid is considered a mineral. For example, water isn't a mineral, but ice is.

also consider properties such as the chemical composition, melting point, density and fission properties.

SYNTHETIC GEMS

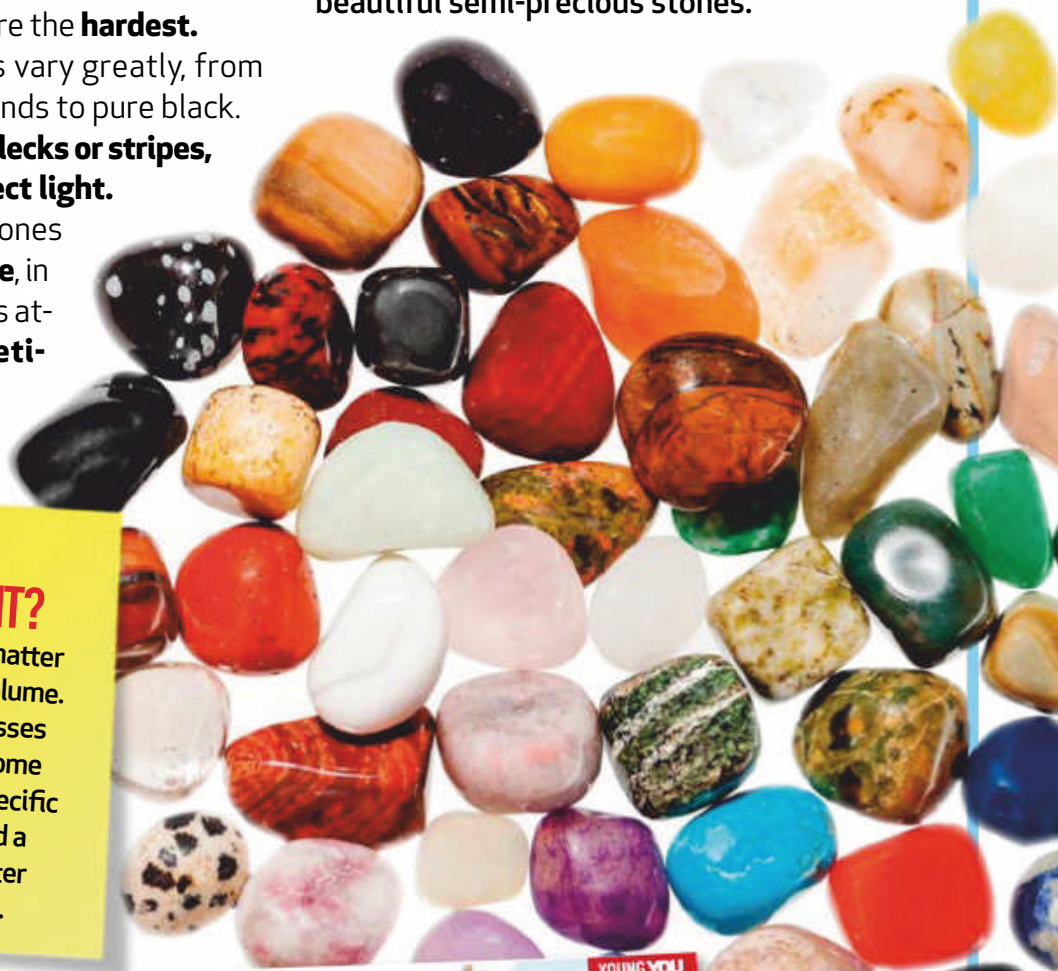
In the 19th century, chemists were able to recreate rare gems such as rubies after much experimentation.

In 1902 French chemist **Auguste Verneuil** (1856-1913) developed the **first commercially viable method** of creating artificial gems. But when it comes to precious stones, most of those who can afford it still prefer the real deal.

NAMING

The description "**semi-precious stone**" for pretty stones found in relative **abundance in nature**, that **aren't as hard** and so also not as valuable, is becoming outdated. In the world of mineralogy and gemmology the word "gemstone" is rather used across the board because **in science one stone isn't intrinsically more valuable** than another just because it's rarer. ■

WE TALK ABOUT

Elon Musk and a pig called Gertrude

HE'S famous for his aerospace enterprise SpaceX and his electric-car company Tesla, and now Elon Musk is shaking things up again with his new venture, Neuralink.

The South African-born entrepreneur hopes to help people with spinal-cord injuries or conditions such as dementia and Parkinson's to move and communicate by implanting computer chips in their brains.

At the moment the ground-breaking technology is still being tested on pigs – and that's where Gertrude comes in.

Elon introduced the pig to the world during an online media conference. He said researchers implanted the Neuralink device in her

brain three months ago. The Neuralink is a type of microchip, the size of a coin, which is connected to the brain with tiny wires – thinner than a human hair.

The microchip sends signals to a computer screen so one can see brain activity. In Gertrude's case, they could see how her brain works when she sniffs food and eats.

What's the purpose of the technology?

With Neuralink, it's hoped the microchip will help people who have difficulty moving or suffer from a brain condition to control their phones or computers using their brains.

For example, they'd only have to think what message they want to send, and the phone would type it for them. Ultimately, they hope the device might even lead to a cure for certain types of diseases by pro-

viding better insight into how the brain works.

And in the long run, they're hoping it will lead to what Elon calls "superhuman cognition". Cognition is your ability to understand something. He thinks we'll need superhuman cognition to compete with robots and computers which are getting increasingly smarter.

The device must still be tested on humans. Elon and his people have applied for permission to do that later this year.

Is it even possible?

It depends who you ask. Elon and the researchers at Neuralink believe it will work. Other companies are involved in similar research.

But there are other experts who reckon it's over-ambitious to think humans can communicate with computers with our thoughts.

Before Elon's media conference, Ari Benjamin, a scientist from the University of Pennsylvania in the US, told the BBC the project's biggest challenge will probably be the complexity of the human brain.

"Once they have the recordings, Neuralink will need to decode them and will someday hit the barrier that is our lack of basic understanding of how the brain works," he said.

"Decoding goals and movement plans is hard when you don't understand the neural code in which those things are communicated."

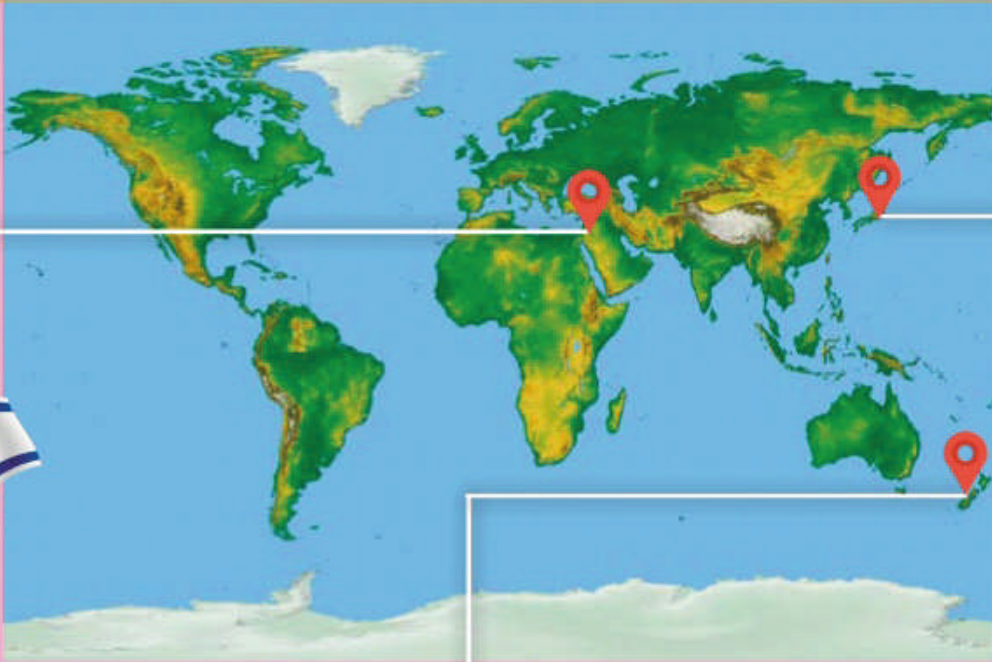

TEENS DISCOVER GOLD COINS

Two Israeli teenagers have made an incredible discovery: a clay jar containing 425 gold coins that were buried more than 1100 years ago.

The teens were volunteers on an archaeological programme in Yavneh, south of the capital Tel Aviv. The jar contained full dinars (a currency) but also smaller gold pieces that had been cut off the dinars to serve as small change – common practice in Islamic countries since around the year 850.

Researchers believe the discovery will help us better understand the history of the area because the coins will most likely be imprinted with the name of the ruler at the time and the date.

PREMIER STEPS DOWN DUE TO ILL HEALTH

SHINZŌ ABE (65), Japan's prime minister for nearly eight years, has announced his resignation due to ill health. He made the announcement just four days after breaking the record for the longest-serving Japanese premier.

His absence from public life in the past few weeks has led to speculation in the media about his health. He was also spotted at a hospital twice in one week.

Shinzō had been premier from 2006-2007 and started his second term in 2012. This term would've ended in September 2021. The ruling Liberal Democratic Party must now appoint a new leader.



NEW ZEALAND

CHRISTCHURCH TERRORIST SENTENCED

Brenton Harrison Tarrant, the Australian man who shot dead 51

Muslim worshippers in two mosques in Christchurch, New Zealand, last year, has been sentenced in court.

Judge **CAMERON MANDER** sentenced him to life in prison without the option of parole. This is the first time in New Zealand's history that such a strict sentence has been passed.

"Your crimes are so wicked that even if you are detained until you die it will not exhaust the requirements of punishment and denunciation. As far as I'm able to gauge, you're empty of any empathy for your victims," Mander said when he handed down the sentence.



GOOD NEWS



JACQUES KALLIS ENTERS HALL OF FAME

Former Proteas all-rounder Jacques Kallis was recently inducted into the ICC (International Cricket Council) Hall of Fame. Kallis is the fourth South African to be honoured in this way. The others are Graeme Pollock, Barry Richards and Allan Donald. The 44-year-old is the only player in the world to score at least 10 000 runs and take at least 250 wickets in both Test and One-Day cricket.



BAD NEWS



THE LASTING EFFECTS OF AIR POLLUTION

The lungs of children and teenagers who've been exposed to even low levels of air pollution as babies don't function as well as those of their peers who haven't been exposed, a new study found. The researchers studied 915 German children and tested their lung capacity at ages six, 10 and 15. They're concerned by the results as it shows lung damage suffered in a person's first year of life has a life-long effect on their lungs.

LOO WITH A VIEW

New public toilets in the Japanese capital Tokyo have see-through walls. Apparently, the reason for the design is so people can see how clean the toilets are before entering. The walls have been constructed from special glass – which darkens when someone enters and locks the door – so that people can't watch you doing your business in there.

Millions of mosquitoes released in Florida

IT SOUNDS like a nightmare: 750 million mosquitoes are to be released in the American state Florida.

But these mosquitoes are on a mission: they're going to help eradicate other mosquito species that carry diseases such as dengue fever and the Zika virus.

What's the plan?

Authorities are planning to start the release in 2021 after getting the green light from state officials. The mosquitoes to be released will have been genetically modified (a part of their genetic makeup is changed in a laboratory) so these will all be male mosquitoes. Only female mosquitoes suck blood because they need it to make eggs.

The scientists are hoping the genetically modified males will mate with the existing females and in so doing, share a gene that will hopefully ensure all female offspring will die off before they're old enough to start biting people.

The idea is that the mosquito population in the area will gradually decline, curbing the spread of disease to people.

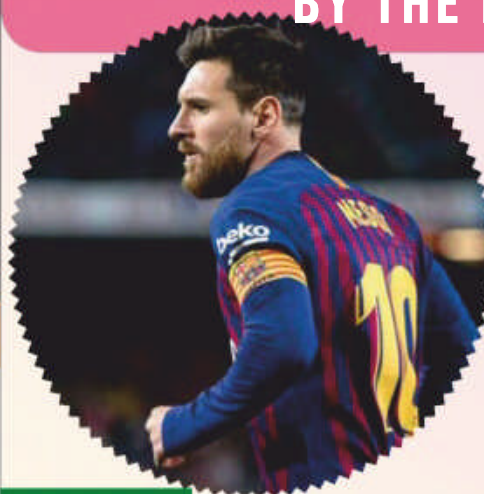
What's the reaction?

Not everyone thinks it's a good idea. Around 240 000 locals have signed an online petition against Oxitec, the company in charge of the project.

"The release of genetically engineered mosquitoes will needlessly put Floridians, the environment and endangered species at risk in the midst of a pandemic," environmental organisation Friends of the Earth said in a statement.

But Oxitec maintains the plan is safe. "We've released billions of our mosquitoes through the years. There's no potential risk to the environment or people."

Oxitec is planning a similar project in Texas but has yet to get the go-ahead from local authorities.

The number of YouTube views Jerusalem, a song by SA artists Master KG and Nomcebo Zikode, has had. The song was released last year and was popular here but it reached new international heights this year. It's popularity is mostly thanks to a new dance challenge – people around the world are sharing videos of themselves dancing to the hit song.



28 trillion

The weight of the ice in tons that has melted on Earth in less than 30 years. A trillion is a million million and can be written as 1 000 000 000 000. British scientists have studied satellite pictures taken since 1994 of the poles, mountains and glaciers on the planet to determine how much ice has disappeared.

They've warned that the melting ice is causing sea levels to rise rapidly. For every centimetre the levels rise, a million people are displaced from coastal areas. The melting ice also makes it harder for Earth to reflect sunlight back into the atmosphere.

A family from Minnesota in the US attend a candlelight vigil for Jacob Blake. Jacob (29), a father of six, was

left paralysed, after being shot by police last month. Video footage showed that the unarmed man was shot several

THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

12 SEPTEMBER 1977 STEVE BIKO DIES

The former leader of the South African Students' Organisation, Steve Biko (full name Bantu Stephen Biko), died on this day in Pretoria.

He'd been arrested about three weeks before in Grahamstown (now Makhanda) and had been held in a police cell in Port Elizabeth, where he'd been maltreated and tortured.

In September, he was transferred to a prison in Pretoria where he died.

The apartheid government at the time first said his death was the result of a hunger strike (which is when prisoners protest by refus-

ing to eat). But a media investigation uncovered that Biko had been assaulted while being held in PE and had received no medical attention before he was moved to Pretoria. The Rand Daily Mail wrote on its front page that Biko had suffered serious brain injuries – which had been the cause of his death.

The inhumane way he'd been treated in jail caused an international outrage. Biko's death in this way made him a martyr (see Word of the Week) in the struggle against white domination. It brought fresh motivation to those fighting against the apartheid system.

MAKE YOUR OWN ROCK CANDY

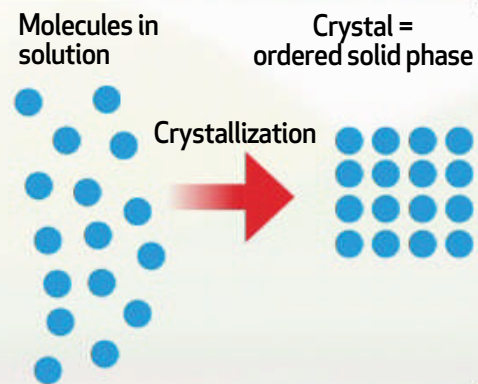
The word crystals might bring to mind glittering chandeliers but did you know there are edible crystals? Here's how to make your own sweet crystals – you'll be amazed at how the crystals grow each day

SUGAR crystals are a great treat for a sweet tooth – plus making them also provides for a fun science experiment. And all you need is a few simple ingredients and a bit of patience.

WHAT ARE CRYSTALS?

Crystals are solid substances that form from molecules (particles so small that you can't see them with the naked eye) which are arranged in exact and repeating patterns. Crystals most commonly form from a solution when liquids cool and start to harden. The loose solid molecules group in a repeating and uniform pattern which results in crystal formation.



WHAT YOU'LL NEED

Food colouring

Food flavouring (optional)

4-6 glasses

6 ¼ cups of white sugar

Medium-size saucepan

2 cups of water

Heat-resistant jug

Fork

Wooden spoon

Paper towel

4-6 wooden skewers

4-6 clothes pegs

STEP 1

Pour different colours food colouring (and flavouring, if using) into the glasses. You only need a few drops of colouring, but make the solution as dark as possible for the best results.

STEP 2

Let an adult help you to heat 2 cups of water and 6 cups of sugar in the saucepan over medium heat. Stir constantly with a wooden spoon until the sugar is dissolved. Continue stirring for 1 minute while the water boils and then turn off the heat.

TIP: If any sugar is undissolved, the crystals will grow on this and not only your skewers. Pour the solution through a strainer and retain only the liquid.

STEP 3

Let an adult carefully pour the hot mixture into a heat-resistant jug. Then pour the mixture into the glasses. Fill the glasses to equal levels (depending on how tall and full your glasses are, this recipe makes four to six servings) and mix it with the colouring using a fork. Let the mixtures cool down for about 30 minutes.

DID YOU KNOW?

There'll be about a quadrillion (a number with 15 zeros!) molecules attached to each skewer.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

- Heating the water lets it absorb more sugar than normally. This creates a super-saturated solution.
- As the solution cools, the saturation point of the water decreases and it's no longer able to hold the amount of sugar.
- The sugar molecules are no longer part of the solution. They cling onto the dry sugar on the skewers, called the "seed" crystals.
- The bigger the crystals get, the more they attract other sugar molecules, creating even bigger crystals.

TOP TIP

The cooler and darker the place you store the crystals, the bigger they'll grow.

STEP 4

Dip each skewer in the syrup, then roll it in the remaining $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of sugar. Put each skewer in a glass, making sure it doesn't touch the bottom or sides of the glass by securing it in place with a clothes peg. Leave the skewers in the glasses and watch the crystals grow daily.

TIP: If no crystals are forming after 24 hours, remove the skewer from the solution and boil the solution again, adding more sugar.

STEP 5

Remove the skewers after 3-5 days. Let the extra syrup drip off and lay them on a paper towel to dry before eating. Enjoy!

TIP: If there's a crust on top of the water's surface, use a butter knife to gently break through it, avoiding the crystals near your skewer.

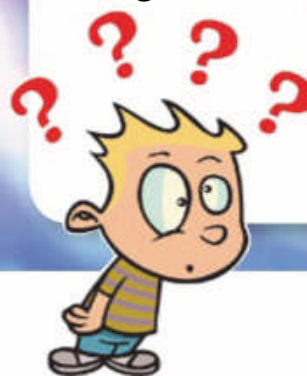

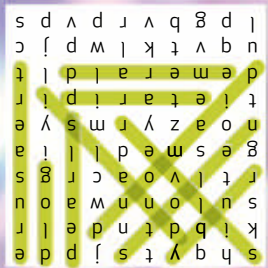

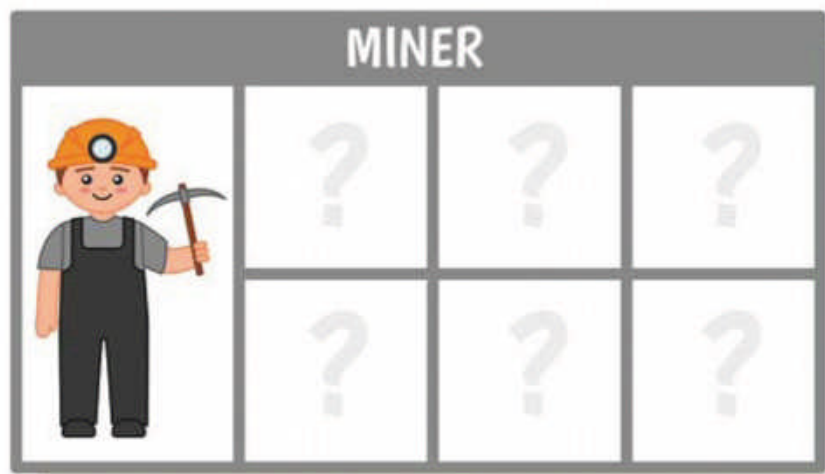

Sumner Redstone was the Hollywood mogul who sacked Tom Cruise and made a fortune from Star Wars. Now he's died at 97, leaving behind a private life more lurid than his films

THE X-RATED BILLIONAIRE

THERE were just two things that kept Sumner Redstone happy each day in his final years: sex and steak, says a girlfriend.

Though he demanded both from the “nurses” paid to attend him in his Los Angeles mansion, he was confined to a wheelchair and unable to speak.

And so, the billionaire media mogul

found both a little taxing to enjoy.

Though Redstone – a tenacious and driven tycoon who’d turned his father’s cinema chain into a vast \$40 billion (R680bn) empire that included Paramount Pictures, CBS, MTV and Viacom – liked to insist he’d never die, he passed away last month aged 97.

Despite his last few years being dominated by court battles with girlfriends that revealed jaw-droppingly tawdry de-

tails of his personal life, he was known principally for what a rival described as his “business thuggery” as he built one of America’s largest entertainment empires.

Indeed, Redstone was so cantankerous that even when he could no longer speak, he recorded three words or phrases on an iPad that could be played back to people: “Yes”, “No”, and “F*** you”.

He expressed that last sentiment many

one of his teeth came out and shot across the room.

His grandchildren called him “Grumpy” – a nickname he’d suggested – and he could be so foul-tempered with waiters that he was banned from some restaurants.

REDSTONE, who famously liked to say that “content is king”, became the most powerful man in Hollywood relatively late in life.

Raised in a Boston flat that was so miserable it didn’t even have its own toilet, his father – the family surname had been Rothstein but, like so many Jewish immigrants, it was changed – reportedly worked for the Mafia bootlegging alcohol during America’s prohibition.

Redstone Snr later – reportedly with underworld money – set up a chain of drive-in cinemas, undermining his son’s claims to have been entirely self-made.

Sumner went to Harvard, learned Japanese in a year and was enlisted to help break Japanese codes during World War 2. He later joined the family business, setting about aggressively expanding it across the country.

His driving passion to win in business he later put down to a near-death experience in 1979 when he was staying –

with a mistress – in a Boston hotel that caught fire. As flames enveloped his room, Redstone (then 55) survived by hanging on to a third-floor window ledge until a fireman reached him on a ladder.

His girlfriend escaped largely unscathed but he suffered burns to 50% of his body and underwent 60 hours of surgery. He was soon playing his beloved tennis again but his racket had to be strapped to his right hand, which had been melted to a claw.

In 1987 he bought Viacom, a cable TV company that owns the MTV and Nickelodeon channels. He borrowed heavily for this purchase but it would later turn him from multi-millionaire to billionaire.

Much of his money came from canny stock market investments such as the 5% stake he bought in 20th Century Fox. Redstone had gone to see *Star Wars* (1977) and, predicting it would be a monster hit, rushed

out of the cinema to a petrol station payphone. Redstone immediately bought 25 000 shares in the company that had released the film, correctly predicting they’d soar in value.

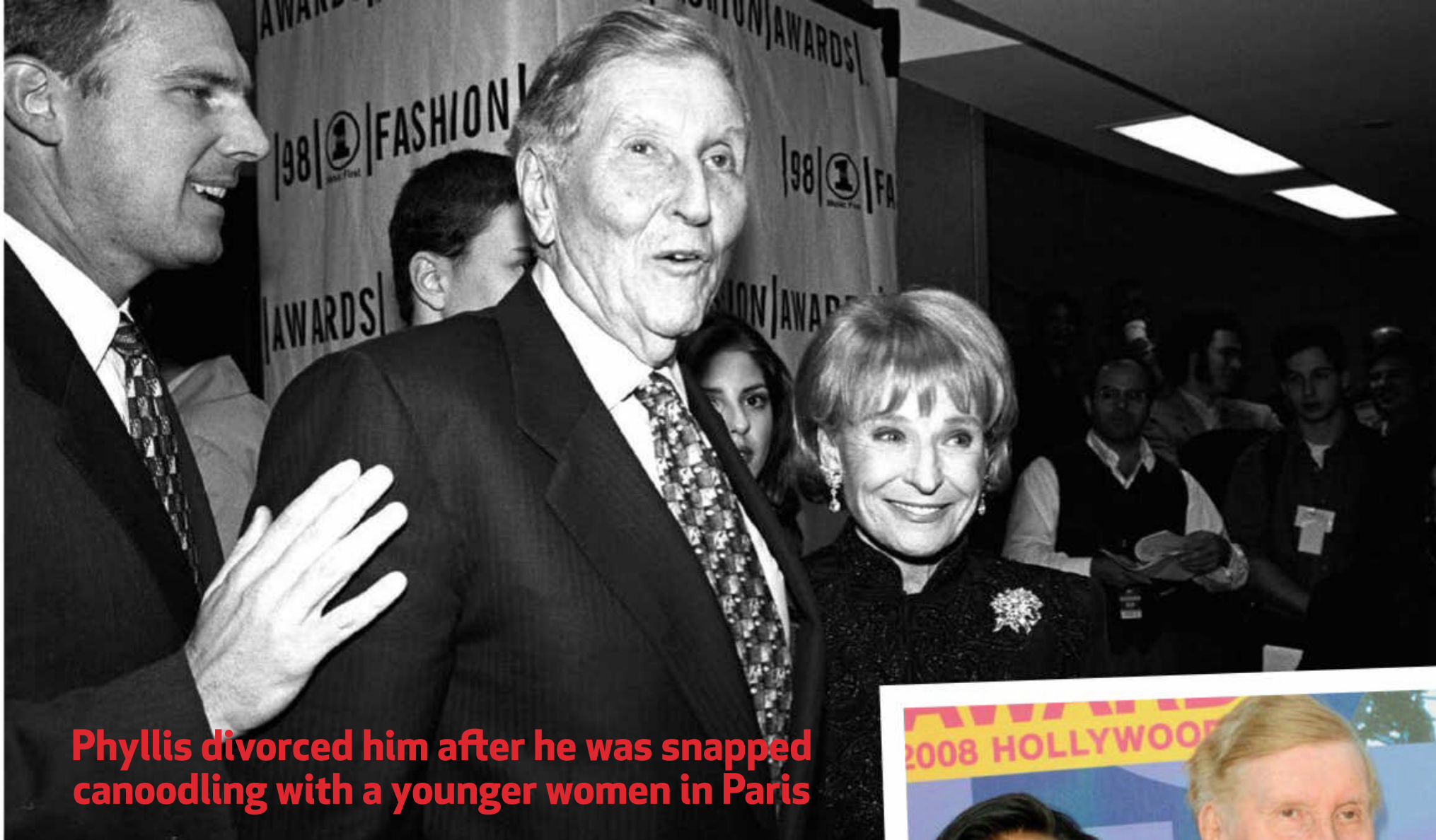
He soon added Paramount Pictures (whose films included his personal favourite, *The Godfather*), the Blockbuster video shop chain, publishing house Simon & Schuster, and CBS TV.

He once shouted so loudly in a business meeting that one of his teeth came out and shot across the room

times during his long and rambunctious life – towards everyone from actor Tom Cruise, whom he sacked over his Scientology proselytising and bizarre public behaviour, to members of his own family with whom he fought bitterly over his business empire.

He was a dangerous man to cross, often compared to a mad dog “foaming at the mouth” and once shouting so loudly during a business meeting that

He made sure Simon & Schuster published his 2001 autobiography, *A Passion to Win*, insisting that nobody else could tell his story but him.

But he couldn't prevent others recounting notorious episodes from his career – such as his decision in 2006 not to renew Tom Cruise's contract with Paramount Studios.

Redstone complained that the *Mission Impossible* star was “getting paid \$10m (then R70m) on the [studio] lot for doing nothing”.

He was also irked by Cruise's very public support for the controversial Church of Scientology, as well as his alarming antics on the Oprah Winfrey TV show – he'd leapt on her sofa in enthusiasm about how wonderful his personal life was.

Yet Redstone was very eccentric himself, with a penchant for shaving naked by the side of his swimming pool and paying flight attendants to clip his toenails.

Betsy Loomis, who worked on the Paramount Pictures private jet, said she refused to do it, describing his toenails as “like ancient sea scrolls”.

Although he indulged himself in luxury hotels and fine restaurants, he was so cheapskate he dyed his own hair – a disconcerting orange hue – and wore only sack-like, oversized suits that he had his driver buy from a discount store.

Redstone kept the modest suburban

house he'd bought as a young man for \$46 000 in Newton, Massachusetts, sometimes living in it.

He remained married to his first wife, Phyllis, for 52 years before she divorced him in 1999 after hiring a private detective who photographed him canoodling with a younger woman in Paris. The divorce, in which she accused him of adultery and cruelty, cost him \$3bn (then R18bn).

Then aged 76, Redstone, who's said to have long regarded himself as “God's gift to women”, belatedly embarked on a new life as a Don Juan.

His many attractive girlfriends were often even younger than his children, daughter Shari (now 66) and son Brent (69).

When he married again in 2002, it was to a woman four decades his junior: then 40-year-old Paula Fortunato, a former pastry chef he met on a blind date arranged by his bankers. They divorced in 2009.

The author Michael Wolff, famous for his recent book on Donald Trump, wrote of Redstone: “With a striking head of orange hair, Redstone is a vainglorious, old-school egomaniac who has an operatic personal life that's been largely kept out of the media undoubtedly because he controls so much of it.”

He was certainly deluded about his appeal to women. In his late 70s, Redstone



boasted: “I know I don't look my age. I know I look a lot younger. I surely work a lot younger.”

He admitted that his power was part of what attracted women to him but said it would “bother” him to think it was his money.

“There are also such things as charm and charisma, you know. You don't have to be young to have that.”

HIS incredible vanity looked all the more pitiful in recent years as it became increasingly clear his myriad girlfriends were certainly not unmoved by his vast wealth.

Beginning in 2015, Redstone was embroiled in a string of lawsuits and counter-suits involving two former long-time live-in girlfriends.

First Manuela Herzer, an Argentine socialite 42 years his junior, challenged his competency after being thrown out of his LA mansion – and his will. She said

he'd become a "living ghost" in his home in the millionaires' gated community of Beverly Park and that he was barely able to communicate beyond grunting.

She was supported in her claims by another of Redstone's ex-lovers, Sydney Holland. She'd been similarly exiled from Redstone's life after the two women said in an interview that they'd been Redstone's devoted carers and gatekeepers.

By then, Redstone – said to be worth \$5,2bn (then R72bn) – had become estranged from his children after disagreements over money and his business empire.

He hadn't spoken to his son, Brent, for years. His stormy relationship with daughter Shari, a divorced mother of three, finally blew up after she refused to sell him her stake in the family business for \$1bn (then R14bn). Suspicious of Manuela and Sydney, Shari had also hired private detectives to look into the women's pasts.

Manuela blamed Shari and Redstone's staff for conspiring to have her thrown out of the mansion and taken out of his will. Sydney said she met the same fate after admitting to Redstone she'd been unfaithful.

Manuela further alleged that Redstone, by then in his 90s, had become sex-obsessed but his doctors had told him to limit his sexual activity to just once a week if he wanted to indulge his other passion for steak.

Otherwise, the doctors said, he wouldn't have sufficient energy to swallow solid food without the aid of the feeding tube he was forced to use.

Redstone would be visited by a string of women who'd perform sex acts with each other, or occasionally with him, as he sat motionless in a chair, Manuela said.

Her claims about these kept women echoed the words of Tim Jensen, the tycoon's former chauffeur. He said he'd had to deliver regular payments – of several thousand dollars each – to seven women around Los Angeles after they visited.

Insiders at Viacom countered that the fiery Manuela, as Redstone's lover, had become an unbearable diva, demanding VIP treatment for herself and her "entou-

rage" at Hollywood events, including personal introductions to stars.

"How many times do I have to meet this lady's kids?" superstar singer Justin Timberlake once reportedly asked an MTV executive in exasperation.

Redstone insiders also said Sydney – who became his live-in girlfriend in 2011 when she was 39 and he was 89, insisting she "never noticed his age" – had almost unlimited access to his money. With it, she'd charter private jets, buy expensive clothes, and start businesses, including a film production company and a property developing business.

In a leaked 2011 email exchange with her lawyer, Sydney boasted of receiving some \$10million (then R80m) in cash and presents from the tycoon.

The torrid court battle also included allegations that Redstone had given \$18m (R144m) to a flight attendant on a CBS corporate jet and later slept with her sister, whom he gave \$6m (R48m).

Manuela appealed and the case was settled last year. Redstone later sued both ex-girlfriends, accusing them of manipulating and emotionally abusing him into giving them presents worth \$150m (R2,5bn) over

five years.

Sydney claimed in court papers during the case that, "Redstone gave tens of millions of dollars to various other women – who he had no intention of marrying and wasn't [in] love with" at a time when he was engaged to her.

But by then, shareholder pressure had forced him to resign as executive chairman of CBS and Viacom. He hadn't appeared publicly for years before his death.

He controlled about 80% of the votes in ViacomCBS and it will reportedly be divided up into two trusts. One will go to his descendants and the other to first wife, Phyllis.

Given that he married again, yet another legal battle may be in the offing. His second wife, Paula, is expected to challenge this distribution of his fortune.

Sumner Redstone, who repeatedly sued members of his own family and who never shied from a fight, would probably be delighted. ■

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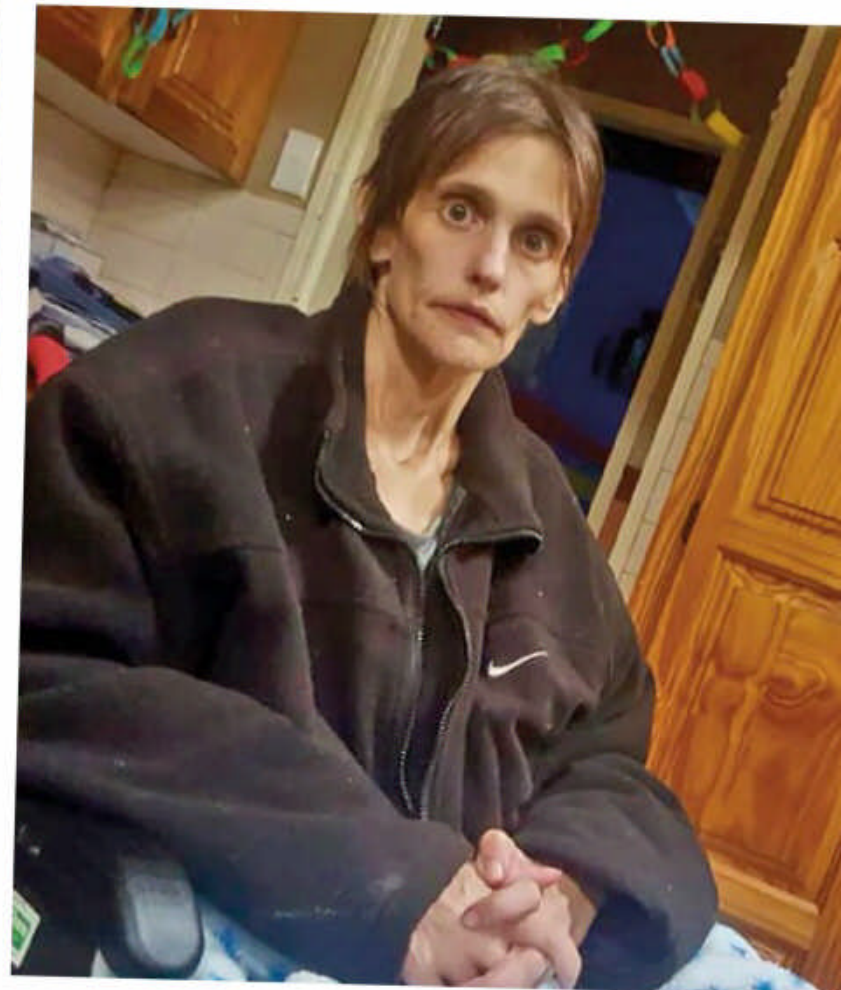

I WEIGH 37 KG – BUT I CAN'T EAT

Katinka had to have emergency surgery to treat a stomach ulcer – now she's wasting away **BY JODY-LYNN TAYLOR**



WHEN she looks in the mirror it feels as if a total stranger is staring back. Her eyes, sunk deep into their sockets, are unnaturally large, her cheekbones jut out and her clothes hang on her emaciated frame.

"It hurts to look into the mirror and not recognise the person you're seeing," Katinka Steyn says.

Just seven months ago the mother of two weighed nearly 90kg. Then began a series of health setbacks that have left her a fragile shadow of her former self.

In December she had to undergo an emergency operation for a perforated stomach ulcer and afterwards she just began melting away. Today she weighs just 37kg and barely has the strength to get out of bed.

Katinka, who lives in Secunda, needs a second op but doctors are reluctant to go ahead until she's put on at least 7kg, but preferably 13kg.

"Since that first operation I just can't eat," she says. "I try to but then I get sick."

Her condition recently deteriorated to such an extent she recently spent three weeks at Pretoria's Life Eugene Marais Hospital. Her one consolation is she's now at home with her husband, Manie, and their two kids.

But being at home also has its challenges, Katinka admits. "I feel bad seeing the concern in my husband's eyes whenever he looks at me."

The 40-year-old also hates that she can't play with her kids, Marinda (8) and Manie Jr (5), anymore.

"We used to be very active, always doing outdoor stuff together, but suddenly it's a case of Mommy being excluded. If they're cycling, it's 'Mommy, wait for us here, we'll be back soon.' I know they don't mean anything by it, but it hurts."

Yet she can't blame them, she adds. Adjusting to the woman she sees in the mirror isn't easy.

KATINKA's health problems started 12 years ago. She battled with cellulitis in her left leg that caused her unbearable pain.

"I used to be very big and they told me the cellulitis was because

of my weight," she says.

At the time she weighed 165kg and, because of the trouble she was having with her leg, doctors decided she was a suitable candidate for stomach bypass surgery – a procedure that would reduce the size of her stomach and help her to lose weight.

She got down to about 86kg, had treatment for her leg and for a while all was well.

But after the birth of her son, her leg started to worry her again, and then two years ago it started becoming a serious problem.

Katinka, who worked for a security company, developed sores on her leg which in time turned septic. Soon she could no longer cycle with the kids or jump on the trampoline.

"I was in and out of hospital and on antibiotics. I held onto my leg all the time – it was unbelievably painful."

Katinka believes that because her leg was so sore she didn't notice that something was seriously wrong with her stomach.

Then one day in December, after she put the kids to bed, she told her husband that her pain tablets weren't helping and she was feeling terrible.

He wanted to take her to the hospital. “But I said no, I’m okay. As he turned to go the kitchen, I suddenly felt like I couldn’t breathe.”

Next thing she knew she was in intensive care. “That’s when I learnt I had a burst ulcer. They told me I nearly died – my heart stopped beating twice.”

The family ended up spending Christmas at Katinka’s hospital bedside. “It was terrible for me – I couldn’t keep any food down.

“The past two years have been very rough, but by the grace of God we came through it and I’ll keep fighting for the sake of my two little gnomes.”

The three weeks she spent in hospital recently were made worse by the fact that Manie and the kids couldn’t visit her because of lockdown. She’s grateful to her husband, a construction foreman, for taking care of things on the home front while she was away.

“He’s a very good dad, but you worry. He works all day and then also has to see to the kids and cook and everything.

“I was alone day after day and I missed my family terribly.”

Katinka is now on medication to address what’s left of the ulcer in the bottom of her stomach. Hopefully it’ll be removed soon – provided she’s gained sufficient weight and is strong enough to cope with the anaesthetic. “The doctor would like to get her to above 50kg,” Manie says.

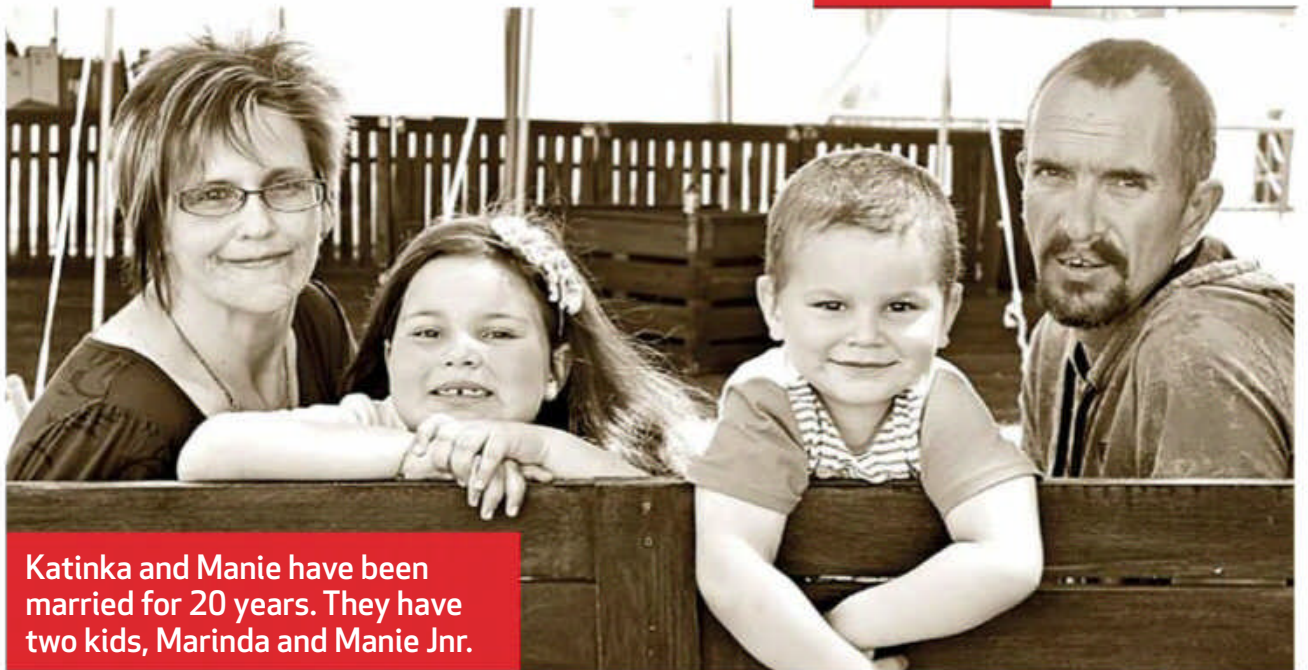
“Once they’ve removed that ulcer there won’t be much left of the stomach,” Katinka adds. Right now she’s hoping the medication will work some magic and she won’t need a second surgical procedure.

In the meantime, their medical bills are mounting and their basic medical aid has run out of funds. There’s a lot to worry about, Katinka says.

AND HER left leg? Unfortunately nothing can be done about that, Katinka says. The tissue damage is irreversible.

At the moment she’s walking with difficulty and tires quickly. All her clothes are too big for her, so she spends her days in sleepwear.

“There isn’t any money now for clothes. While I’m recovering at home I wear my pyjamas.”



Katinka and Manie have been married for 20 years. They have two kids, Marinda and Manie Jr.

In the background the kids can be heard playing, happy and noisy. Their mom might not be able to play with them but she’s home and that’s the main thing. With Katinka resting in bed most of the time, they bring their toys to her room and spend a lot of time with her, she tells us.

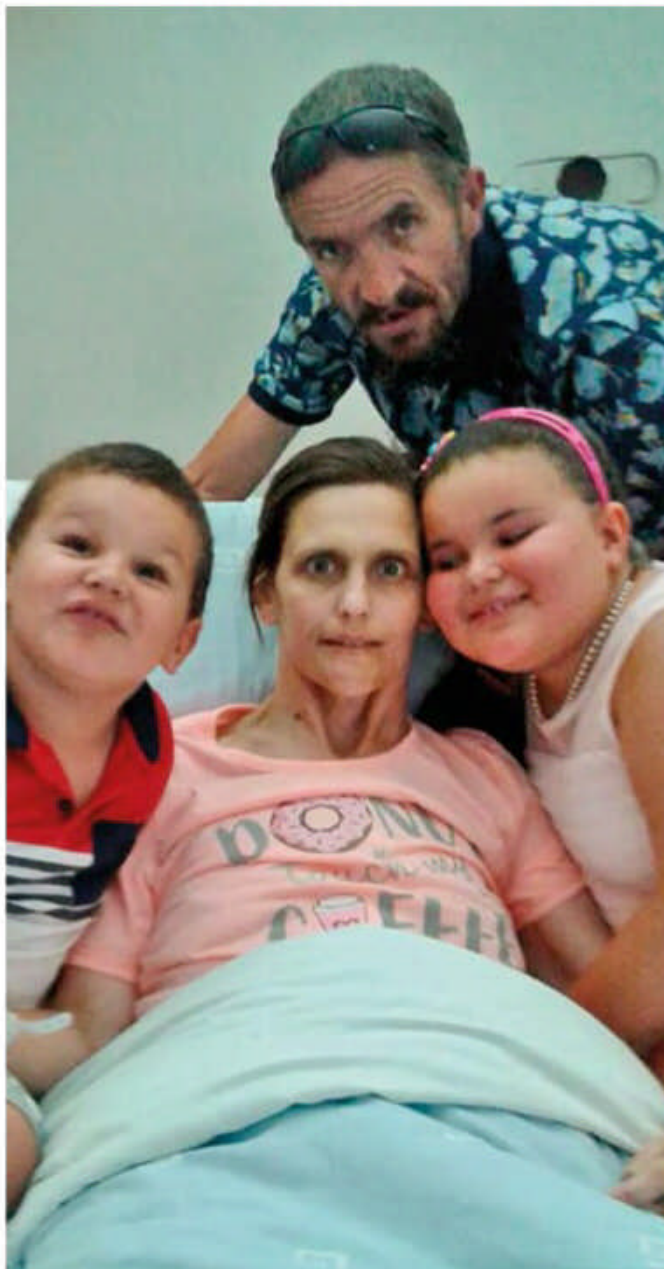
Without the support of her colleagues, friends and family, she says she would’ve been unable to get

through this difficult time.

“A big part of this concerns my husband and children. I know I have to wake up in the morning for my kids. There are two little people waiting for me. I absolutely live for my kids.”

She also lives for the day when she’ll be “round as a ball” again. “I’d be over the moon,” she says.

“It would mean I’d be able to look at myself in the mirror again.” ■

KATINKA'S HEALTH CHALLENGES

“The first time the patient came to us, she had a perforated ulcer,” Katinka’s surgeon, Dr Brian Mabaso, says. “She had a stomach bypass operation previously to lose weight and one of the complications of that procedure is that a stomach ulcer can develop.” Hers ruptured and she recovered after a long period in intensive care, he adds.

“Her second problem is that she also developed cellulitis. Her leg became septic with fast-spreading bacteria and she needed to have it cleaned in the operating theatre. She received wound-care medication until the wound was clean.

“Subsequently she had several procedures, including a skin graft to her leg to close the wound.”

The ulcer, still in her stomach, is swelling now, he says, and causing an obstruction, which means she has problems taking in food. “Whatever she eats will be brought up later due to the narrowing of her duodenum, which is part of the small intestine.”

Dr Mabaso says they’re trying to heal the ulcer with medication. If this doesn’t work, Katinka will need surgery to remove the ulcer. They’re hoping the medication will do the job because at the moment she’s too weak for surgery.



A WAR WITH NO WINNERS

Lionel Messi's bruising battle with his Barca bosses has left a bad taste in everyone's mouth

OF ALL the reactions to the outcome of the will-he-stay-or-will-he-go drama that dominated the world sport for weeks, the response from many of his fans is probably the most telling: they're devastated.

You'd think they'd be overjoyed – Lionel Messi, arguably the best footballer the world has ever seen, is staying at Barcelona, the club to which he's dedicated the best 20 years of his professional life.

Instead they're miserable.

They wanted him to go as much as he himself wanted to. And the fact that they're distraught speaks volumes about the parlous state of affairs at Camp Nou.

As the Guardian's football writer Sid Lowe puts it, "Some of those most on Messi's side backed his departure and some of those most turned against him demanded he stay."

Messi's battle with the Barca bosses is over for now but there are no winners here – and it's safe to say some of the magic has gone out of the once mighty club.

Messi, a goal-making marvel and a ge-

nius of the game, is bitter and resentful, forced to stay at a club he loves but now finds intolerable. And the bosses are left with a team in tatters, its star player in despair and morale at an all-time low.

At the nub of the Messi matter is this: a clause in his contract allowed him to leave on a free transfer at the end of each season as long as he announced his intention to do so by 10 June.

Because the 2019/20 season was first postponed then extended by the coronavirus pandemic, his lawyers argued this opened a gap for him to leave.

Barca disagreed, saying the 10 June deadline had never changed. If he wanted out, he'd have to fork out a €700 million – R14 billion – buyout penalty.

There was plenty of back and forth but in the end the bosses won, if you can call it that.

And where did Messi choose to announce the decision? Not on one of Barcelona's online channels, where big an-

nouncements are usually made, but in an interview with soccer site Goal.com, another clear indication of the depth of animosity that exists.

A downcast Messi accused Barca president Josep Maria Bartomeu of not keeping his word.

"I thought, we were sure, that I was free," the Argentinian star says.

He thought the fact that players were competing for the league "in the middle of this sh***y virus" altered all the dates.

A €700-million release fee "is impossible", he added, and the only way to contest it was to go to court.

"I'd never go to court against Barca because it is the club that I love, that gave me everything since I arrived," he said.

"It's the club of my life. I have made my life here."

BARCELONA has been struggling all season.

In July they lost to Osasuna, sealing their La Liga defeat. The tournament trophy had been proudly displayed at Camp Nou since the 2017/18 season and their captain didn't mince his words about their failure.

“This reflects the course of the whole year,” Messi said. “We’ve been inconsistent, weak. We’ve been a team that, if you take us on with intensity and desire, you can make it easy.”

It didn’t endear him to club management. The rift between player and bosses started in January when Quique Setién was brought in as manager, replacing two-time La Liga winner Ernesto Valverde.

“From January to now, things have gone very badly,” said Messi, who earns about R43 million a month playing for Barca.

The following month, things didn’t get any better. Barca suffered a humiliating 8-2 defeat to Bayern Munich in the Champions League quarterfinals.

Setién and sporting director Eric Abidal both quit, and former Barcelona player Ronald Koeman was appointed as coach.

Koeman kicked off his reign by telling senior players Samuel Umtiti, Arturo Vidal, Ivan Rakitic and Luis Suárez they were no longer needed at the club.

He also warned Messi he’d no longer receive special treatment – and it’s understood the coach’s threat was the final straw. Messi sent a burofax – a legal letter

– announcing he wanted to leave. But Barca insisted he couldn’t as he’d missed the June deadline.

In the back-and-forth days that followed, Messi dared to dream of a new future. “I looked further afield,” he told Goal.com. “I want to compete at the highest level, win titles, compete in the Champions League. You can win or lose

in it, because it’s very difficult, but you have to compete.”

There was talk of him going to deep-pocketed Manchester City but in the end it was not to be. Hours after Messi announced he was staying, Barcelona finally acknowledged it on Twitter, tweeting a picture of the player and a quote from this Goal.com interview: “I will give it my all. My love for Barca will never change.”

HIS wife, model Antonella Roccuzzo, supported his decision to leave the club, Messi says. “With all the pain of her soul, she supported and accompanied me.”

Still, there’s one person who’ll be relieved the family isn’t going anywhere: Thiago, his eight-year-old son. Middle son Mateo (5) is “still little”, Messi said, and their youngest, Ciro (2), was way too young to absorb any of the anxiety.

“But Thiago, he’s older,” Messi said. “He heard something on TV and asked me about it. I didn’t want him to know anything about being forced to leave, to have to live in a new school, or make new friends. He cried to me and said, ‘Let’s not go.’ It was hard, really.”

But the boy may have to get used to the idea of being uprooted in the not too-distant future. Messi has one year left on his contract, which means he can officially talk to other clubs from 1 January and walk out next June.

“I told the club I wanted to go. I’d been telling him [the president] that all year,” he said. “The club needed new, younger players and my time was over.”

Yet whoever does take over will have huge boots to fill. Messi has a list of awards, championships and trophies longer than his arms: 10 Spanish championships, four Champions League trophies and six World Player of the Year awards.

He’s scored more goals than anyone else in La Liga history, and holds the assist record too. He’s played in more victories than any other Barcelona player and scored more hat-tricks and doubles than anyone else.


For now, Barca will hope he can bring back some of the shine they so desperately need.

“Truth is,” Messi said after his return to training at Camp Nou, “I don’t know what will happen now. There’s a new coach, a new idea. But I’m going to give it my best.” ■

TEENAGER ON BOARD!

Don't let your home become a war zone. A new book helps parents of adolescents tackle tricky situations that arise through the teen years



ASK any parent what it's like raising teenagers and they're likely to all tell you one thing: it's a minefield.

Those sweet little darlings who would do anything for you are gone and in their place are moody, argumentative young people who push boundaries – and your buttons – big time.

But there's help out there. A new book by British journalist Tanith Carey, a child behaviour guru and mother of two teenage daughters, delves into the teen years and gives sound advice on how to handle tricky situations.

The book – *What's My Teenager Thinking? Practical Child Psychology for Modern Parents* – is written in conjunction with respected clinical psychologist Dr Angharad Rudkin.

It should help you weather the storms with your sanity intact.

AGE GROUP 13-14

YOU NEWS

I HATE YOU!

Your teen screams she hates you when you take away her phone so she doesn't stay up late texting friends.

Teens get angry when they feel adults don't understand or respect them. Her connection

with her friends may feel more important than your approval. Afraid of missing out, this will trigger the primal fight-or-flight regions of her lower brain at the expense of logical, rational thought processes.

WHAT YOU MIGHT BE THINKING

It can be a shock to hear your beloved child say something so hurtful. You might wonder if you've done something wrong as a parent.

WHAT SHE MIGHT BE THINKING

Young people feel having a phone is a basic human right, like being fed and clothed, and she's lashing out because she doesn't yet understand the need for limits.

These words are her last resort to show you how much she wants to get her way.

If she's in the middle of a friendship drama, removing her phone may feel like a life-and-death matter. Teens know they're not supposed to say such cruel things to their parents, who've

invested so much love in them. After an outburst she's likely to feel guilty, even though she may still struggle to apologise.

HOW YOU COULD RESPOND

■ **Don't take it personally** Reminding yourself that she's reacting against your boundaries, not you, will help you stay calm.

■ **Understand what lies beneath** Realise she's trying to shock you into giving in by saying the most extreme thing she can think of.

■ **Defuse the situation** Your first instinct may be to demand an apology, but this will enrage her more in her agitated state. Say, "We'll talk when we're calmer." This gives her time to revert to using her logical, higher brain.

EVERYONE ELSE PLAYS THIS COMPUTER GAME!

Your teen is upset that you won't buy him a video game with an 18 age restriction.

Multi-player games with friends have become a key part of teenagers' social lives,

especially for boys. But you may be unnerved by the graphic violence of many games, with your teen often called upon to do the killing.

WHAT YOU MIGHT BE THINKING

You may be disturbed by the graphic realism but want to avoid him feeling left out. Knowing his friends' parents let their sons play may make you wonder if you're too strict.

You may also worry that time spent gaming is at the expense of other activities.

WHAT HE MIGHT BE THINKING

Your teen may feel that being skilful at video games boosts his social status. Telling him you're worried that some games normalise violence is likely to make him defensive.

He'll claim the games he's played haven't harmed him or his friends. If you've given in on this issue before, he believes he can wear you down.

HOW YOU COULD RESPOND

■ **Listen to his reasons** Ask him why exactly he wants the game, which of his friends' parents allow them to have it, why he believes it's rated no under 18s and why he thinks he should have it. He may realise his case isn't as strong as he thinks.

■ **Stand your ground** Giving in may lead him to assume that rules on issues such as drinking also don't apply. Although he's likely to shower you with gratitude if you agree, he's also likely to lose some respect for you.

■ **Decide on your values** Certificate-18 video games can normalise violence and often feature sexist stereotypes. Let him know that while other parents may be okay with their teens playing an active character in such scenes, you aren't.

STOP FOLLOWING ME ON SOCIAL MEDIA!

Your teen tells you to unfollow her after you disapprove of a post.

Your teen's social media feed is her litmus test for how she ranks in the online "popularity contest", where the feedback and comments measure attractiveness. She may have noticed that more risqué pictures get the most attention.

However, you're not her intended audience for such shots, so online comments or disapproval from you feel like an invasion of her territory.

WHAT YOU MIGHT BE THINKING

You may worry about inappropriate images being seen by potential employers or sexual predators. You may also be shocked and worry she looks promiscuous.

WHAT SHE MIGHT BE THINKING

She's angry because she wants the freedom to be herself. She may spend a lot of time getting a flattering angle for selfies and enjoys the compliments when she posts them.

These comments make her feel good, so she'll resent attempts to stop her.

Her social media image contrasts with the one she shows you and she may be uneasy with you seeing her more sexual persona.

HOW YOU COULD RESPOND

■ **Listen to her side** Ask her calmly why you should unfollow her. Then explain why you feel you need to see her feed so she understands.

■ **Discuss her image and audience** Ask her to imagine how the photo might be viewed by others. Who's her intended audience? If her profile is public, how comfortable is she with strangers seeing her images?

Tell her research found that 70% of employers view social media profiles during the hiring process. Next time she posts a picture, suggest she use the "granny test" by asking herself, "Would I mind Granny seeing this?"

ACCEPT HER DEVELOPMENT

Unless her posts are more risqué than those of her peers, you may need to accept that this is a phase that many teenage girls go through.

DAD SAID I COULD!

You come home to find your teen playing video games – his dad happily watching – when he promised he'd do his homework.

You and your co-parent may have different values about how much freedom to

grant teens and how to reward or punish them. The teen years can also bring up stark differences in parenting approaches because major decisions, affecting their future, have to be made now.

WHAT YOU MIGHT BE THINKING

You may feel intense frustration and believe your partner should know better. You may be annoyed with your teen for exploiting your differences to get his way.

WHAT HE MIGHT BE THINKING

Your teen has probably worked out your partner is the softer touch and is prepared to use that to get what he wants.

The instant gratification of getting his way feels good – even though he'd promised to do his homework and he knows it could land both him and his dad in trouble.

If you disagree in front of him, he could lose respect for you both because you both lose authority when you challenge each other.

HOW YOU COULD RESPOND

■ **Discuss your views in private** Avoid undermining your co-parent in front of your teen. Instead, agree you'll talk about your different thoughts in private later.

■ **Avoid being pushed into a difficult decision** If your teen asks you to agree to something and you feel you need more time to confer with your

co-parent, say, "I need to talk to your mom/dad first."

■ **Make it clear your decisions are joint** Even if you have different views, let your teen know you were both involved in what you've decided. Say, "We've both decided it's time you stopped playing your video game now."

YOU DON'T KNOW MY FRIENDS LIKE I DO!

When you say you're worried about some friends being a bad influence, your teen flies off the handle and accuses you of not knowing what you're talking about.

As your teen starts to edge towards independence, her friends help her define herself.

Her terror of being cut adrift from her tribe means she'll be fiercely loyal to them, even if she privately knows you have reason to worry about some of their behaviour.

If you try to manage her social life, she's likely become more defiant.



WHAT YOU MIGHT BE THINKING

If she's said that some of her friends drink, smoke or engage in risky activities – or you suspect they do – you may worry she'll be led astray.

WHAT SHE MIGHT BE THINKING

As she forms her new identity, she isn't ready for you to see the more grown-up person she's trying to be with her friends. She may have confided that "others" in her group drink and smoke to test your reaction and won't admit if she took part as well.

Even if she has reservations about her friends, she'll defend them, even if she knows you might be right.

HOW YOU COULD RESPOND

■ **Avoid criticism** If you disapprove of her friends, you'll have less influence as she won't share what's happening in her friendship group.

■ **Don't assume she's an angel** She's probably edited out her part in any risky things she's told you her friends have done.

■ **Offer yourself as an excuse** If you fear her friends put her in risky situations, give her a code word so she can call you anytime and signal that she's in an uncomfortable position and wants you to collect her.

■ **Open up your home** By offering her friends a place to meet, you'll understand her friendships better. The more welcome her friends feel, the more influence you'll have.

CAN MY BOYFRIEND SLEEP OVER?

Your teen asks if her partner can spend the night. Some parents struggle with the idea of their child being sexually active.

As parents we instinctively worry the physical proximity will lead to something they're not ready for.

WHAT YOU MIGHT BE THINKING

You may feel uncomfortable with their sleeping under the same roof, but find it hard to express this. If you say yes, you may worry you're giving tacit permission for her to have sex.

WHAT SHE MIGHT BE THINKING

If they're already having sex, her request may signal she's tired of lying and hiding evidence such as condom wrappers. She wants to feel comfortable having her boyfriend over.

She may resent your assumption that they're unable to control themselves for one night.

She may also feel awkward with the idea of having sex with you nearby. And she may want recognition that she's in a proper relationship.

If you object, she may say you're treating her like a child. She may also think that you disapprove of her boyfriend.

If you insist he sleeps in a separate room, she may find it challenging and exciting to find a way to have sex anyway.

HOW YOU COULD RESPOND

■ **Talk about it** Thank her for asking you. Rather than immediately refusing, ask her to chat through the reasons. You may feel protective,

but if you have no moral objection, try to see it as part of her learning curve as she moves towards adulthood.

■ **Ask for more time if you need it** It can take a while to accept that she's a sexual being. Tell her you need to adjust to the idea and get to know her boyfriend better before he shares your home.

■ **Decide on any boundaries** These include asking that her boyfriend respects house rules and leaving her bedroom door open during the day.

■ **Make it clear sex is private** Explain that it's an intimate act between two people and that if they're sleeping together under your roof, you'd like them to be considerate and discreet. ■

In 2013 actress Michelle Botes hit the pause button on life and moved to Knysna. She stayed there for seven years to find herself and now she's living life to the full.

OUT OF THE WILDERNESS

After a self-imposed exile of seven years, Michelle Botes has beaten the burnout and is ready for whatever life has to throw at her

IT HAPPENED without warning. One morning she woke up and realised she'd stopped smiling and her lust for life had vanished.

"I was burnt out. Finished. I'd fallen out of love with life," Michelle Botes explains.

She suddenly felt smothered by Johannesburg – the city that had given her so much joy for so many years. And she couldn't figure out why. After all, she had everything she'd dreamt of: a successful career, a beautiful flat, two perfect children.

But a blanket of despair had settled over everything. And that morning,

everything was just too much.

"You get caught up in the whirlpool of life," Michelle (58) says. "You ride wave after wave and life is a high-speed chase. You ignore the blows you're dealt and the fatigue. Then it hits you and you realise you simply can't go on."

"I was exhausted – physically, emotionally and spiritually."

The biggest roles in both her life and career had ended. It was mid-2013 and her character Cherele in *Isidingo* had disappeared from TV screens.

Her children with her ex-husband, actor Ian Roberts, were all grown up. Cara and Daniel had moved out of the house.



"Your life comes to a dead stop and you ask yourself, what now?" she says.

She was at a crossroads and had to decide: stay and fade away, or get away. So she sold all her "baggage", as she refers to her home and nearly all her belongings, got in her car and abandoned Joburg for the lush landscape of Knysna, 1 200km away.

And on the Garden Route, far from the hubbub of the city, Michelle took long walks on the beach, chopped wood, made fires and healed.

"I no longer wanted to control everything. I'd surrendered. I set myself free," she says.

Seven years later she's back in Joburg and she's smiling again. We'll soon be seeing her on our TV screens in M-Net's new telenovela *Legacy*, playing the part of Angelique Price, a woman whose business magnate ex-husband has shunned her for a much younger woman.

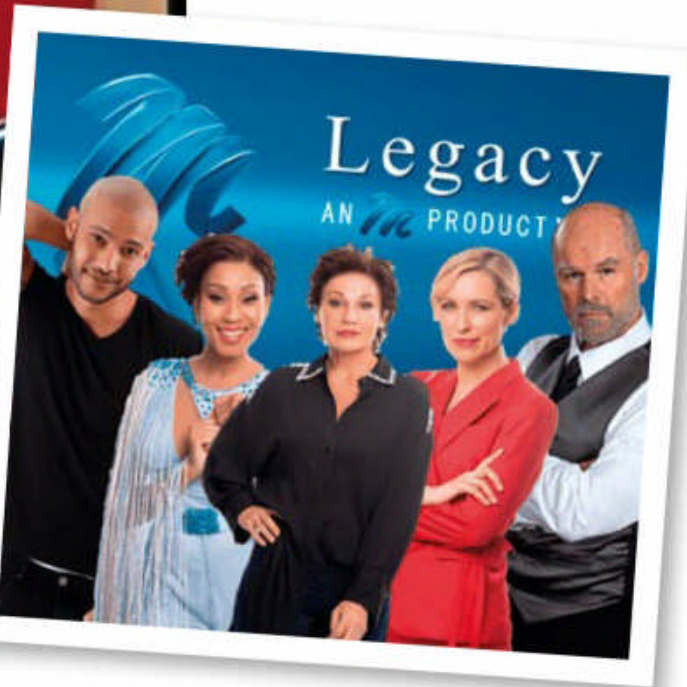
"It feels as if I'm on the threshold of a new life," Michelle says. "I'm laughing again and I'm living life to the full."

IT'S late afternoon and Michelle is in the middle of filming a scene for *Legacy*. After several takes, the director finally says, "Cut! That's a wrap."

Michelle comes over, still dressed as her character, and she's looking great.

"It's the makeup artists' handiwork," she says, brushing compliments aside.

Still, she acknowledges her seven-year

sabbatical "in the woods", as she calls her Knysna hibernation, was good for her.

"I don't recall ever looking at myself in a mirror that whole time," she says. "It was wonderful. I forgot about my cell-phone and the pressures of life."

In 2013, shortly after a brief reprisal of her role as Cherele, she was overworked and overwrought. She'd been in show business for nearly three decades.

"My immune system was rundown," Michelle says. "I'd get rashes from the tiniest thing and I had to be dosed up on cortisone to keep up with the daily pace. I was exhausted."

She had no plan when she headed down to the Western Cape but when she got to Wilderness she knew what she wanted to hit the pause button.

"So I did – for seven years."

She rented a wooden cottage in the Knysna Forest where she spent most of her time.

"I felt extremely wealthy, though I owned nothing. I'd sold everything, every single item, to go and find myself. It took my psyche a while to get to grips with the sudden standstill. Suddenly there was no more hurry and it was incredible."

But in 2016 real life came hurtling in again – and it was heartbreaking. Someone very close to her was diagnosed with cancer.

"I'd forgotten, there among the trees, how hard life can hit you," she recalls. "I was shattered. The only thing that mattered was his recovery."

This person, who she doesn't want to identify, lived with Michelle for a year before he recovered. "That year changed

our lives. I only realised later the toll it had taken on us all."

It's not just Michelle who paused the button on life. Shortly after her, Daniel went exploring and he now works on a luxury cruise ship. Cara is a theatre actress in Durban. Following her loved one's health battle, Michelle had to "relearn how to laugh again".

But she did more than introspection in the woods – she changed her lifestyle too. "I cut out gluten and dairy products and as soon as I did, I lost my bum!"

But that doesn't mean she's perfect now, she's quick to add. "Some days I binge and there are chips, cheesecake and carrot cake all over the place."

"But it's okay. I'm following my own advice: learning to live a balanced life."

AS THE years passed, she slowly started dreaming of being surrounded by people again.

"In my solitude I realised you need others around you to fully know all the parts of yourself. Even those parts you don't like."

She returned to Joburg in 2019 and back in the big city, she started thinking of work again and returned briefly to Isidingo. But Cherele truly is gone forever now, she stresses.

"Cherele is one of those characters that follows you throughout your life. Everywhere I went, people would mention Cherele."

"And it was okay. She was dynamic – a character who wasn't afraid of taking what she wanted. Sure, she was vengeful, but she also had redeeming characteristics."

"She'd been stuck to me

for many years and I wanted to know who I was without her."

After her stint as Cherele last year, Michelle wanted the Isidingo writers to kill her off. "I wanted closure – a way to say it's really over now. It was wonderful and a privilege to know her, but it's a chapter that's done now."

But the bosses refused – never say never, they said.

Shortly after leaving Isidingo, M-Net approached her for the role of former lawyer Angelique in Legacy, which debuts on 23 September.

"I loved Angelique the first time I read about her," Michelle says. "Her husband swops her for a younger model and it's a tightrope: sometimes she manages to stay strong but other times revenge takes over. She has rules about how life should work but if things don't work out the way she wants, she's going to have to get rid of that blueprint."

Angelique reminds Michelle of her herself. "She knows she has to let go but oh, it's so terribly hard."

When she's not on set, Michelle spends her days pottering about in her cottage in Linden and finds herself marvelling at how good life is.

"I feel alive again. I'm excited about inhabiting a character again."

There's just one thing missing: romance. "Is it tragic?" Michelle says, laughing. "I don't think it is. I yearn for someone special in my life again but maybe it's not meant to be."

Right now, she's happy.

"I've surrendered and I'm free, and if you're free, your heart is open. Nothing is forced and anything can happen." ■



KATY GETS REAL

The new mom hasn't been afraid to show off the reality of new motherhood – warts and all

SHE'S never been one to hide her light under a bushel, has Katy Perry – so when celebs started sharing pics of their glammed-up selves at the recent MTV Video Music Awards, she wasn't about to be upstaged.

Yes, she may be stuck at home with newborn daughter Daisy Dove and a serious case of FOMO. But that didn't mean she was going to be ignored.

Instead of getting dolled up like so many others, Katy posted a pic of herself in a nursing bra complete with breast-pump adapters, a pair of serious granny panties over her mum tum and a look of new-mom exhaustion on her face.

Here I am warts and all, she seemed to be saying – don't forget about me.

People loved the post, with women around the world praising Katy for not glamourising life after childbirth.

Frida Mom, the company that sells the postpartum underwear the star was wearing, declared her “the best dressed of the night”.

The picture was a sure sign Katy won't be airbrushing the reality of early motherhood. She's often allowed access to the harsher side of her life and has been vocal about her battle with anxiety and depression – and she recently opened up about it again in an interview with talk-show host Tom Power.

“I lost my smile,” she said, describing a particularly bleak spell in 2017. “I'd been riding on the high of a smile for a long time, which was the validation, love and admiration from the outside world. And then that shifted.”

The change was two-fold, she said, precipitated by a break-up with her now-fiancé and baby-daddy Orlando Bloom,

and the disappointing response to her 2017 album, *Witness*.

“My career was on this trajectory where it was going up-up-up-up-up-up-up, and then I had the smallest shift. It wasn't that huge, maybe, from an outside perspective, but for me it was seismic.

“It kind of broke me in half. I was excited about flying high off the next record and the record and validation didn't get me high, and so I just crashed.”

However, the 35-year-old pop star now calls that time in her life both a “good crash” and a “necessary brokenness”.

“It was so important for me to be broken,” Katy says, “so that I could find my wholeness in a whole different way, and be more dimensional than just living my

life like a thirsty pop star all the time”.

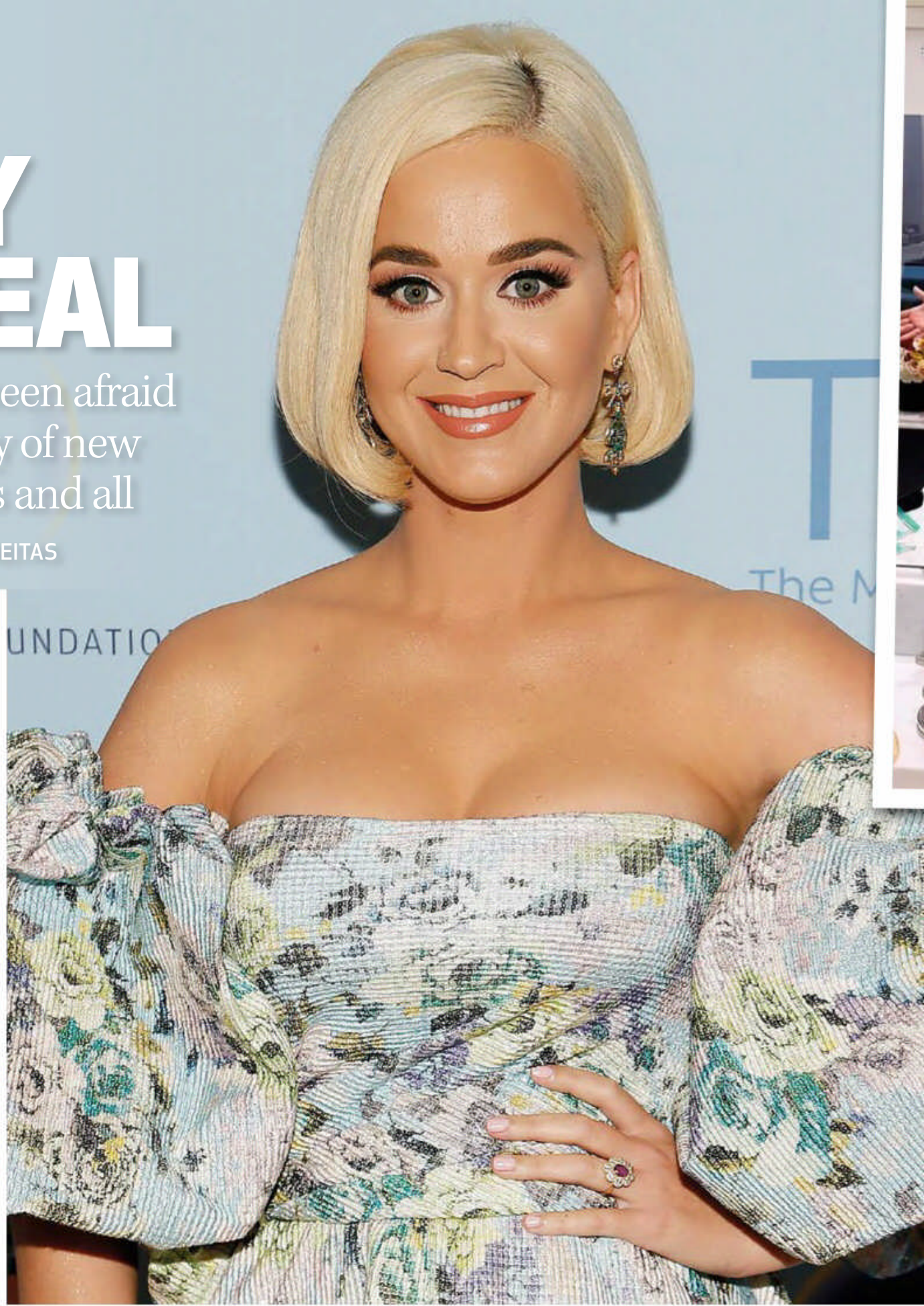
She credits her 43-year-old fiancé as the “never-ending cleanse” that keeps her balanced.

“Orlando is like a sage. When we first met, he said we'd pull the poison out of each other, and we really do.

“I've never had a partner who was willing to go on an emotional and spiritual journey like Orlando.”

During a recent interview, she praised their mature relationship, calling it, “a healthy frictional, very open, very communicative, nothing-is-swept-under-the-mat type of relationship”.

“I think if we can get to the ends of our lives together, we'll be each other's greatest teachers.

BEFORE getting to the main course Katy had her fair share of entrées, including her short-lived marriage to British comedian Russell Brand.

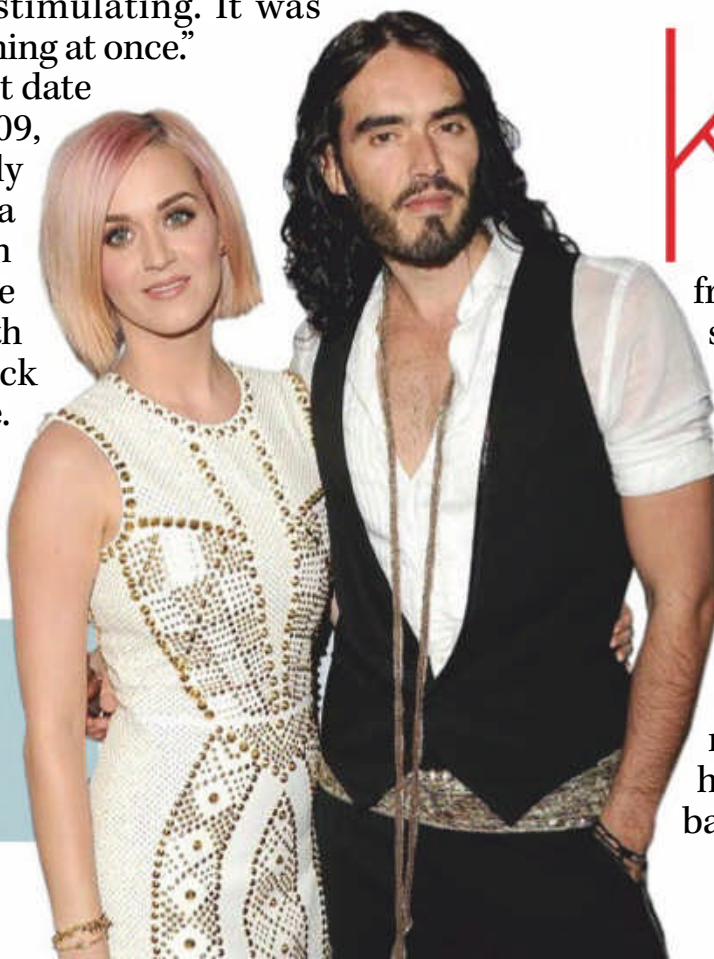
She recently broke her silence on the ill-fated relationship, describing it as a tornado fraught with ups and downs.

"I was having great success at 23, 24 and 25 and then I met someone who was interesting and stimulating. It was everything happening at once."

During their first date in September 2009, Russell reportedly told Katy, "You're a mermaid and I'm drowning," before presenting her with a sensational black diamond necklace.

This set the stage for an intensity that would continue

throughout their romance, with Russell proposing just three months later in India on New Year's Eve.

They tied the knot in a lavish Indian ceremony that October and got matching "Anugacchati Pravaha" tattoos. The phrase is Sanskrit for "go with the flow".

But just months in, rumours of trouble began to swirl.

Recovering drug addict Russell and his then 25-year-old wife were said to be clashing over everything from her partying to having children and his jealousy of her success.

An insider claimed they realised they had nothing in common and things came to head over their third Christmas as a couple, culminating in a shock split that Katy describes as the "breaking of my idealistic mind".

"Let's just say I haven't heard from him since he texted me saying he was divorcing me on 31 December 2011," she says.

But she picked herself up. "I've always resonated with friction, resistance and challenges – it's something I know very well about myself."

KATY grew up in an ultra-religious household, secretly longing for freedom of expression and superstardom.

She's been open about her frayed relationship with her parents, Keith and Mary Hudson, two Pentecostal pastors who ran a ministry from their home in Santa Barbara, California.

"My childhood was just the Jesus train. It wasn't expansive and it wasn't curious, it was just Sunday morning, Sunday night, Wednesday evening, Jesus," she recently said.

Education was limited and heavily religious, expressing feelings was off the table and therapy was taboo.

"We knew about Madonna and Marilyn Manson in my family because we picketed their concerts," Katy says.

Leaving behind her life as the "black sheep" of the family, she moved to Los Angeles to pursue a career in show business at 17. She rose to fame in 2008 with the mega-hit *I Kissed a Girl*, which further alienated her from her family because of its homosexual theme.

Although their relationship is tenuous, she still has a relationship with her parents and in 2018 she took her mom and Orlando to Rome where they met the pope.

"My mom has prayed for me my entire life, hoping I'd come back to God. I never left Him. I was just a little bit secular, I was more materialistic and more career-driven. But now that I'm in my thirties, it's more about spirituality and heart wholeness," she says.

Despite rejecting many of the religious beliefs on which she was raised, she says her family struggle made her tough enough to cope with fame.

"I guess I adopted humour and sarcasm and steel early on," she says.

And it stood her in good stead when she had a long-standing feud with Taylor Swift. Katy took a hammering and while the feud, which riveted fans for years, is over, negativity is still everywhere.

"I'm not invincible," she says, when asked if the hate she sees about her on the internet bothers her.

"But I know that there are two worlds you can live in: you can live in the internet or you can live in the real world – and I feel really good in the real world." ■

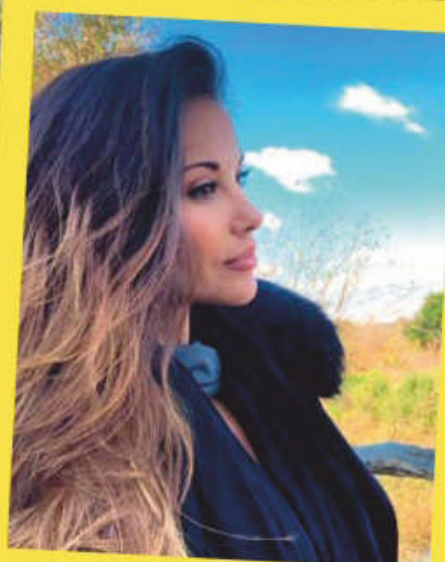
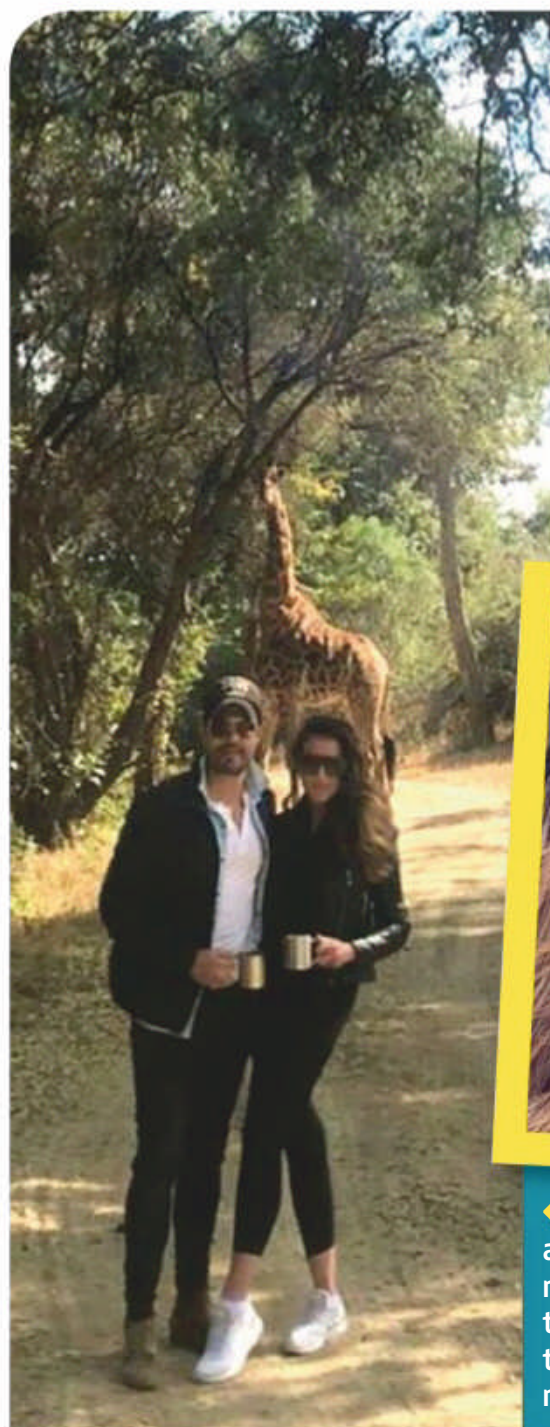

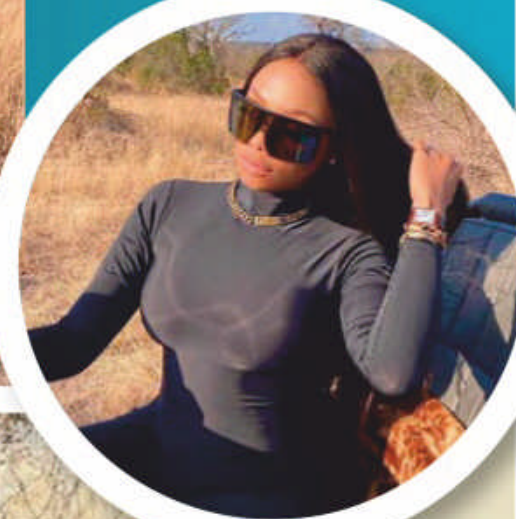

Prince also said he was "grateful" for the time he had with his famous

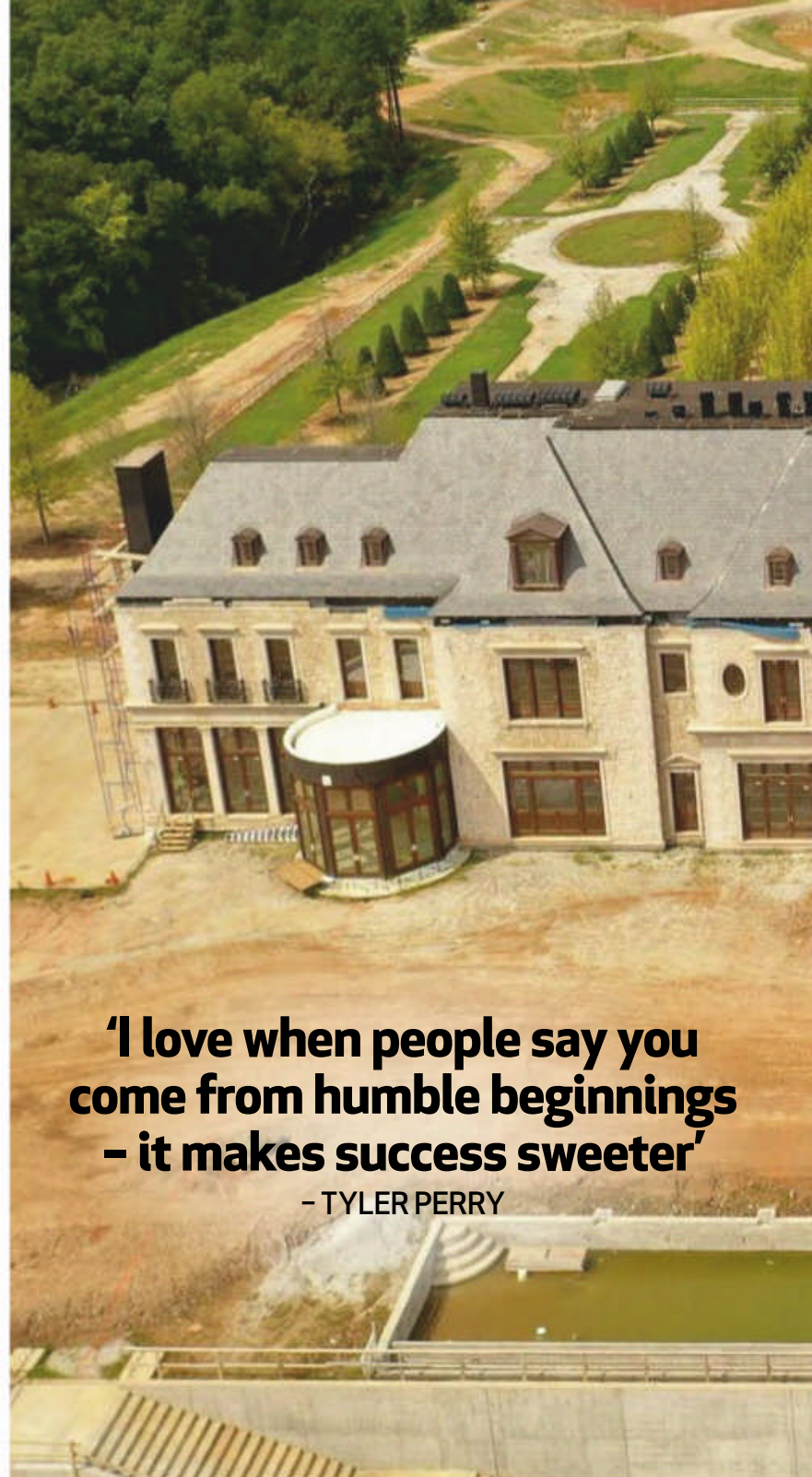
father.

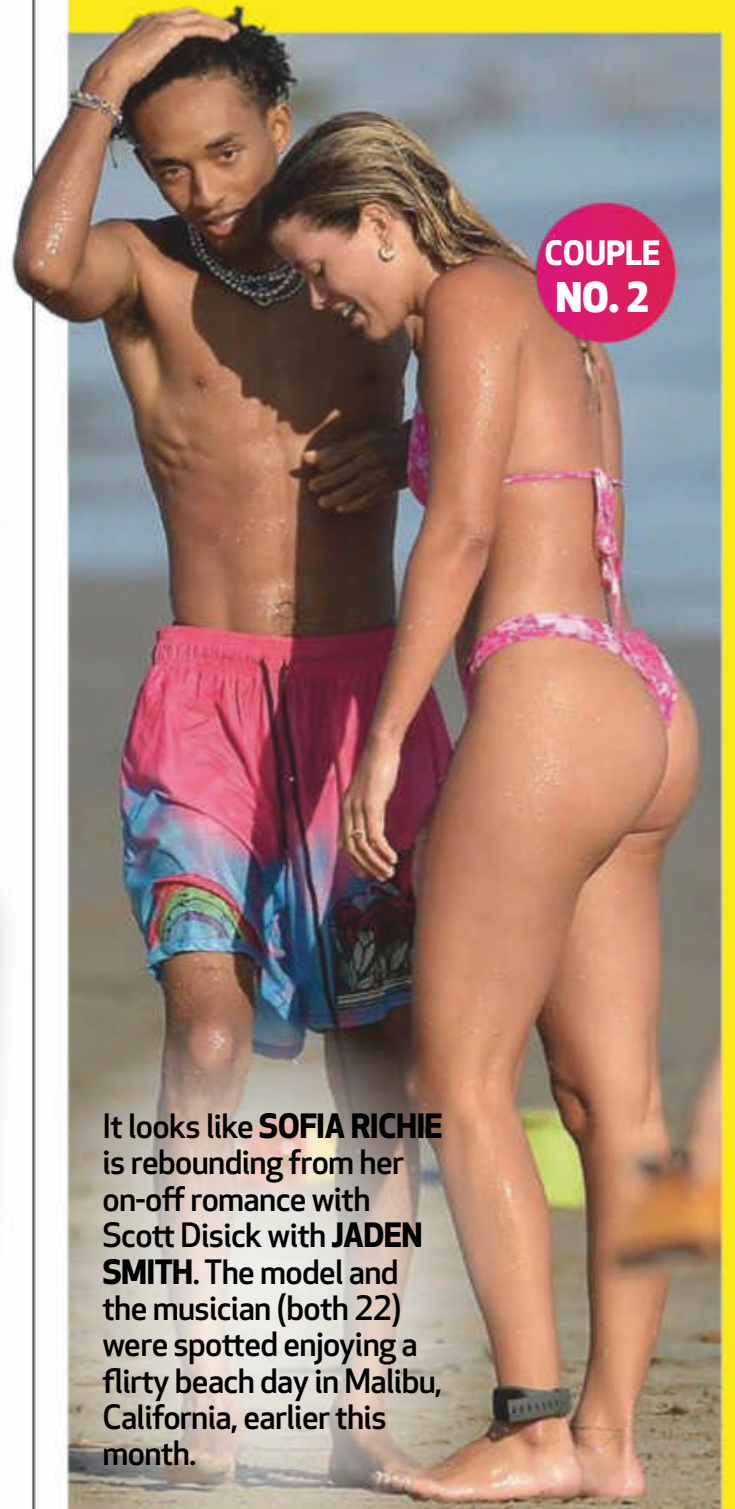
